I can show you the statistics on child abuse, I can show you statistics with PFAs, and what we have to do as a body is understand that relationship. So, I ask for a motion to revert because I have been assured that we will have an opportunity to have this bill and to focus on that very issue, which is so crucial to all of us.

"Sexual orientation." Heterosexuality, homosexuality or bisexuality.

Section 2. Section 307(c) of the act, amended October 30, 2017 (P.L.772, No.45), is amended to read:

Amend Bill, page 3, by inserting between lines 25 and 26:
Section 3. Section 318(a) of the act is amended and subsections (a.1) and (a.3) are amended by adding paragraphs to read:
Section 318. Administration of redevelopment assistance capital projects.

(a) Limitation.--A redevelopment assistance capital project may not receive funds unless [the]:

(1) The project was itemized in a capital project itemization bill or a capital budget bill, enacted within ten years of the date the project was approved under this section.

(2) The applicant certifies to the office, in a form satisfactory to the office, that the applicant and all persons and entities involved in the project, including the end users of the project, will not engage in discriminatory conduct set forth in the act of October 27, 1955 (P.L.744, No.222), known as the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act, of:

(i) the race, color, familial status, age, religious creed, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or handicap or disability of any person;

(ii) the use of a guide or support animal because of the blindness, deafness or physical handicap of the user or because the user is a handler or trainer of guide or support animals; or

(iii) the handicap or disability of an individual with whom the

person is known to have a relationship or association.

(a.1) Application.--An applicant shall submit an application to the office consistent with the timeline established by the office requesting a grant for a redevelopment assistance capital project. The proposal must be on the form required by the office and must include or demonstrate all of the following:

(4.1) A statement certifying that the applicant and all persons and entities involved in the project, including the end users of the project, will not engage in discriminatory conduct set forth in the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act because of:

(i) the race, color, familial status, age, religious creed, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or handicap or disability of any person;

(ii) the use of a guide or support animal because of the blindness, deafness or physical handicap of the user or because the user is a handler or trainer of guide or support animals; or

(iii) the handicap or disability of an individual with whom the person is known to have a relationship or association.

(a.3) Acceptance and grant agreement.--Within 30 days of receiving notification of approval under subsection (a.2), an applicant shall notify the office if the applicant accepts the grant. (4.1) A contract prohibiting the applicant and all persons and entities involved in the project, including the end users of the project, from engaging in discriminatory conduct set forth in the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act because of:

(i) the race, color, familial status, age, religious creed, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin or handicap or disability of any person;

(ii) the use of a guide or support animal because of the blindness, deafness or physical handicap of the user or because the user is a handler or trainer of guide or support animals; or

(iii) the handicap or disability of an individual with whom the person is known to have a relationship or association.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Senator Farnese.

Senator FARNESE. Mr. President, I know that over not only the course of this legislative term, but numerous legislative terms, I think at least for the last 4 to 6 years, we have been trying to get updates to the laws here in Pennsylvania to, quite frankly, end legalized discrimination. This amendment, very simply, would, at least, bring the provisions that we have talked about year after year, legislative term after legislative term, into the RACP to insure, Mr. President, that recipients and project users are not subject to or commit any acts of discrimination based, among other things, upon who you choose to love. The fact, Mr. President, is this. We are ready to wrap up the legislative term of 2018, and Pennsylvania still has the dubious distinction of being one of the few places in this country where discrimination is still legal. We have attacked the opioid problem, we have talked about issues related to public education, and we have talked about issues that are important to us about economic de-

velopment. But year after year, term after term, we continue to allow this black eye to remain on Pennsylvania. Again, it is not a complete fix, but in the Commonwealth we are handing out hundreds of millions of dollars in State money to insure that both the project, project user, and recipient are not discriminated against on any terms.

I believe, Mr. President, that if you cannot get behind this for the issues of morality or justice, then I plead to you to look at it from an economic development standpoint. The money that we lose because we discriminate, we can at least begin to remedy the problem here right now on a program that we all think very highly of, which is our RACP, which insures that those dollars go for development in each and every one of our districts. Before we take that money, and we insure that those folks take it and utilize it free of discrimination, let us start today. Let us amend this bill and at least we have done something, Mr. President, before we leave here to end legalized discrimination in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

I could say one more thing, because I want to get this off of my chest before we leave. We are going to go home and some of us are going to campaign for reelection, some of us are running for election, and we are talking about issues that are important to the people of Pennsylvania. Let us make sure that when we are out in our districts and we are talking about the issues that are important, have the guts and the courage to say what I have to say to my folks when I go back, that I am sorry, we did not do it this time, once again. I am sorry, we were not able to end discrimination because of who you are and because of who you love. This is an opportunity to, at least, begin the process in RACP as an amendment to House Bill No. 83. We have Democrats, we have Republicans, we have Independents, and we have fearful, because each and every one of us is fearful. I include myself, because I have not been able to bring it up. I start with me. Let us end that today.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Centre, Senator Corman.

Senator CORMAN. Mr. President, it certainly is a well-intended amendment. No one, certainly, is in favor of any type of discrimination here in Pennsylvania. I do not believe, I did a quick check, so I could be wrong, that the gentleman has ever introduced this. Oh, he has introduced this bill in the past. This bill deals with the debt load that we have here in Pennsylvania. Many people are very concerned about the amount of debt that we are carrying in Pennsylvania and this bill will go a way to hasten the pace of that repayment and reduce the amount of debt that we have here in Pennsylvania. So, this bill will go straight to the Governor. It is obviously 6 o'clock and any bill that leaves here and goes back to the House runs the risk of not getting done. The next Session is not that far away, the gentleman, Senator Farnese, should introduce it again. I am sure the Committee on State Government will give it due consideration and discussion. At this point, because of the importance of getting this capital debt relief bill done, I ask for a negative vote.

and outdoor recreation support something along those lines, in-
cluding the Equine Council, the NRA, the snowmobilers, the
Fish and Boat folks, lots of different people who have lots of
different interests in hunting, fishing, using trails for walking,
snowmobiles, hiking, or horseback riding or lots of different
things.

Anyway, I am going to support the bill today. I am sure it is
going to pass. I appreciate what was done, Senator Corman had
a good amendment the other day, but I hope that next Session

Senator VULAKOVICH. Mr. President, I rise today as the sponsor of this resolution marking the 100th anniversary of the cessation of hostilities of World War I on November 11, 1918. The United States entered into World War I on April 6, 1917, following the German maritime aggression against merchant and supply ships as well as non-combative ocean liners. These unprovoked attacks killed hundreds of American servicemen and civilians alike. Prior to the United States' involvement in 1917, that war was in a bloody stalemate, one where thousands of lives were lost daily in a back and forth trench warfare where neither

side could gain more than a few yards at a time. After 3 years of conflict, which saw the first use of such technologies as aircraft carriers, submarines, and tanks, the European nations had been bled nearly dry. When the time came, America responded with a cry of "Lafayette, here we come," and hundreds of thousands of fresh doughboys marched onto the field of battle and became the catalyst to victory.

We can be proud that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania made significant contributions to the war effort as well, producing more than half of the steel used by the Allied powers during the war and purchasing more than \$3 billion in victory and liberty bonds. Of course, Pennsylvanians also paid a price in achieving victory. Of the 71,159 Americans who died in World War I, 7,369 called Pennsylvania home. All of our World War I veterans have now passed away, but they and their comrades left us with a legacy intertwined with that of all the veterans who exist today. One that is also a tribute to the valor and sacrifice of our military.

So, as we stand here today, let us also keep the faith, let us remember and honor the service and sacrifice of all our men and women in uniform past and present, and let us remember the lessons they wrought and ensure that they have not died for naught. I ask for an affirmative vote.

The Centers for Disease Control, Mr. President, defines diabetes as a group of diseases characterized by high blood sugar. When blood sugar builds up in the body and its levels are not controlled, it can lead to serious complications, including heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, blindness, amputation of limbs and feet, and early death. It is a chronic disease that affects an estimated 30 million Americans. Pennsylvania has a diabetes epidemic with approximately 1.5 million people living with diabetes, and an estimated 325,000 Pennsylvanians undiagnosed. Every year an estimated 63,000 individuals are diagnosed in Pennsylvania with diabetes, and diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in our State.

Approximately 1.25 million American children and adults have type 1 diabetes, and approximately 5 percent of individuals with diabetes have type 1. Children and young adults can learn to manage type 1 diabetes with the help of insulin therapy and other treatments and live long and healthy lives. In an effort to focus attention on this ever-growing disease, November has been recognized as National Diabetes Month. This year's theme is "Everyday Reality," because for those who have been diagnosed, diabetes impacts nearly every decision they make in their daily lives, from what they eat, wear, do, and how they will take care of themselves. Yet, the 24/7 burden of diabetes management is often misunderstood. This awareness campaign is intended to demonstrate the everyday reality of diabetes from the point of view of people living with diabetes or caring for someone with the disease.

During the month of November, Mr. President, let us raise awareness, promote ongoing diabetes education, and support those living with this chronic disease. I ask all Members of the Senate to join me in adopting this resolution.

They are a very, very vital part of the care team for a patient in the hospital, from ventilators to anything that the patient might need for relief. I know, I am a former respiratory therapist. He was on a ventilator and we thought we could not get him off, but with the help of the respiratory care team and the physician, he was able to get off that respirator and have 14 more months of life. This happens every day for patients. Respiratory therapists help extend lives with a good quality of life, and I am proud today to offer this resolution designating the week of October 21 through 27, 2018, as "Respiratory Care Week" in Pennsylvania. PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Northampton, Senator Boscola.

Senator BOSCOLA. Mr. President, this legislative Session is winding down and coming to an end and there has been some really great legislation that has been passed in the last 2 years. Specifically, today, Senator Stefano and myself had a bill that says when you steal from government and nonprofits, you have to pay the money back. Makes sense, right? But while we do so many successful things here in this Chamber, I cannot say that I was not disappointed, but not surprised, about the demise of redistricting reform here in Pennsylvania. What happened to this bill speaks volumes about how the legislature operates. In the end, all the statewide public support out there, all that support in the world could not keep Senate Bill No. 22 from being what I call, "Harrisburged." Mr. President, I use this term to describe what happens to good, bipartisan initiatives that have near universal support and yet go nowhere because of legislative, whether it is double speak, lack of will, and/or back-door gamesmanship.

While I will continue to fight to change the way we draw our legislative boundaries, the frustration of June's events reinforces my belief that we need to empower our citizens to act on their own when their elected officials are suffering from a paralysis of power. In all States where politician redistricting commissions were replaced with independent citizen commissions, the people acted on their own accord through the power of initiative. We should do that here in Pennsylvania. With this in mind, I have proposed a constitutional amendment that gives the people the power to initiate a referendum to place an issue directly on the ballot that they deem important, bypassing the legislature altogether. Public preference should trump political prowess every time. When Harrisburg is incapable of acting, Pennsylvania voters should have the means to force action, break procedural logjams, and foil the political games. Now, to protect against hasty or reckless referendums, my bill would mandate certain steps

before citizens could place an issue on the ballot. It would require signatures based on 5 percent of the total number of voters cast in the most recent Governor's election, plus those signatures would need to be gathered from at least 45 different counties. While not easy, Mr. President, my bill still would empower Pennsylvanians to effectuate real change, not just plead for it from their elected officials.

Our State Constitution makes it abundantly clear where all the power resides and states in no unmistakable terms, all the power is inherent in the people. Yet our legislative system lacks the most critical of tools for citizens to act and effectuate change. If you provide the people with direct initiative and referendum, issues such as tax fairness, property tax elimination, equity funding for schools, reducing the size of the legislature, and redistricting reform could be implemented by Pennsylvanians when their leaders fail to act. Allowing citizens to bypass the legislature and entrenched Harrisburg interest is our best opportunity for real reform. Pennsylvanians deserve that power, the power and the right to take issues directly to that ballot box. Pennsylvania will be a much stronger democracy when the people can occasionally express their will on an issue at the ballot box. So let us try to get this done when we go into our new legislative Session and really empower the people. Thank you.

Mr. President, I rise to speak to House Bill No. 1497, Printer's No. 4300, which, in part, amends and modifies the existing casino liquor license provisions in the Liquor Code. From the information I have received, our chairman of the Liquor Committee, through his staff, have confirmed several key facts about the amendment. First, the license fee charged for a casino liquor license has been amended to be economically viable, which will support the competitiveness of our gaming industry and generate needed non-tax revenue for the Commonwealth. Second, the ability to serve alcohol 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, has been limited to the casinos only, not to third parties, and will be restricted to anywhere within the casino building that is under the casino's control. Finally, casinos that obtain a casino liquor license will continue to be able to sell and serve alcohol anywhere on the grounds of the casino between the standard liquor license hours of 7 a.m. on a given day until 2 a.m. on the following day. Based on these confirmations, I will support the bill, which is important to growing the jobs and revenue generated by our gaming industry and is in the best interests of our Commonwealth and the public.

Over in the House we had Representative Marsico of the House Committee on Judiciary; we had Representative Saylor, the chairman of the Committee on Appropriations; we had Representative Reed and Speaker Turzai helping us out; the DA Association; the Pennsylvania Motor Truck Association; the DUI Association; magisterial district judges, and a very important group of people, which I will save until the end.

Pennsylvania is consistently ranked as one of the most lenient States for DUI laws. This bill will start moving us up into the category with our sister States as those getting tough on DUI cases here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with DUI convictions. Senate Bill No. 961, this legislation includes three key provisions that increase penalties for repeat DUI offenders who continue to break our laws. Felony penalty for third time DUI conviction within 10 years if the third offense is a high blood alcohol content of .16 or higher. Increased penalties for homicide by vehicle while DUI, which is currently a 3-year minimum sentence regardless of the offender's DUI history, 2nd offense or 17th offense, 3 years. Specifically, this bill if convicted of a prior DUI, the minimum sentence for causing a death is 5 years. Or, if convicted of two or more prior DUIs, the minimum sentence for causing a death is now 7 years. Increased penalties for driving under the DUI-related license suspension.

Senator BROWNE. Mr. President, I urge my colleagues today to concur in House amendments to Senate Bill No. 1098, which allows cameras on school bus stop arms to be used as a tool for enforcement of the Vehicle Code relating to meeting and overtaking a school bus. The legislation also provides for a surcharge on the penalty for a violation of the statute to be deposited into the School Bus Safety Grant Program, which will enable school districts and independent contractors to apply for grants to offset the costs of installing cameras on buses. Mr. President, current law requires a school bus operator to report violations to the police within 48 hours of the school bus driver observing a violation. The information that the school bus operator must provide includes information pertaining to the identity of the driver, license number, and color of the vehicle involved in the violation, amongst other things. However, Mr. President, as you are aware, school bus operators are primarily responsible for the safety of children on the bus and may not have the ability to provide the necessary information to warrant a citation being issued for a violation of the statute. Stop-arm cameras will enable the camera to collect the necessary information when there is a violation. Use of a stop-arm camera is safe and proven technology and can increase the accountability of drivers and remove the burden of a school bus operator to report violations.

At least 15 States have school bus stop-arm camera laws, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures. Pennsylvania school districts transport over 1.5 million school students daily. This includes all schools, private and public. Ac-

According to the Department of Transportation, Pennsylvania has fortunately not experienced a student fatality on a school bus since 1993. However, as recently as Tuesday of this week in Exeter Township, a 6-year-old child was exiting a school bus when an SUV disregarded the school bus stop signs and red flashing lights and passed it, striking the child. The vehicle fled the scene and the girl was transported to Reading Hospital, where she was treated for her injuries. The police are still looking for this hit-and-run driver. This is exactly why Senate Bill No. 1098 is necessary, to insure the safety of students by allowing cameras on school buses to be used as an additional tool to enforce violations of this important statute.

GUEST OF SENATOR PATRICK M. BROWNE
PRESENTED TO THE SENATE

Senator BROWNE. Mr. President, I am sure that Members of the Senate will agree that the best ideas for positive change come from citizens we represent together motivated to influence positive change and make a difference. My constituent, Amber Clark, who is here in the gallery today, met with me in my district office less than a year ago to discuss the possibility of this legislation after she witnessed vehicles continuing to ignore the school bus stop sign as she waited for her daughter to board and exit the bus at an Allentown school bus stop. She studied the issue, did extensive research, and developed proposals to address a true safety hazard for all Pennsylvania schoolchildren. The result? The introduction of Senate Bill No. 1098, which I am proud to carry for her as it becomes, with the support of my colleagues this evening, the law of the Commonwealth. She is a model, a true model for what our representative democratic process can and should always be, and today, due to her hard work and commitment, Pennsylvania will be a safer place for all our school-aged children. Mr. President, join me in honoring Amber Clark, as I ask all the Members of the Senate to support Senate Bill No. 1098.
