Westley Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge, identified as Bridge Key 48976, on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 669 that crosses the Casselman River at the west end of Ord Street, Salisbury Borough, Somerset County, as the Sergeant Stephen M. Minick Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge, identified as Bridge Key 31586, on that portion of State Route 2004 carrying Broadway Street over the Casselman River, in Summit Township, Somerset County, as the Airman Michael L. Menser Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge, identified as Bridge Key 15279, on that portion of State Route 2025, also known as Morton Avenue, over Stony Creek in Morton Borough, Delaware County, as the Captain Michael Malinowski, Sr., Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of State Route 2012 in Monroe County as the Reverend Dr. Bishop William Earl Lee Highway; designating the bridge on I-70 in Westmoreland County over the Youghiogheny River as the Matthew Smelser Memorial Bridge; designating the portion of County Line Road (SR 2038) between N. Warminster Road and Newtown Road in Bucks County as the Captain William J. Ahlum Memorial Highway; and designating the portion of County Line Road (SR 2038) between N. Warminster Road and Jacksville Road in Bucks County, as the Specialist 4 Harold E. Cashman Memorial Highway.

Senator SABATINA offered the following amendment No. A6158:

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 4 through 6, by striking out all of lines 4 and 5 and "O'CONNOR MEMORIAL HIGHWAY" in line 6 and inserting:

designating the portion of State Route 1015, also known as Knights Road, between State Route 63 and U.S. Route 13 in the City of Philadelphia as the Sergeant James O'Connor IV Memorial Highway

Amend Bill, page 3, lines 24 through 30; page 4, lines 1 through 17; by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting:  
Section 2. Sergeant James O'Connor IV Memorial Highway.

(a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

(1) Sergeant James O'Connor IV, Badge #8162, was a 23-year veteran of the Philadelphia Police Department and a 15-year veteran of the City's SWAT Unit.

(2) On March 13, 2020, Sergeant James O'Connor IV was shot and killed in the line of duty at 46 years of age while serving a homicide warrant in the Frankford neighborhood of Philadelphia.

(3) He was posthumously promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

(4) The Governor ordered the Commonwealth flag on all public facilities Statewide to be flown at half-staff in honor of Sergeant James O'Connor IV.

(5) Sergeant James O'Connor IV dedicated his life to public service and his memory shall inspire future generations of law enforcement throughout this Commonwealth.

(b) Designation.--The portion of State Route 1015, also known as Knights Road, between State Route 63 and U.S. Route 13 in the City of Philadelphia is designated the Sergeant James O'Connor IV Memorial Highway.

(c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain two appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to traffic in both directions on the highway. The Department of Transportation shall also erect and maintain two additional signs located in the center traffic island on State Route 1015, also known as Knights Road, immediately adjacent to 11024 Knights Road in the City of Philadelphia displaying the name of the highway to traffic in both directions on the highway.

Senator SABATINA. Mr. President, this is a technical amendment that changes geographic locations in the bill.

Amend Bill, page 1, line 24, by inserting after "BOARD;":  
in independent fiscal office, further providing for additional duties;

Amend Bill, page 3, by inserting between lines 19 and 20:

Section 2. Section 615-B(a) of the act is amended and the section is amended by adding a subsection to read:  
Section 615-B. Additional duties.

Actuarial notes shall include a reliable estimate of the financial and actuarial effect of the proposed change in any pension or retirement system. The financial analysis contained in actuarial notes for legislation that proposes substantial benefit design changes under 24 Pa.C.S. Pt. IV (relating to retirement for school employees) and 71 Pa.C.S. Pt. XXV (relating to retirement for State employees and officers) shall include, but not be limited to, a risk transfer analysis and, if requested by an officer listed in this subsection, an analysis of the potential impact on the asset allocation and related costs for the systems. The actuarial note shall be factual, and shall, if possible, provide a reliable estimate of both the immediate cost and effect of the bill and, if determinable or reasonably foreseeable, the long-range actuarial cost and effect of the bill. The State Employees' Retirement System or the Public School Employees' Retirement System shall provide the office with all information necessary to complete an actuarial note within 14 days of the request for information by the office. The office shall transmit actuarial notes in electronic form to the Governor and all members of the General Assembly within the time periods specified under this section upon the request of any of the following:

(1) The President pro tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

(2) The Majority Leader or the Minority Leader of the Senate.

(3) The Majority Leader or the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives.

(4) The chairperson or minority chairperson of the Appropriations Committee of the Senate.

(5) The chairperson or minority chairperson of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives.

(6) The chairperson or minority chairperson of the standing committee of the Senate to which the bill is referred.

(7) The chairperson or minority chairperson of the standing committee of the House of Representatives to which the bill is referred.

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(1) Submission of baseline data.--No later than October 1, 2020, July 31, 2021, and July 31 of each year thereafter, the State Employees' Retirement System and the Public School Employees' Retirement System shall each submit to the office data showing the 30-year baseline projections for the retirement systems based on the State law in effect at the time of the submission. The office may specify the data fields and the file format for the data to be transmitted under this subsection. Data submitted under this subsection shall include projections which simulate a 1.0 percentage point increase and a 1.0 percentage point decrease to the official assumed rate of return used by each retirement system.

(iii) The owner may not attempt to transfer responsibility more than one time using this procedure.

(iv) If a person other than the owner denies the person was the driver and declines responsibility, a new notice shall be issued to the owner which shall include the following:

(A) a statement that the other person declined responsibility; and

(B) a provision allowing for the option of paying the civil fine or contesting the violation by a stated date that shall not be less than 20 days from the mailing of the new notice.

(v) The person receiving the notice shall be responsible for payment of the civil fine unless the person either:

(A) returns a signed statement on a form provided with the notice of violation that the person was not the driver and declining responsibility, in which case responsibility for the violation shall revert to the owner; or

(B) admits to being the driver but denies committing the violation, in which case the person may contest the notice of violation in the same manner as the owner may contest the violation.

(2) The following shall apply to payment of fine:

(i) An owner may admit responsibility for the violation and pay the fine as indicated on the notice of violation.

(ii) Payment of the fine shall operate as a final disposition of the civil penalty.

(iii) If payment is not received or the owner has not contested liability within 30 days of original notice, the police department may turn the matter over to the Magisterial District Judge where the violation occurred. The Magisterial District Judge may assess liability upon the owner for failure to pay the fine or contest liability.

(3) The following shall apply to contesting liability or notice:

(1) An owner may, within 30 days of the mailing of the notice, contest liability in person or by mailing a request in writing on the prescribed form, raising a defense listed under subsection (f).

(ii) If an owner contests the notice of violation and completes payment of applicable civil filing fees, the primary police department shall file the notice of violation and supporting documents with

the Magisterial District Judge where the violation occurred, and the court shall hear and decide the matter.

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**PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES**

The PRESIDENT. Senator Tartaglione has submitted remarks for the record. Without objection, the remarks will be spread upon the record.

*(The following prepared remarks were made part of the record at the request of the gentlewoman from Philadelphia, Senator TARTAGLIONE:)*

Mr. President, today marks 5,098 days since the Pennsylvania legislature last raised the minimum wage. That is almost 14 years, and it is far too long.

Virtually all of us in the Commonwealth and across America have been forced to curtail our activities in recent months to mitigate the negative public health impacts of COVID-19. Yet economists have been hard at work continuing their research on the minimum wage. As you know, minimum wage has been one of the most-researched topics in economics for decades, with literally hundreds of published studies examining its effects on employment, worker productivity, profits, poverty, and other crucial measures of our well-being. In recent weeks, two new studies have begun to gain widespread attention--including coverage by *The New York Times*--due largely to their direct implications for the current pandemic, and perhaps future public health emergencies that befall our society. One study focused on pay rates at nursing homes, and the other at department stores. Each of these studies--one led by a Ph.D. in economics and visiting scholar at the Minnesota Federal Reserve, and the other by a team of economists from Northwestern University and the University of Montreal--found that higher pay for employees improves their productivity and the level of service they provide. Importantly, the studies also showed no negative effects on employment rates of employer profits.

In the nursing home study, these improvements led to fewer medical complications for residents in homes with higher wage scales, and lower mortality rates. For the purposes of this study, the researcher analyzed hundreds of State-level and local minimum wage increases across the country from 1990 through 2017. She then compared employment in neighboring counties with different minimum wage rates. This is the same method pioneered in the early 1990s by economists from Princeton and Cal-Berkeley who examined fast-food employment in neighboring counties after New Jersey raised its minimum wage but Pennsylvania did not.

In the new nursing home study, the researcher concluded improved pay made the jobs more attractive, which resulted in a higher employee retention rate. In fact, higher minimum wages had a ripple effect on the pay rates of other higher-paying positions within the nursing homes. Reduced employee turnover led to improved continuity of patient care and better outcomes.

The second study highlighted by *The Times* involved localized minimum wage increases across a single department store chain with 2,000 locations across the nation. For this study, researchers examined data from 2012 through 2015. Employees with higher wages showed improved job performance measured by the amount of sales revenue they generated per hour of work.

Mr. President, these studies represent two of the largest and historically lowest-paid employment sectors in the country, and they demonstrate points that minimum wage advocates--notably the members of Business for a Fair Minimum Wage--have been making for years. Higher wages improve employee retention, employee performance, and consumer satisfaction. They improve the reputation of companies, improve sales, and improve profits. For far too long, Pennsylvania has been missing out on these benefits as all our neighboring States and 29 States across the country have raised their minimum wages above the paltry \$7.25 an hour mandated by the Federal government. It is time that we raise Pennsylvania's minimum wage to a fair, family-sustaining, and competitive level.
