- (iv) [The Middle Atlantic Truck Stop Operators.] A State-wide organization representing fuel retailers and food merchants.
- (v) The Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, Pennsylvania State Grange and Pennsylvania Farmers Union.
- (vi) The Tank Installers of Pennsylvania.

(2) One local government member who shall have knowledge and expertise in underground storage tanks. The local government member shall be appointed for a term of two years.

(3) One public member who shall not be an owner or operator of storage tanks nor affiliated in any way with any person regulated under this act. The public member shall be appointed for a term of three years.

(f) Meetings; quorum.--The board shall meet at least quarterly. Additional meetings may be held upon reasonable notice at times and locations selected by the board. Senator BARTOLOTTA. Mr. President, domestic violence continues to plague communities throughout Pennsylvania, and as we know, the results can be truly catastrophic. Last year 60 community centers provided services throughout the Commonwealth and assisted more than 89,000 victims of domestic violence. According to statistics from the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, there were over 37,000 new PFA cases filed in 2015.

It was in August 2016, Mr. President, that an ongoing domestic violence situation in my senatorial district ended tragically, following the armed kidnapping and subsequent murder of Tierne Ewing, a Washington County woman by her estranged husband, Kevin Ewing. One month prior to the incident that resulted in her murder, the estranged husband had been arrested for domestic violence and other offenses. Despite a prosecutor's request to raise or revoke bail due to the husband's history of abuse and the existence of an active Protection From Abuse order, or PFA, the individual's bail was not increased. The courts did, however, require that he be confined to his home and monitored with an electronic device on his ankle while awaiting trial for the July arrest. Unfortunately, it was during this time that he removed the ankle monitor and then kidnapped and murdered Tierne Ewing. This tragedy, which drew national media attention, exposed a number of flaws in the way State and local authorities address this serious crime.

That is why I introduced Senate Bill No. 449, also known as Tierne's Law, named in memory of Tierne Ewing. My legislation would give judges the tools they need to keep the most dangerous offenders behind bars. Specifically, the bill would clarify that magisterial district judges may use a risk assessment tool to determine whether a defendant poses a danger to a victim when determining bail in domestic violence cases. Risk assessment tools have proven to be effective in predicting an offender's odds of reoffending and creating a dangerous circumstance for victims. Issues related to bail are just one of the dangerous loopholes in a State law that create unnecessary dangers for domestic violence victims. We must make it our mission to close these loopholes permanently. Through more uniform and consistent use of a validated risk assessment, district judges can reach more equitable pretrial decisions that also can reduce costs and preserve public safety. Risk assessments aid in keeping those out of jail who do not pose a serious threat, while remanding those who pose a threat to the original victim and others. Victims of domestic violence face incredible obstacles and dangers that no person should ever be forced to confront. In many cases their lives are shattered in a thousand pieces, and it is no easy task to put those

pieces back together. Today we have an opportunity to come together and lend a helping hand and eliminate some of the most serious dangers that they face. I urge my colleagues to cast an affirmative vote on Senate Bill No. 449.

Thankfully, the storm provision is kept, but if any of you have ever tried to be on Route 95, the Pennsylvania Turnpike, Route 78, or any of our major highways during Thanksgiving, I can assure you, having tried the route from New York to Washington, or even from Philadelphia to Washington, it takes twice the amount of time. The last thing we need is to have more trucks of a large size on the road.

I understand the argument in return, that if they could put more smaller trucks on the road, they would, but on holiday periods, the employees themselves -- it is Christmas, it is Thanksgiving; we do not need more trucks delaying traffic. So while this might seem like a very simple bill to assist the trucking industry, and it certainly is part of the understandings with the House, it is, in my judgment, one that our constituents will find quite burdensome when they try to go to grandmother's house or their aunt and uncle's house or visit their children on Thanksgiving Day. Once again, I cannot vote for this because I do not believe it is in the interests of my constituents and I ask you to simply think about whether it is in the interests of your constituents as well.

Thank you, Mr. President.
