1	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: The first order of
2	business is the resolution of the Transportation Committee
3	so that we continue to call on set dates and times for
4	meetings and hearings. Moved by Representative Hess.
5	Seconded by Marsico. Are there any negative votes?
6	(No response.)
7	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Resolution passes. All
8	right. Let's move now into the amendments on House Bill
9	10. The first amendment is A0768. I'm offering this
10	amendment for Todd Platts.
11	REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: Mr. Chairman, I don't
12	have any amendments. Do you have them, copies?
13	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: We're going fast, but
14	they're passing them out. This is a technical amendment
15	that changes language from affidavit to a certificate of
16	authorization. And it's in addition to. And I support the
17	amendment and would ask for its passage.
18	REPRESENTATIVE LEH: Mr. Chairman, so moved.
19	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Moved by Representative
20	Leh. Seconded by Bard. Any negative amendments?
21	(No response.)
22	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Next amendment is
23	Representative Battisto's amendment. And Joe, do you want
24	to explain this? It's an agreed-to amendment. These
25	are

REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: My amendment merely changes the section dealing with the curfew. The end of the bill says in effect in 180 days, but there's no need for us to wait 180 days to put that in effect. It would put it in effect within 30 days.

CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Amen. Moved by Representative Laughlin. Seconded by Representative Pippy. Any negative votes?

(No response.)

CHAIRPERSON GEIST: The amendment's adopted unanimously. All right. The next amendment, we're making copies of it. This is also for Representative Platts. I will introduce it. This will change the curfew on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings from midnight till 11:00 a.m. It will be 12 o'clock during the rest of the week.

And that was a compromise. Originally, they wanted to make it 11:00. But we -- with realizing that there's so many school activities and people coming back from athletic events and things like that, we agreed to this. And this amendment does target the time period over the weekend, which is very -- what we call very high hazard.

I would -- 11:00 on Friday, 11:00 on Saturday, and 11:00 on Sunday. The rest of the week will be 12:00.

Motion to move it out by Bard. Seconded by Hess. Are

3	REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Yes by proxy.
4	MS. JONES: Laughlin?
5	REPRESENTATIVE LAUGHLIN: Yes.
6	MS. JONES: Levdansky?
7	REPRESENTATIVE LEVDANSKY: Yes.
8	MS. JONES: Markosek?
9	REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Yes by proxy.
10	MS. JONES: Melio?
11	REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: Yes.
12	MS. JONES: Petrarca?
13	REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Yes by proxy.
14	MS. JONES: Preston?
15	REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Yes by proxy.
16	MS. JONES: Roberts?
17	REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Yes by proxy.
18	MS. JONES: And Santoni?
19	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: The amendment being
20	overwhelmingly voted yes is adopted. There's one more
21	amendment. This is the amendment offered I'm going to
22	offer the amendment that based upon all the testimony we
23	have heard, that the number of occupants in a vehicle
24	cannot exceed the number of seat belts.
25	And we think that from what we heard, that

1 this becomes a very good amendment and fits very well with

2 | what we've been doing. Moved by Representative Pippy.

3 Seconded by Representative Marsico. Are there any negative 4 votes?

(No response.)

CHAIRPERSON GEIST: The amendment passes. On the bill, final passage -- okay. This will also be my amendment. This cleans up the suspension language and brings it into conformity with what Lieutenant Bickley would like to see.

And Dana, do you want to explain this? I think everybody already understands it. It's technical.

And it falls in line with the Department regulations -- recommendations. Excuse me.

MS. ALWINE: This was a change suggested by the Department. Prior to this change, a person who would be under 18 who would incur the high speed violation or commit an infraction that would result in accumulation of points, if they turn 18 before that violation turns into a conviction, we would not be able to accrue the additional suspension.

And the same way if they had committed the infraction resulting in the accumulation of points but were not notified until after 18 about the accumulation of points, we would not be able to catch them with the

1 additional suspension time. This language closes that 2 loophole.

CHAIRPERSON GEIST: On the amendment, moved by

4 Representative Hess. Seconded by Pippy. Any negative

5 | votes?

6 (No response.)

7 CHAIRPERSON GEIST: All right. On the bill,

8 | Representative Battisto.

9 REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: Mr. Chairman?

10 CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Yes.

11 | REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: I just have a question

12 on the one amendment about the passenger seat belts. Is

13 this only for 18-year-olds, it's not for anyone else?

14 CHAIRPERSON GEIST: Yes, under 18.

15 | REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: And then again, this is

16 | not a primary offense?

17 CHAIRPERSON GEIST: No, it's not a primary

18 offense.

19 | REPRESENTATIVE MELIO: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON GEIST: On the bill,

21 | Representative Battisto.

22 REPRESENTATIVE BATTISTO: Just one statement.

23 | First of all, I think there's some very good things in this

24 legislation. I think we ought to move as quickly as

25 possible, move it to the floor of the House. I was very

1	impressed by the comments by the Stauffer family. That
2	alone I think is strong enough impetus for us to move this
3	bill along. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you.
4	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: I'd like to make a comment
5	on this bill before we do pass it. I would really like to
6	thank the Department, the Governor's office, the House and
7	Senate staffs, but especially the staff of this Committee.
8	I think they've done yeoman work on this.
9	We have collected reams, reams of information
LO	that have gone into what we feel is the very best bill of
1	this kind in the United States. And I'm just really proud
12	of everybody who's worked on it, and I think everybody
L3	deserves a huge pat on the back. This has been the a
L 4	long process that's been done very, very rapidly for as
L5	fast as government moves.
.6	And now, Representative Snyder, in leadership,
L 7	it's up to you to move the bill on the floor. Right now
8	we'd like to move it out. Moved by Pippy. Seconded by
19	Melio. Are there any negative votes?
20	(No response.)
21	CHAIRPERSON GEIST: The bill is reported
22	unanimously. This meeting is adjourned.
