BILLS REPORTED FROM COMMITTEES

Senator YAW, from the Committee on Environmental Resources and Energy, reported the following bills:

SB 286 (Pr. No. 260)

An Act amending the act of June 22, 1937 (P.L.1987, No.394), known as The Clean Streams Law, in other pollutions and potential pollution, providing for notice of discharge endangering public health or environment.

SB 831 (Pr. No. 921)

An Act providing for the injection of carbon dioxide into an underground reservoir for the purpose of carbon sequestration, for the ownership of pore space in strata below surface lands and waters of the Commonwealth, for conveyance of the surface ownership of real property; imposing duties on the Department of Environmental Protection; and establishing the Carbon Dioxide Storage Facility Fund.

Senator REGAN, from the Committee on Law and Justice, reported the following bills:

SB 260 (Pr. No. 935) (Amended)

An Act amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in wiretapping and electronic surveillance, further providing for definitions.

SB 538 (Pr. No. 936) (Amended)

An Act amending the act of April 17, 2016 (P.L.84, No.16), known as the Medical Marijuana Act, in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions; and, in program, further providing for lawful use of medical marijuana and for unlawful use of medical marijuana.

SB 730 (Pr. No. 815)

An Act providing for the Jayanna Powell Hit-and-Run Direct Notification System and for definitions; requiring registration of motor vehicle repair facilities; and imposing penalties.

SB 773 (Pr. No. 860)

An Act amending the act of April 17, 2016 (P.L.84, No.16), known as the Medical Marijuana Act, in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions; and, in medical marijuana organizations, further providing for limitations on permits and providing for additional dispensary permits authorized, for application and issuance of additional dispensary permits and for limitations on other additional permits or licenses.

SB 835 (Pr. No. 924)

An Act amending the act of April 17, 2016 (P.L.84, No.16), known as the Medical Marijuana Act, in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions; in program, further providing for program established, for confidentiality and public disclosure, for lawful use of medical marijuana and for unlawful use of medical marijuana; in practitioners, further providing for practitioner registration, for practitioner restrictions, for issuance of certification and for duration; in patients, further providing for identification cards, for verification and for contents of identification card; in medical marijuana organizations, further providing for granting of permit, for relocation and for limitations on permits; in medical marijuana controls, further providing for electronic tracking, for grower/processors, for storage and transportation, for laboratory and for prices and providing for recalls; in dispensaries, further providing for dispensing to patients and caregivers and for facility requirements; in tax on medical marijuana, further providing for Medical Marijuana Program Fund; in Medical Marijuana Advisory Board, further providing for advisory board; in research program, further providing for establishment of medical marijuana research program, for medical marijuana research program administration and for approval; in academic clinical research centers and clinical registrants, further providing for legislative findings and declaration of policy, for definitions and for clinical registrants and providing for termination of contract; and, in miscellaneous provisions, further providing for applicability.

SB 836 (Pr. No. 925)

An Act amending Title 53 (Municipalities Generally) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in employees, further providing for definitions and for powers and duties of commission.

SB 802 (Pr. No. 937) (Amended)

An Act amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), known as The Fiscal Code, establishing the Redevelopment Authority Startup Loan Program and the Redevelopment Authority Startup Fund.

Senator BARTOLOTTA. Mr. President, at this year's March 22 DEP budget hearing, I was pleased to hear Acting Secretary Richard Negrin state, and I quote, "I hate bullies. Whether you're a bully on [in] the playground or a regulatory bully." I was further gratified by the executive order signed by Governor Shapiro in February of this year that seeks to improve the Commonwealth's licensing, permitting, and certification processes to ensure efficient customer service from State agencies. Well, Senate Bill No. 198 is an important measure that will improve the quality of permits issued and the process for appeals through the Environmental Hearing Board in this Commonwealth. There are numerous examples of companies scrapping massive development plans in Pennsylvania because of a cumbersome permitting appeals process. We have lost billions of dollars of investment, hundreds of millions in tax revenue, and thousands of good-paying jobs due to a process that takes far too long, not because these projects are not safe and welcome in the communities that they are being proposed.

Under Senate Bill No. 198, the Department of Environmental Protection will have the option to create a record of decision, and that appeals from the decision be limited to issues raised during the public comment period and contained in that record. The legislation brings Pennsylvania in line with the Federal process for appealing EPA decisions, and this is a standard that already exists under Pennsylvania's Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act. So, this is not a new concept. All interested parties will continue to be afforded the opportunity to comment on the permit application, and the DEP will review these comments as part of its decision-making

process. In closing, our communities, businesses, and families need certainty and opportunity. It should not take longer to get a project through permitting and the appeals process than it takes to build the facility. I ask for an affirmative vote.

My amendment would also require that the details of any grant or loan made under this program are posted on the department's publicly accessible website. The details would include information about the name of the awardee and the amount of the grant or loan. The information on awards, applicants, and projects should be posted on a public-facing website and residents and taxpayers should not have to file Right-to-Know requests to get information about how their dollars are being spent. I am hopeful that--I was hopeful, let me correct myself--that this amendment would be agreed to, but unfortunately, there is some conflicting information that the Department of Community and Economic Development does not support this amendment, which is quite odd to me considering they themselves are a taxpayer-funded State agency. So, I, regardless, encourage an affirmative vote as I can attest that all of our constituents would like to know how their money is being spent.

It will allow State universities to more easily partner with engineering entities to ensure research capabilities, promote business alliances, produce high-value products, and create well-paying jobs. In fact, right in my district at the Pittsburgh airport, Neighborhood 91 is making progress as the first development in the world to condense and connect all components of additive manufacturing supply chain into one powerful production ecosystem. With examples like this and the opportunities Senate Bill No. 497 provides, there is real potential to establish Pennsylvania and its universities and business partnerships as international leaders in the development, testing, and implementation of cutting-edge advances in science and technology. We have worked closely with stakeholders over the past year, and it passed the Senate last Session with bipartisan support. Senate Bill No. 497 is supported by DCED, the Pittsburgh Airport, Allegheny County,

Neighborhood 91, Pittsburgh Works Together, and so many others. Thank you to my colleagues for your support of this important legislation, and I respectfully ask for an affirmative vote.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Montgomery, Senator Muth.

Senator MUTH. Mr. President, I rise in opposition to Senate Bill No. 497. While Senate Bill No. 497 could have some good intentions regarding partnering with our colleges and universities with expanding and growing certain helpful industries, the language itself of Senate Bill No. 497 is incredibly vague and leaves a lot of unanswered questions. Sometimes the devil is in the details here in the General Assembly, and without a clear understanding of what all eligible entities that could benefit from up to a \$2 million grant, I cannot support this bill. Many institutions, organizations, come to the State seeking funding for initiatives that help people and definitely expand economic development. Without information being posted on a public-facing website of who is awarded these grants and loans, the public who funds these programs would be left in the dark. They would have to file a Right-to-Know Law as my amendment to exempt that part of the bill just was tabled. I also received feedback from other stakeholders on how to improve this legislation. Two other requested amendments were to include project labor agreements with those seeking loan program funding. The other was to ensure that none of these projects increased any air, water, or soil pollution or contamination. Without these safeguards, the use of taxpayer money could end up not benefiting the public and also the public would not know who is actually using their money for these programs. And I do want to make a correction, as I received an email after I first tried to amend the bill, that the administration--I was told by the maker of the bill--said that the DCED was not supportive of my amendment, and I have an email here saying that they are in support of the amendment that was just tabled. So, I just want to state that for the public record for accuracy.

Senator LANGERHOLC. Mr. President, I rise to ask for support for Senate Bill No. 561. Senate Bill No. 561 exempts the newest model year vehicles from the emissions test for the first 5 years and bans a gas cap test if a subject vehicle is not manufactured with the gas cap. Mr. President, this is something that I have been advocating for since my first election to the Senate, and it is an issue that is very real in my home county of Cambria County, as well as many other counties throughout this Commonwealth. It is required in specifically 25 counties and makes zero sense and does not affect air quality standards with respect to the Commonwealth.

Newer vehicles are manufactured according to strict fuel efficiency standards from the EPA and, as such, there are over 21 million newer vehicles between 2010 and 2019 that pass the emissions test 99.65 percent of the time. And this is not a new idea; this is not a novel idea. In fact, other States have other exemptions for this testing: California--California, 8 years--8 years; Delaware, 5 years; New Jersey, 5 years. And I point out New Jersey and Delaware specifically because those are within the Ozone Transport Region, which is a common response when this legislation has been introduced multiple Sessions in a row. Those were approved to exempt newer vehicles from the emissions test. These laws that we have that were put in place are significantly outdated. They do not work; they do not have any impact on helping air quality. They are about as effective as putting onions on your feet when you are sick. Does not work, and it just leaves everybody with a bad smell. It is time to end this emissions testing, and I would ask for an affirmative vote for Senate Bill No. 561, and also Senate Bill No. 562 which follows, which is very close, but it exempts the specific counties from the emissions testing.

Senator ROTHMAN. Mr. President, Senate Bill No. 656 will simplify government for electric vehicle owners and ensure that all drivers are contributing towards the maintenance of Pennsylvania's roads and bridges. This bill exempts personal electric vehicles from paying the Alternative Fuels Tax and replaces that tax

with a flat annual fee of \$290, an amount that was calculated by using the average annual gas taxes paid by owners of gas-powered vehicles. In other words, if you drive about 1,000 miles a month, 12,000 miles a year, or drive a car that gets 25 miles per gallon and pay the 61 cents, you are paying about \$290. Like the gas tax, the revenue from this fee will be deposited into the Motor License Fund for highway and bridge maintenance and construction.

Mr. President, there are currently about 66,000 electric vehicles. Just in 2019, there were only 9,500 electric vehicles in Pennsylvania. As more and more people use electric vehicles for their personal vehicles, our roads and bridges will continue to be needed to be maintained and repaired. I think we can all agree that a core function of government is infrastructure and roads and bridges. Mr. President, this fee will generate about \$20 million a year just based on the current number of electric vehicles, and as more and more people go to electric vehicles, it will generate more money for our important roads and bridges in the Commonwealth. I urge my colleagues to vote "yes."

An Act amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), known as The Fiscal Code, in general budget implementation, further providing for Federal and Commonwealth use of forest land.

SB 740 (Pr. No. 856)

An Act amending the act of May 1, 1933 (P.L.103, No.69), known as The Second Class Township Code, in auditors and accountants, further providing for auditor's compensation.

SB 765 (Pr. No. 863)

PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Philadelphia, Senator Tartaglione.

Senator TARTAGLIONE. Mr. President, I rise because today marks 6,191 days since this Commonwealth's legislature last passed an increase in our minimum wage. In this Chamber, Mr. President, we have the opportunity to affect change for Pennsylvanians who need it most. We can, right now, act to ensure all Pennsylvanians earn a livable and dignified wage. Recently, Mr. President, a study was conducted by the National Low Income Housing Coalition to estimate the hourly wages necessary for full-time workers to afford either a 1- or 2-bedroom rental without paying more than 30 percent of their monthly income. The results are staggering, Mr. President. Full-time employees need to earn \$23.67 per hour to afford a fair market, 1-bedroom rental home without exceeding the 30 percent threshold. For a modest 2-bedroom rental, workers must earn \$28.58 an hour. Mr. President, that means workers earning minimum wage need to work 100 hours a week just to safely afford rent. Mr. President, I was not a math major in college, but from my perspective, expecting someone to work 2.5 times more than what we consider to be a full-time job just to afford somewhere to live is inhumane and disgusting. We must do better, Mr. President.

This, I will admit, is a twofold issue. First, affordable housing is at a critically low level, and to be sure, more needs to be done to ensure access to safe and affordable housing, and I welcome that conversation. But the other half of that heartbreaking math equation is the minimum wage; \$7.25 is just not a serious or reasonable minimum wage in 2023. That is why I introduced Senate Bill No. 12 because Pennsylvanians deserve better. Senate Bill No. 12 will more than double our minimum wage, which will help level the playing field. Pennsylvanians cannot continue to wait, Mr. President. Pennsylvanians deserve better than a poverty-level minimum wage. Pennsylvanians deserve Senate Bill No. 12.

Thank you, Mr. President.
