GUESTS OF SENATOR JUDY SCHWANK PRESENTED TO THE SENATE

Senator SCHWANK. Mr. President, as you know, today we had the annual commemoration of Domestic Violence Awareness Month in the Capitol Rotunda. It is always a very solemn and very impactful ceremony. I was glad to be there today, but I was even more glad that I had some constituents who came from our domestic violence organization in Berks County now called Safe Berks. Safe Berks is a dual organization. Not only do they work on domestic violence, but also sexual violence, and victims of rape as well. It is a full-service agency, staffed by some pretty wonderful and very effective individuals.

I welcome from Berks County from Safe Berks Jen Ebersole, who is the director of education and outreach; Francine Scoboria, who is communications specialist for Safe Berks; and Lisa De La Cruz, who is a community educator. These are individuals who are doing very important and impactful work not only in Berks County but in the Commonwealth. I ask my colleagues to join me in welcoming them.

Thank you, Mr. President.

Mr. President, for your information, Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley is a safe place where victims of abuse and their children can find refuge. Turning Point provides services in Lehigh and Northampton Counties and reaches nearly 2,600 people a year through their programs and services, which include a 24-hour helpline, emergency safe house, empowerment counseling, support groups, legal advocacy, outreach education, and medical advocacy.

So, Mr. President, on behalf of the survivors of domestic violence, I thank them for bringing their good message and the services they provide to the Capitol today to mark the start of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and I ask the Senate to give them a warm welcome.

The PRESIDENT. We welcome Lori Sywensky and all of the good folks from Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley for all you do in Pennsylvania. We appreciate it. We all have to fight domestic violence together.

Senator KILLION. Mr. President, it is my pleasure this afternoon to offer this resolution designating the month of October 2018 as "Domestic Violence Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. Domestic violence affects women and men of all racial, ethnic, religious, educational, and social and economic backgrounds. For nearly five decades, the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence has worked to honor victims and survivors, celebrate advocates, and shine a light on intimate partner violence. Staff and volunteers at our local domestic violence shelters located in communities across this Commonwealth provide shelter, legal assistance, counseling, and children's services to more than 90,000 victims per year, helping them find safety, obtain justice, and build new lives free of abuse. I know firsthand the hard work and important work they do having served as a member of the board of the Delaware County Domestic Abuse Project for a number of years.

This resolution encourages all Pennsylvanians to learn more about the causes, signs, prevention, and treatment for domestic violence. In this Chamber in March, we unanimously approved a package of domestic violence bills that would provide additional protections for victims of domestic abuse. I look forward to ensuring that this landmark legislation gets to the Governor's desk. Today, I introduce this resolution on behalf of the many victims and their families and would like to take this opportunity to recognize the coalition for their ongoing commitment to these men and women.

Both organizations do so much for so many, providing direct services to hundreds of victims and their children who reside in the 9th Senatorial District.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lycoming, Senator Yaw.

Senator YAW. Mr. President, we all know what wills are, even those of us here who are not lawyers. We know what living wills are, which cover the situation where we may have an unexpected event which renders us incapable of making decisions on our own. This bill and this legislation is POLST, which stands for Pennsylvania Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment, which is really an end-of-life order. It is something that is a way to formalize the patient's end-of-life desires and it is something that is worked out with the family, the family physician, it could be a family attorney, but in any event, it is a voluntary agreement as to end-of-life treatment, and it can be revoked at any time.

It also can be used if the patient feels that they want all heroic life-sustaining treatments to stop. You want to fly in the top surgeon or whoever from Switzerland to try to save somebody's life, it can also be used that way. The idea is this is a way to provide death with dignity, and I think that is something that is very, very important to Pennsylvania. The organizations that have worked on this bill have worked on it for many, many years, in some cases as long as 10 years. I also state that this bill is strongly supported by the Pennsylvania Medical Society, and I ask for an affirmative vote from my colleagues.

Senator SCHWANK. Mr. President, PANS and PANDAS are frightening syndromes that strike young children as a result of their body's autoimmune response to infections, and in the case of PANDAS, specifically streptococcal infections. The average age of onset is between 4 and 7 years old, and boys seem to suffer more commonly than girls. Parents and caregivers find themselves confronted overnight with children beset by severe nervous tics, obsessive-compulsive behavior, anorexia, mood swings, irritability, and sleep disturbances. But the association of these symptoms as singular syndromes was only recognized by science for the first time 20 years ago in 1998, and because of its relatively recent discovery, it unfortunately often still goes undiscovered or misdiagnosed. Many of our colleagues, like me, have heard and listened, and you cannot help but empathize with constituents struggling to understand and to deal with the sudden and debilitating symptoms while at the same time also having to search for medical providers who are familiar enough with this problem and disease to diagnose the problems and deal with them.

Last week, thanks to the leadership of Chairman Baker, the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services reported out my Senate Bill No. 1220 to establish an advisory board within

the Department of Health on PANS and PANDAS. A similar bill by my colleague in the House, Representative Jozwiak, is also under consideration in the House of Representatives. The establishment of this board will be a very important boost to PANS and PANDAS families, and I sincerely hope we will be able to accomplish it, if not this Session, then the next. In the meantime, it is important that Pennsylvania recognize the challenges families face at home and in the community when a child suffers from PANS and PANDAS, and that is why I am offering this resolution with colleagues from both sides of the aisle today. On behalf of all these families and my colleagues, I thank the Senate for its unanimous support to recognize next Tuesday, October 9, for the second consecutive year as "PANS/PANDAS Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.

Senator TARTAGLIONE. Mr. President, I rise today to speak about a devastating problem that impacts every segment of our society here in Pennsylvania, throughout the nation, and around the world. Suicide is more than a problem, it is an epidemic, and all too often it is a silent killer. It is the 10th-leading cause of death in the United States, more prevalent than liver disease, high blood pressure, or even murder. Almost 45,000 Americans took their own lives in 2016, and about 2,000 of those deaths occurred in Pennsylvania. Those figures do not account for the estimated 1 million suicide attempts that occur each year, nor do they reveal the immeasurable harm endured by countless survivors, the relatives, friends, coworkers, and classmates of those who die by suicide.

The horrifying statistics also tell us that suicide impacts all walks of life regardless of age, gender, race, religion, education, income, or sexuality, and the annual death toll continues to rise at an alarming pace. Since 1999, the nation's suicide rate has grown by 30 percent, according to the CDC. In Pennsylvania, the growth has been closer to 35 percent. Yet we do not discuss suicide nearly enough. How often in our daily lives do we approach the subject of suicide on a truly personal level? My hope is that "World Suicide Prevention Day" will inspire more public dialogue and more private, personal conversations about suicide. I hope that we become more educated about the risk factors and warning signs. I hope that our families, friends, coworkers, and classmates will learn to recognize when a loved one is in danger, and I hope that many troubled souls who are contemplating suicide will know where to find help and will feel empowered to seek it.

Mr. President, 15 years ago I was in a horrific boat accident, and I can tell you not once, not twice, but many times I thought, do I really want to live like this? It has crossed my mind, and this is very personal. I hope that you please join me in recognizing World Suicide Prevention Day in the Commonwealth, and please remember, help is only a phone call away. If you or someone you know may be facing a crisis, call the Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-8255.

These conditions can profoundly affect millions of lives, impacting the capability of these individuals to make it through the day, to sustain relationships, and to maintain employment. The stigma attached to mental health also makes it more difficult for those affected to pursue help.

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, more than half of individuals with mental illness do not receive treatment. By contrast, the majority of those affected by these problems face a variety of challenges, including isolation and, too often, uncertainty on where to get help for information. Many rely only on the informal support of family, friends, or colleagues, which is no substitute for professional treatment. The best way to deal with the stigma is through education and better understanding of mental health issues. This also means identifying the causes, pinpointing solutions, and, ultimately, recognizing that we are dealing with medical issues. World Mental Health Day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work and what more needs to be done to make proper treatment a reality for all people. I ask my colleagues to join me in recognizing October 10, 2018, as World Mental Health Day in Pennsylvania.

Metastatic breast cancer, also called stage IV or advanced breast cancer, is the most advanced stage of breast cancer and has spread to other organs in the body, most often the bones, lungs, liver, or brain. Much of the talk around breast cancer focuses on early detection and routine diagnosis, where we have seen tremendous progress in the last 30 years; however, the story for advanced disease is quite different. Metastatic breast cancer patients continue to face many unique challenges, such as the emotional and physical demands of continual treatment.

Currently, no cure exists for metastatic breast cancer, and those with metastatic breast cancer will continue treatment indefinitely with a goal of extending the best quality of life possible. One in eight women in the United States could be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer in their lifetime. Specifically, in Pennsylvania, it is expected that at least 11,300 women and 111 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 2018.

Metastatic breast cancer cuts short the lives of too many people in Pennsylvania, leaving a lasting effect on their families. It is important to recognize the personal and social burdens of metastatic breast cancer, the needs of the patient, and promising research efforts in the development of more effective treatments.

I ask that Members support this resolution to raise awareness and show support for our family members, neighbors, friends, and colleagues affected by metastatic breast cancer.

Senator FONTANA. Mr. President, I rise today to ask that my colleagues join me in recognizing October 2018 as "Italian-American Heritage Month." Mr. President, perhaps one of the most famous Italians is the explorer Christopher Columbus. Columbus was determined to find a quicker route west from Europe to Asia, and during one of his voyages he accidentally stumbled upon the Americas. For this reason, many credit Christopher Columbus with Italian immigration to the New World. Italian immigrants began moving to the United States in sizable numbers around the 1820s and helped fuel a booming industrial economy.

Today, the Commonwealth is proud to be home to over 1.4 million Italian Americans. More impressively, Allegheny County has the highest Italian American population in the State. Mr. President, as an Italian American myself, it is with great pride that I urge adoption of this resolution.
