HOUSE RESOLUTION 22

(By Delegate Howell)
[Introduced April 7, 2021]

Calling for the construction of a licensed Off Highway Vehicle semi-contiguous trail to parallel the Appalachian Hiking Trail on the western side.

Whereas, the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis shows that the outdoor recreation economy accounted for 2.2 percent (\$412 billion) of current-dollar GDP in 2016; and

Whereas, in 2017 Backcountry Discovery Routes generated \$17.3 million in new tourism expenditures, with the average traveling party spending \$3,769 per trip; and

Whereas, The construction of a licensed Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) semi-contiguous trail to parallel the Appalachian Hiking Trail on the western side connecting existing OHV trails, and off-road parks where possible, would bring in significant tourism dollars. The proposed trail should enter West Virginia in the southern part of the state and exit in the Potomac Highlands; and

Whereas, The Legislature believes that the OHV trail will generate much needed economic stimulus to the state, create new jobs and increase tax revenue; therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Delegates:

That the construction of a licensed Off Highway Vehicle semi-contiguous trail to parallel the Appalachian Hiking Trail on the western side should be a high priority for State Government; and, be it

Further Resolved, That the construction of a licensed Off Highway Vehicle semi-contiguous trail to parallel the Appalachian Hiking Trail on the western side can be supported by all West Virginians; and, be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the House forward a copy of this resolution to the Governor and the state legislatures of the states where the Appalachian Trail traverses, Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine with the addition of Alabama which lies to the west of Georgia and the trail.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Indiana, Senator Pittman.

Senator PITTMAN. Mr. President, as we continue to unpack the collateral damage caused by this pandemic, we have found that the collateral damage has been no more significantly felt than in our volunteer fire service. Our volunteer fire companies often rely on large gatherings to raise funds to keep their doors open and to keep their lights on. When the pandemic hit and the closures began, they instantly lost that opportunity.

Senate Bill No. 243 is designed to allow our volunteer fire services to raise funds online. Many of them have begun to do that already. We found that there is, perhaps, some question in current law as to whether or not that is proper. So with the work of Senator Yudichak and his committee, we have crafted Senate Bill No. 243 to allow our volunteer fire services to raise money online through the life of the emergency declaration or until May 1, 2022, whichever is later. I believe we have reached a solid agreement on this. It is a temporary situation, and I ask my colleagues for an affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. President.

SB 341 (Pr. No. 375) -- The Senate proceeded to consideration of the bill, entitled:

An Act amending Title 66 (Public Utilities) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in alternative form of regulation of telecommunications services, further providing for additional powers and duties of commission.

Considered the third time and agreed to,

On the question, Shall the bill pass finally?

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from York, Senator Phillips-Hill.

Senator PHILLIPS-HILL. Mr. President, I rise in support of Senate Bill No. 341. This bill would modernize and streamline Pennsylvania's regulations that apply to our landline telephone companies.

As this Chamber works to close the digital divide, this is a critical tool that is much needed by landline telephone companies. Many of the regulations that exist in our Public Utility Code have been in place for decades. However, we have seen sweeping changes to the technology and communications landscape, making these costly requirements unnecessary. This bill would permanently waive regulations from 52 Pa. Code Chapter 53, Sections 53.57 to 60, which are tariff filing requirements for incumbent local exchange carriers; Section 53.85 that regulates paper billing fees; and all of Chapters 63 and 64, which deal with telephone standards of billing practices for telephone services. Please know that the commission would retain oversight as it pertains to customer complaints, 911, relay service, slamming and cramming, and universal service. The commission would also be required to review its telecommunications regulations every 3 years and eliminate all regulations that are no longer necessary or in the public interest.

Pennsylvania's landline telephone companies now represent less than 10 percent of voice subscriptions in the State and are subject to a strict regulatory framework based on outdated technology no longer being used by the majority of Pennsylvanians. Let me be crystal clear, Senate Bill No. 341 is not full deregulation. The obligations to provide voice service, rate regulation, and other quality-of-service metrics are all accounted for within the bill. I respectfully request an affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Senator Kane.

Senator KANE. Mr. President, I rise to oppose Senate Bill No. 341. I am concerned with several provisions including reduced oversight, accountability, and consumer protection for telecommunication providers and customers. This bill is opposed by the Office of Consumer Advocate, the AARP, the CWA, and the IBEW.

Senate Bill No. 341 would preempt the work that the Public Utility Commission has already begun to modernize these regu-

lations. Currently the PUC is working on developing new regulations with input from stakeholders including the Office of Consumer Advocate, the CWA, and the IBEW, who represent the majority of unionized telecom workers in Pennsylvania. The public comment process, which has lasted over a month, ends today, meaning the PUC has the opportunity to begin modernizing the regulations with actual public input. We should let them finish their job.

Further, I would remind my colleagues that we work for Pennsylvanians, not the telecom companies. In the 1990s, telecom companies said that if we decreased regulations, they would build out high-speed broadband infrastructures to all Pennsylvania communities. We did that. They did not. In the early 2000s, telecom companies said if we amend Chapter 30 to provide more regulatory relief, they would build out high-speed broadband infrastructure to all Pennsylvania communities. We did. They did not. In fact, at our hearing on these issues a few weeks ago, the president of one of Pennsylvania's telecom companies specifically said that expanding access to broadband was, quote, not their job. That means it has to be ours.

Communities without sufficient access to broadband, they exist in all our districts, from Chester County, where I live, to parts of Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, to rural parts of York and Cumberland Counties. While my colleagues on the other side of the aisle are calling this bill a broadband bill, I would note that the word "broadband" does not appear a single time in this legislation. I am concerned this legislation is an effort to preempt the work the PUC is already doing and benefit telecom companies without increasing services to Pennsylvanians. I urge a "no" vote. Thank you.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes, for the second time, the gentlewoman from York, Senator Phillips-Hill.

Senator PHILLIPS-HILL. Mr. President, I would like to address some of the concerns raised by the gentleman from Chester County, particularly with regard to consumer protections. It should be noted that current regulations allow for a convoluted and confusing process whereby a customer can file a complaint with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission without ever having spoken with their provider. Pennsylvania's traditional landline telcos have experienced customers who are confused with billing and termination regulations currently in effect, and often it is difficult for the customer to know where they stand with regard to their service, and this uncertainty leads to additional and unnecessary complaints. Senate Bill No. 341 establishes a process whereby a customer contacting the PUC is immediately directed to their provider who then has 30 days to resolve the customer's issue.

In a highly competitive marketplace where traditional landline providers serve less than 10 percent of the voice subscriptions in Pennsylvania, the incentive to keep customers satisfied is at an all time high. While current regulations provide for a confrontational and litigious framework to address customer complaints, Senate Bill No. 341 requires the commission to offer mediation as an alternative to resolve a complaint if the company and the customer cannot work out a solution. If mediation does not work for the customer, there is nothing in this legislation that prohibits the customer from filing a complaint with the commission, an option which does not exist currently for the customers who have voluntarily chosen to subscribe to services from a competing telecommunications provider. It should be noted that we worked

with stakeholders to improve the consumer protection provisions in this version of the legislation this Session.

With regard to modernized telecom regulation and the timelines with which the PUC has been working under, the modernizing of Pennsylvania's telecom regulations was actually proposed by the PUC in 2015. Three years later, in 2018, the PUC opened an advance notice of proposed rulemaking, which did not propose any specific regulatory changes, but rather sought input from interested parties. The commission specifically stated at that time that it would advance a formal notice of proposed rulemaking upon consideration of the comments filed. In February of 2020, the PUC again solicited comments on the matter. Now, in April in 2020, it has been over 5 years since they began consideration of this rulemaking.

I think that the time is now for the General Assembly to lead and pass this legislation to assure that the regulations and the rules regarding outdated telephone regulations are modernized to assist all Pennsylvanians and help close the digital divide.

Senator PHILLIPS-HILL. Mr. President, I rise in support of Senate Bill No. 442. Mr. President, this bill would require the Department of General Services to conduct an inventory of all department, agency, commission, or institution-owned communication towers, poles, buildings, and facilities to leverage existing State-owned assets for the provisioning of high speed broadband Internet to unserved and underserved areas.

This bill would also request, but not mandate, our counties to also conduct a full inventory of county-owned assets. This is not a mandate on our counties, but merely an option to assist in our State's efforts to bring high speed Internet to every resident in the State. Furthermore, this legislation would also pull in all new State revenue gained from a 20-year contract the administration entered into, which inserted a third party middleman to negotiate the lease of State-owned assets for carriers to utilize. This funding would be deposited into a newly created broadband services restricted account to further drive out investment to help close the digital divide.

We know that it will cost a significant amount of money to be successful in our bipartisan endeavor to drive high speed Internet to every corner of our Commonwealth. This bill avoids using taxpayer dollars to address this issue and instead uses new revenue coming in through this contract entered into by the State. I respectfully request an affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Senator Kane.

Senator KANE. Mr. President, I rise to oppose Senate Bill No. 442 in its current form. I want to be perfectly clear. The goal of this bill is good, and we need real resolutions to expand and improve broadband access to underserved and unserved areas, especially in our rural communities; but Senate Bill No. 442 does not get us to that point.

I want to emphasize the concerns of the Department of General Services, which opposes this bill. First, they already completed an inventory of assets, making this part of the bill redundant. Further, DGS oversees the Commonwealth's effort to expand and improve broadband capacity and allows communication providers to co-locate on Commonwealth property, at fair market rates, to allow for increased broadband expansion. Finally, the restricted revenue account raises concerns for State agencies who receive compensation for the lease of their assets.

As I said before, we need to be working to ensure broadband access to all underserved Pennsylvanians. This bill does not get us there currently. It is my understanding and hope that there may be work done on this bill in the House. Until there are further amendments to improve the bill, I will be voting "no" and I urge my colleagues as well. Thank you.

PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Washington, Senator Bartolotta.

Senator BARTOLOTTA. Mr. President, the safety of all Pennsylvania motorists is an issue of enduring consequence. Motorcyclists have the same rights and privileges as all other motor vehicles on the roadway. During Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month and throughout the year, drivers of other vehicles and all road users are reminded to safely share the road with motorcyclists and be extra alert to keep motorcyclists safe. Pennsylvanians are encouraged to spread the word about increasing motorcyclists' safety, support, and enhance motorcycle safety awareness programs and enjoy the use of motorcycles while practicing utmost safety.

Our economy benefits from nearly 380,000 registered motorcycles and more than 810,000 licensed motorcycle operators, all of whom are required to keep their motorcycles inspected and obey laws relating to operator safety and equipment. Statistics reported last year by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation show that more than 3,000 motorcycle accidents occurred in the Commonwealth in 2019, resulting in approximately 170 fatalities.

In addition to drivers being vigilant on the roadways for motorcyclists, we can all take another important step to prevent one of the most dangerous and preventable hazards for them, grass clippings on roadways. Grass clippings can cause the surface of a roadway to become extremely slippery, like hitting an unexpected sheet of ice. A number of motorcycle accidents resulting in catastrophic injury, paralysis, or even death have been attributed to grass clippings. That is why I sponsored legislation in the past prohibiting grass clippings from roadways, which is an easy, commonsense solution to a deadly problem. Land owners have the right to manage and maintain their property as they see fit, but they also have the responsibility to ensure that they do not create a lethal hazard for other motorists on public roadways by being negligent. Despite inevitable accidents, motorcycle opera-

tors continue to promote highway safety and encourage other motor vehicle operators to recognize and participate in motorcycle safety training.

Throughout the month of May, the Pennsylvania Motorcycle Safety Program, Alliance of Bikers Aimed Toward Education of Pennsylvania, or ABATE, and the Pennsylvania Motorcycle Dealers Association are continuing their advocacy of motorcycle safety. That is the intent of Senate Resolution No. 113, which designates May 2021 as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month in Pennsylvania. Let us all do our part to acknowledge such an important issue as public safety.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Luzerne, Senator Baker.

Senator BAKER. Mr. President, today I rise to recognize May as Summer Camp Month in Pennsylvania. The Memorial holiday is often viewed as the unofficial start to summer. It is also viewed as the start of summer camp season here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As we gear up for the coming weekend, our camps are busy preparing to welcome and bring smiles to new and returning campers.

While the Pocono region is the heart of summer camps, sometimes we are known as the summer camp capital of the world. Hundreds of camps operate around our entire State each year, providing learning and recreational opportunities for tens of thousand in-State and out-of-State youth. Last summer, due to COVID-19, summer camps were not permitted to open. It caused challenges and difficulties for camp owners and for many children and their families. They are joined by so many of our small businesses that experienced devastating effects during the pandemic shutdown. Following the long-awaited announcement in March, Pennsylvania summer camps were given the green light to reopen for the 2021 season. It is clear that this year the camp owners are preparing to reopen with full safety accommodations, utilizing an enhanced mitigation approach developed in consultation with the American Camp Association. Over the weekend, I had the opportunity to visit one of those camps, Camp IHC in Equinunk, during what they call Community Day. It was a wonderful opportunity to observe, firsthand, all the activities and opportunities of this camp, and the excitement as a great deal of hard work and preparations have been underway for a successful 2021 season.

Summer camps offer a tremendous amount of fun and adventure to allow children to explore and engage in new experiences, while helping to emphasize the importance of service projects and working together. In addition to the positive social aspects, the summer camp industry is a vital part of northeastern Pennsylvania's economy, and the State economy as well. In fact, the American Camp Association in 2017 indicated that Pennsylvania's 710 registered camps have a direct economic impact of over \$410 million, and in northeastern Pennsylvania, a similar study said that we had \$123 million economic impact in our four-county region. That includes employment, spending for payroll, goods, services, food, supplies, maintenance, and fuel. Camps are tourist destinations, attracting visitors spending on meals, lodging, shopping, and recreation, and many families come back year after year, and some come and relocate. Last year we lost this incredible industry. It hurt our communities and this industry. So, this year, our camps will now have an opportunity to play a role in restoring the economic stability of our re-

gion and our State as we continue to work together to assist in the recovery of all small businesses.

So I would ask that you please join me in recognizing the summer camp industry and the important role that it plays across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster, Senator Martin.

Senator MARTIN. Mr. President, I rise today to highlight my Senate Resolution No. 119, which, if adopted, would designate May 2021 as Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome Awareness Month, otherwise known as EDS Awareness Month in Pennsylvania. EDS is characterized as a group of genetic disorders affecting connective tissue in the body. It manifests itself with individuals appearing to have loose skin; instability; constant dislocations of joints; and fragile, often hyperelastic skin that bruises, scars, and tears easily. In some cases, EDS can cause unpredictable arterial and organ ruptures that can lead to acute pain, excessive internal bleeding, shock, stroke, and, unfortunately, premature death. While not commonly known, there are approximately 200,000 cases of EDS diagnosed in the United States each year.

Mr. President, Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome was first brought to my attention by a grieving family in my district who lost their beautiful young daughter to this condition. I stand here today in her memory in the hopes of drawing attention to EDS, to help increase attention towards research and combating the condition, and to tell those out there that the network of EDS support groups do exist to help.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Philadelphia, Senator Tartaglione.

Senator TARTAGLIONE. Mr. President, today marks 5,435 days since the Pennsylvania legislature last raised the minimum wage. Mr. President, that is almost 15 years, and it is far too long.

Mr. President, this morning, several of my Democratic colleagues and I were part of a news conference in which we addressed some of the misunderstandings and misrepresentations that have been circulating lately about the labor market and the working people of our country. Normally, we would not want to amplify baseless and largely disrespectful rhetoric by repeating it. But, this is one of those cases when falsehoods must be nipped in the bud before they grow into conventional wisdom.

Mr. President, there is no so-called labor shortage in America or in Pennsylvania, despite all the help wanted signs that seem to be popping up in shop windows across the Commonwealth and despite all the headlines that seem to be reinforcing public anxiety over the issue. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. nonfarm employment reached an all-time high in February 2020, just before the pandemic, with 152.5 million jobs. Then, in the first 2 months of the pandemic, we lost 22.3 million jobs, about 1 in every 7. Yet, in the last year, we have regained almost two-thirds of those lost jobs. Employment has grown at a record pace, almost 10 percent in the last 12 months. Labor force participation tells a similar story. It fell by more than 3 percent in the early weeks of the pandemic but has now rebounded significantly and has gained two-tenths of a point in the last month alone. In other words, the hard data simply does not support the notion that American workers or Pennsylvanians are somehow hard to find. Data also contradicts the widely reported anecdotal accounts that employers far and wide are raising wages to generate more worker interest in job openings.

The official numbers from the Federal government tell us that the real average hourly earnings have actually decreased by 3.7

percent since April 2020, when the massive public health threat of an essentially unknown virus caused all but the most essential functions of society to shut down, and when many essential workers began collecting temporary hazard pay. One of the main reasons that average wages have fallen so much since then, perhaps the most important reason, is that so many of the low-wage workers who lost their jobs in the early weeks of the pandemic are now returning to work in record numbers. We know that low-wage workers, especially women and minority workers, were the ones most affected by layoffs. When they lost their jobs all at once, the nation's average wage shot up. Now, the opposite effect is happening. The rapid growth of our low-wage workforce is drawing the average wage down again, and it has become very clear that even as many employers complained about so-called labor shortages, they still are not raising wages to meet the demand. As I said earlier today during a press conference, employers who for so long have evoked the concept of the free market to argue raising the minimum wage are now resisting the very same market forces as they desperately struggle to suppress wages. Even after spending the last 14 months fighting to survive the pandemic, they still are not willing to adjust to the new reality. That is one of the reasons we need to finally raise Pennsylvania's minimum wage.

Mr. President, after almost 15 years, we need it more now than ever. We must compel all employers, even the reluctant ones, to pay fair, family-sustaining wages for the benefit of Pennsylvania's workers and for the benefit of our statewide economy.

GUEST OF SENATOR ROBERT B. MENSCH PRESENTED TO THE SENATE

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Senator Mensch.

Senator MENSCH. Mr. President, today it is my pleasure to introduce Ms. Isabella Yackanicz, who is currently job shadowing at my Red Hill district office. Isabella is a senior at Perkiomen Valley High School and plans to attend George Washington University in the fall. She plans to study political science and international affairs, as well as Spanish. Isabella is highly involved in theater and music as she is part of several choirs at school and also loves running her high school TV broadcasting studio.

Thank you, Mr. President, and please join me in welcoming Isabella Yackanicz to the Senate today.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Montgomery, Senator Muth.

Senator MUTH. Mr. President, today I planned on speaking about pension reform memos that I had recently introduced. I have had a change of heart due to today's events. I wanted to acknowledge the survivors who have been in this building for the last 48 hours, as well as for the last decade or so, advocating for a window for justice from child sex abuse trauma. I cannot leave the Chamber today without acknowledging them, all of them, every single one of them.

We know that 1 in 5 girls and 1 in 3 boys will be a victim of sexual abuse, and these people are living examples of that trauma. This impacts the rest of their entire lives. These are people that took decades to come forward to report their trauma. The average age of a child sexual abuse victim to report trauma is age 52. Dealing with this kind of trauma is heavy, and yet they still take time off of work, drive from out of State--being lifelong Pennsylvanians--driving all over the Commonwealth trying to advocate on this issue. Again, they left this building with no commitment for their rightful pathway to justice and healing.

There is a bill that sits on second consideration on our legislative Calendar that could easily be brought up for a vote today or tomorrow. I am not above begging, standing here at a podium and saying that those with the power to run the Calendar need to run that bill. It should have been run a long time ago and you have the power to make someone's life better. You should use it. I advocate for this entire Chamber to think about that. Not just think about it; remember, that is our job, to fight for the people we represent. I hope that tomorrow when I get the marked Calendar that that bill is set to run.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Senator Street.

Senator STREET. Mr. President, I rise to remind us that we still have work to be done. Today marks a full year since the murder of George Floyd, and we have made some progress. We have passed legislation that has begun to reform our system, but we have so much work to be done. We still do not have uniform standards, which would prevent the actions that were used to murder George Floyd. We can all take some solace in that the justice system in Minnesota worked, and Derek Chauvin was convicted. However, there is much work to be done. This Chamber and this body took a major step last year by passing comprehensive use-of-force provisions that would have banned choke holds and standardized MOPAC training for all officers and all agencies throughout this Commonwealth. Yet, that legislation languished and died in the House. I have reintroduced that legislation as Senate Bill No. 142. This and other measures need to be taken.

I remind my colleagues and this body that there are still people who are concerned about the death that they see. There are still people who are concerned that we have not passed comprehensive use-of-force legislation. There are still people who watch what happens on television and wonder, when will enough be enough? When will we have moved forward with comprehensive use-of-force legislation? I implore my colleagues to bring up Senate Bill No. 142, which I have introduced, legislation which we unanimously passed last year. Then we need to pass it again out of this Chamber and do the work it takes to get it passed through the House. Because when we do that, we will restore a greater sense of confidence that our law enforcement system will be fair and measured in its use-of-force policies. When more people have confidence in our systems of law enforcement, we are, in fact, all better off.

So, on this most solemn occasion where we all watched the life of a man be squeezed out of his body--and so many were inspired to take to the streets to march, to protest, to vote--we must now do our duty by voting legislation through this Chamber to show the people of Pennsylvania that we can work in a bipartisan fashion; we can work to restore confidence in the justice

system; and we can work to pass comprehensive use-of-force legislation. I urge us to bring up Senate Bill No. 142. I urge my colleagues to vote affirmatively and then do the advocacy and the work it takes to make sure that we put that bill on the Governor's desk where it will be signed.
