Dear Mr. Argall:

Thank you for your letter of August 22, 1995 concerning the placement of J.E.M. Classic Car Museum Tourist Oriented Directional Signs (T.O.D.S.) on US 209 at the intersection of PA 443 and on PA 309 at the intersection of PA 443.

The Department's T.O.D.S. Policy (copy attached for your information) permits the installation of signs to direct traffic from the nearest numbered traffic route to the businesses or services. If the nearest numbered traffic route has fewer than 1,500 Average Daily Traffic (A.D.T.), then signs may be installed on the next closest numbered traffic route exceeding 1,500 A.D.T.

Since the J.E.M. Classic Car Museum is located on PA 443, a numbered traffic route with an A.D.T. of over 8,000, I regret that the Department cannot honor the request for signs on US 209 and PA 309.

If I can be of any further assistance, please contact me.



TAMAQUA AREA 2004 PARTNERSHIP BYLAWS

ADOPTED MARCH 16, 1995

ARTICLE I: NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership.

ARTICLE II: MISSION

The mission of the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership is to be a proactive organization dedicated to the enhancement of the quality of life in the Tamaqua area. The Tamaqua Area includes the following municipalities: Rush Township, Schuylkill Township, Tamaqua Borough, Walker Township, and West Penn Township.

ARTICLE III: PURPOSE

Section 1

The Purpose of Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership is to work with interested citizens, elected and appointed officials, community leaders, and business professionals to identify regional concerns, set goals and develop action plans to reach those goals.

Section 2

The activities of Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership will include, but not be limited, to the following:

- A. Provide a neutral public forum for discussion of regional issues.
- B. Seek useful ideas to improve the quality of life in the Tamaqua area from other parts of the country and bring these ideas to the attention of the public.
- C. Pursue an educational and outreach program to make the public aware of regional issues and useful solutions.
- D. Enhance communication among businesses, municipal governments, public authorities, state and federal agencies, public and private organizations, religious organizations, agricultural, and education institutions.

ARTICLE IV: ORGANIZATION

The Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership shall be comprised of the following bodies: Tamaqua Area Assembly, Task Forces, and Coordinating Committee.

ARTICLE V: TAMAQUA AREA ASSEMBLY

Section 1 The Tamaqua Area Assembly is the body of general membership for the Tamaqua

Area 2004 Partnership.

Section 2 The membership of the Tamaqua Area Assembly shall include any individual who

resides in the Tamaqua area.

Section 3 The Tamaqua Area Assembly shall meet at least annually. Additional meetings

may be called by the Coordinating Committee.

ARTICLE VI: TASK FORCES

Section 1 The Task Forces shall be responsible for identifying problems affecting the

Tamaqua area, developing solutions to these problems, and implementing effective solutions. The Task Forces shall inform the Coordinating Committee as to

their activities.

Section 2 There shall be four (4) initial Task Forces. Other Task Forces may be created by

the Coordinating Committee as needed. The four initial Task Forces are:

- A. Economic Development
- B. Recreation
- C. Historic Preservation/Tourism
- D. Downtown Revitalization

Section 3 Each Task Force shall have a Chairperson. The Chairperson is elected by the

members of the each Task Force. The Chairperson shall serve for one year, but

may be re-elected.

Section 4 Each Task Force is made up of members of the Tamaqua Area Assembly. Task

Force membership is voluntary.

Section 5 Duties of the Chairperson shall include:

- A. Recruit membership from the Tamaqua Area Assembly
- B. Identify the scope of their Task Force activity
- C. Identify projects within the scope for the Task Force
- D. Coordinate each project with the Coordinating Committee
- E. Implement approved projects
- F. Submit an annual budget to the Coordinating Committee
- G. Serve on the Coordinating Committee

Section 6

Each Task Force shall meet at least six (6) times a per year.

ARTICLE VII COORDINATING COMMITTEE

Section 1 The governing body of the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership shall be the Coordinating Committee. It is the responsibility of this body to provide

leadership, coordinate activities, set policy, and evaluate results.

Section 2 The Coordinating Committee shall be made up of at least fifteen (15) members

selected by and from the members of the Tamaqua Area Assembly.

Section 3 Membership of the Coordinating Committee shall be determined through election

held at the annual general membership meeting. The newly elected Coordinating

Committee members shall be installed immediately.

Section 4 Coordinating Committee members shall be elected to a three-year (3) term.

Section 5 In the event of a vacancy on the Coordinating Committee, the President shall select a new member from the Tamaqua Area Assembly to fulfill the unexpired

term. The President's nominee must be approved by at least two-thirds of the

members present at the Coordinating Committee meeting.

Section 6 The Coordinating Committee shall elect the following officers from its ranks:

President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. Officers may serve no more

than three (3) consecutive years.

Section 7 The duties of these officers shall be:

A. President - The President shall conduct meetings, call special meetings as necessary, serve as ex officio member on all Coordinating Committees, and nominate new members to the Coordinating Committee when a

vacancy occurs.

B. Vice President - The Vice President shall assist the President as needed and serve as presiding officer at meetings and for official matters of the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership in the absence of the President, when

needed.

C. Secretary - The Secretary shall assure preparation and maintenance of accurate records of membership legal records, Coordinating Committee minutes, and other documents of the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership,

excluding financial information.

D. Treasurer - The Treasurer shall assure preparation and maintenance of accurate records and audits of the Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership.

Section 8

Meetings

- A. Schedule The Coordinating Committee shall meet as often as necessary, but not fewer than six (6) times per year.
- B. Quorum Eight (8) members of the Coordinating Committee shall constitute a quorum.
- C. Order of Business Using Robert's Rules of Order, the President shall determine the order of business and agenda for each meeting.
- D. Proxy There shall be no voting by proxy.
- E. Attendance Failure to attend three consecutive meetings shall constitute a resignation from the Coordinating Committee.

ARTICLE VIII: FINANCE

Section 1 The Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership shall establish itself as a nonprofit organization.

Section 2 The Coordinating Committee may actively seek funds from foundations, businesses, government agencies, and all others.

Section 3

All Task Force requests for financial resources must be submitted to the Coordinating Committee in writing. Expenditures relating to the Task Forces must be reviewed and approved by the Coordinating Committee.

Section 4 Expenditures incurred for the daily operation of the Tamaqua Area 2004
Partnership must be reviewed and approved by the President and Treasurer.

Section 5 The Tamaqua Area 2004 Partnership shall be audited at least once every two years by a certified independent auditor.

ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENTS

Section 1 These bylaws may be amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at a duly organized Tamaqua Area Assembly meeting.
