REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Okay. And now we'll turn the floor over to Representative Davis, the author of this legislation.

REPRESENTATIVE DAVIS: Good afternoon, Chairman Farry, Chairman Sainato, Members and staff of the Committee, my fellow testifiers, and members of the public. It's an honor to speak in front of this Committee today on behalf of my legislation, House Bill 1819, that would enact one of the central recommendations of the S.R. 6 Commission's report to create a State Fire Commission.

I'm State Representative Austin Davis, and I represent the 35th Legislative District. The communities I serve in southeastern Allegheny County are facing many of the same challenges in the delivery of fire and emergency medical services that we're witnessing across as Commonwealth. Some of the municipalities in my area rely heavily on volunteer firefighters and EMS personnel, while others have a paid fire department. Our tax bases cannot support our emergency services at the level we would like, and we struggle to recruit and retain volunteers.

I have followed the work of this Committee as it's passed more than 20 bills taken from the S.R. 6 Commission's recommendations in 2018. These new programs

and changes to existing incentives are going to offer muchneeded relief in many areas of pressure on our emergency
services systems. However, the underlying problem is much
bigger, and we need a comprehensive solution that will
position us to continue to provide emergency services
throughout the century. That is why my bill calls for a
big structural change to the way that Pennsylvania
prioritizes and organizes its support for emergency
services.

About 25 years ago, the General Assembly created the Office of the State Fire Commissioner. That was its own a sea change in Pennsylvania's approach to firefighting. That office quickly became essential to volunteer fire companies around the Commonwealth. And as it stands today, it has taken on additional responsibilities and powers.

I want to take a moment to recognize the incredible dedication of the Fire Commissioners through the years, including the current sitting Commissioner Bruce Trego, who is here today. However, the additional demands being put on firefighters and EMS personnel, as we enter the 2020s, have simply stretched the Fire Commissioner beyond what he has been empowered to handle.

As the S.R. 6 Commission recognized, there are models in other States for how to take a 21st century

approach to managing our fire services, and we would be foolish to not study and learn from those systems. The S.R. 6 Commission did just that and recommended expanding the Fire Commissioner's office to a full-fledged Commission and consolidating all of the relevant programs and policies such as the Fire and EMS Grant Programs, the Volunteer Loan Assistance Program, and the Relief Financial Management under the purview of that Commission.

House Bill 1819 would accomplish those goals.

Under my bill, the current Fire Commissioner would become the State Fire Chief and would chair the 13-member Fire Commission. In addition to the Chief, who is an expert in firefighting issues, the Commission would include the head of the Bureau of EMS and the Department of Health because the delivery of fire and EMS services is so closely intertwined.

Even though our problems are statewide, they manifest differently in different communities. To that end, the Commission must strike a balance between interests of urban, suburban, and rural areas. It must be nimble enough to offer regional solutions adaptable to large, widespread areas that are covered by volunteer firefighters in Jefferson County, without the challenges presented by the high-density housing of Lancaster, McKeesport, and other communities where paid departments are underfunded.

At the same time, the Commission must develop consistent but evolving training standards for all firefighters.

In order to achieve that balance, the Commission would include a member from each of the eight geographic regions roughly the same population. Those members would be required to include firefighters from paid, combination, and volunteer agencies, as well as ambulance and other rescue squad personnel from the paid and volunteer organizations.

I believe this bill is a good starting point for a discussion on how we move forward in terms of this particular S.R. 6 Commission recommendation. I appreciate the effort that the Members of this Committee and the members of our fire and EMS personnel have put into the S.R. 6 report in moving these pieces of legislation forward, so I thank the Chairman for holding this hearing today, and I look forward to working with each and every one of you as we move forward in this process.

And please allow me to apologize. I'm a Member of the Appropriations Committee, so I do have to leave to go back to budget hearings today, so please do not take that as a sign of disrespect that I have to slip out after my testimony.

And with that, that concludes, Mr. Chairman.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you, Representative.

Does anybody have any questions for Representative Davis 1 before he heads back to the appropriations hearing? 2 3 Okay. Thank you. 4 REPRESENTATIVE DAVIS: All right. Thank you. REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Our first panelist is our 5 6 State Fire Commissioner Bruce Trego. 7 MR. TREGO: Good afternoon, Chairman Farry and Chairman Sainato, and all the Members of the House Veterans 8 9 Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee. I'm Bruce 10 Trego, the State Fire Commissioner, and I want to thank you for the opportunity to come here and offer our input on 11 12 this very important House Bill 1819. 13 As was mentioned, the State Fire Commissioner's 14 office has been around for quite some time and I will be 15 the first to admit is in need of overhaul, updating, 16 modification. And I think that was pretty evident in all 17 the S.R. 6 recommendations. And so what I would like to do 18 is take a look at some of the concerns that we have with 19 1819 and maybe some recommendations, and an alternate way 2.0 on some of those items that are in the bill. 21 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Mr. Trego? 2.2 MR. TREGO: Yes. REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Can you pull the mic a 23 24 little closer?

MR. TREGO: How's that?

25

1 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Outstanding. Thank you.

MR. TREGO: Okay. So nothing was recorded prior, right? Sorry. I am a little soft-spoken, so I'll try to speak up and into the microphone for you, sir.

We reviewed House Bill 1819, and while we support many of the policies in this bill, we have some concerns as it is currently drafted. H.B. 1819 states the Commission will hold all of the powers and duties, while the State Fire Chief will oversee the office along with the Commission. Additionally, when the Commission votes on the issues related to their powers and duties, the Chief would only have a vote in the event of a tie.

Empowering the Commission to have authority rather than serving in an advisory role could create challenging situations for future Commissioners and Chiefs. Having the Commission serve in an advisory capacity would allow the Commissioner to continue serving the Commonwealth's fire service. The Commission would be able to provide the Commissioner with recommendations for the future of the fire service but provide the Commissioner with the authority to decide on the appropriate actions.

Section 7386 of Title 35 already establishes a

Fire Safety Advisory Committee, which could serve to

fulfill many of the objectives of this legislation. The

Fire Safety Advisory Committee has not been utilized in

several years due to funding constraints that made it impossible to reimburse the travel and other reasonable expenses of the members, but the Office of the State Fire Commissioner is currently in the process of reestablishing this Committee.

Advisory Committee consists of the PEMA Director, State
Fire Commissioner, two paid firefighters and one member of
the public that are all appointed by the Governor, and four
volunteer firefighters. One of the volunteer firefighters
are appointed by each of the following individuals:
President pro temp of the Senate, Minority Leader of the
Senate, Speaker of the House, and Minority Leader of the
House of Representatives. The Committee would advise the
Commissioner on matters pertaining to the operation of the
State Fire Academy and any other matter that the
Commissioner may request.

During recent meetings, leaders of the

Commonwealth's fire community stated that, if utilized

correctly, this committee would provide the voice that they

seek on issues related to the fire service, while the

composition of the Fire Safety Advisory Committee could be

revised to better reflect the current environment of the

Commonwealth's fire service. These changes would include

representation from the combination fire companies whose

presence continues to increase throughout the Commonwealth.

H.B. 1819 would also shift the responsibility for firefighters' relief from the Department of Community and Economic Development to the State Fire Commission. The issue of relief funds is a major issue that will require additional attention outside of switching agencies. It is our view that we need take a holistic look at the firefighters' relief funds. This legislation needs to be rewritten and retooled so that it can better meet the needs of the firefighter community. The current program is so far removed from its original purpose that it is inadequate to meet its current intentions. Switching agencies for relief funds will only shift the problem, not solve the problem.

This bill requires the Office of the State Fire Commissioner to administer additional programs, supervise additional personnel, and implement new initiatives, but the bill provides no additional funding to carry out these responsibilities.

A few examples of these responsibilities are to oversee a statewide recruitment and retention coordinator, oversee a technical advisor for each of the eight geographic regions established in this bill, conduct inspections of fire companies, and administer the firefighters' relief funds. The Office of the State Fire

Commissioner does not currently possess the resources and personnel to take on all these initiatives.

Using the eight geographic regions that will be used to determine representation on the Commission and for the technical advisors could also be reexamined. First, some of the geographic regions are far too large and will require excessive amounts of traveling for someone to serve as a technical advisor. An example of this is region III, which extends from Franklin County the entire way up to Erie. PEMA uses a regional task force model for providing support to counties for for all-hazards preparedness and resource coordination. We believe that this model could also be used for the Commission.

Tasking the Commission to create a minimum standard of coverage would be beneficial for the Commonwealth fire services. These standards would ensure all firefighters within the Commonwealth have a basic level of knowledge. This minimum standard of coverage will improve firefighter safety and help incident commanders manage all firefighters that are responding to the scene of a fire.

So in summary, with some updates to the current Office of the State Fire Commissioner, we believe that we could address many of the issues outlined in the bill.

Modification and proper utilization of the current Advisory

Board and supplementing funding and increased staffing 1 2 would have better results. 3 I would like to thank Chairman Barrar, Chairman Sainato, and Members of the Committee, for your support of 4 5 Office of the State Fire Commissioner and the fire services 6 across the State. I appreciate the opportunity to appear 7 here today, and I will try to answer any questions you might have. 8 9 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you, Commissioner. 10 Before we move on to questions, Representative 11 Borowicz, do want to introduce yourself? 12 REPRESENTATIVE BOROWICZ: I'm Representative 13 Borowicz [inaudible]. 14 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you. 15 Do any of the Members have any questions for the 16 Commissioner? 17 Representative Gillen? REPRESENTATIVE GILLEN: I have a comment 18 19 regarding the geographic issue, and I looked at the bill 20 previously. Berks County has an urban core of over 400,000 people, and then you go up to Potter County, which is --21 2.2 for many Berks Countians, I don't think they know where Potter County is unless they had a hunting cabin up there. 23 24 MR. TREGO: Right.

REPRESENTATIVE GILLEN: There's a significant

piece of geography there, so I would assert to you I
support your comments relative to the large geographic
regions.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you. Commissioner, just one question. In terms of the staffing positions that were put in the budget -- I know I talked to you a few weeks ago -- how are we making out? I know it's a human resources situation. But --

MR. TREGO: The positions have been approved -- REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Okay.

MR. TREGO: -- and we are now waiting for what they call the PAR, the personnel account request, personnel request. Job descriptions are done. We hope to be posting them within two weeks.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Excellent. Very good.

MR. TREGO: So that would bring us three more

people on board through the fireworks money.

1 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Yes. And for the Members, there were positions added into last year's budget for -- I 2 quess it's two technical advisors and a recruitment 3 retention coordinator --4 5 MR. TREGO: Right. 6 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: -- for the State, so we 7 were able to staff up the Fire Commissioner's office, which is a good thing and much-needed. 8 9 No further questions? Thank you, Commissioner. 10 MR. TREGO: You bet. 11 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: We are going to go out of 12 order with the next panel because one of the speakers for the third panel actually has to get to work for tonight. 13 14 So if we can have Dave Chiaramonte, President of Pennsylvania Professional Firefighters Association; and 15 16 Adam Perreault, who's the Legislative Coordinator for the 17 Allentown Fire Department, IAFF Local 302, come forward. 18 And, gentlemen, you can begin when ready. 19 MR. CHIARAMONTE: Good afternoon. Thank you 20 Chairman Farry, Chairman Sainato, and the Members of the 21 Veterans Affairs an Emergency Preparedness Committee. I am 2.2 Dave Chiaramonte, President of the Pennsylvania Professional Fire Fighters Association and retired Fire 23 Lieutenant from the City of Erie. 24

The work that has been conducted by this

Committee shows a commitment to fire protection, one of the core governmental responsibilities.

Currently, minimum levels of training vary greatly from municipality to municipality and from department to department. This must change. There is no such thing anymore as a routine fire. The materials within our homes, businesses, and vehicles burn at hotter temperatures and create an extremely toxic environment. These conditions within a burning structure cause it to degrade rapidly, and training is paramount to keeping firefighters and the citizens we serve safe.

It is the position of the PPFFA that the

Pennsylvania State Fire Commissioner should have always had

the authority to implement and enforce minimum

certification levels for firefighters, including those that

serve our airports, our aircraft rescue firefighters within

the Commonwealth. It appears that House Bill 1819 aims to

do just that.

Members of the Legislature have asked the PPFFA for basic input about regionalization and standards of coverage within their district. We always welcome discussion on firefighting issues, but it is our belief that this should not be a bottom-up approach, but rather the Commissioner should advise and develop appropriate standards of coverage.

After looking at the membership of the proposed

Fire Commission, we would like to see a guaranteed

representation on the Commission. Many municipalities are

struggling to provide fire protection to their citizens.

It is in the interest of the citizens of those

municipalities that we request a seat on the Commission as

we currently sit on the Fire Service Advisory Commission.

Thank you.

MR. PERREAULT: Yes. Good afternoon. My name is Adam Perreault. I'm a representative of Local 302, Allentown firefighters, as well as a proxy today for Local 22, Philadelphia firefighters for Chuck McQuilkin, who could not be in attendance.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Do you have anything?

We echo the PPFFA's sentiment as far as the standards of training. As the third-largest city in Pennsylvania, we are surrounded by volunteer townships and often rely on them for mutual aid responses due to the same fiscal constraint that everybody else is experiencing out there, whether it's townships trying to get people in for volunteerism or, you know, even paid departments, we also struggle to get manpower or whatnot. So we rely on mutual aid.

One of the issues we've always had was that there's no guarantee that that firefighter that's coming in

to back you up on a large-scale incident is going to be certified or qualified to even be on scene. And again, it's up to the township and municipality or the volunteer fire service to set that standard per volunteer group. So some of them have given us their word that they would send no unqualified personnel coming in, but we have to take it at face value.

Now, as a professional firefighter that has, you know, gone through fire academies and holds several certifications, I would like to know that the person that's going to be standing next to me possibly in a fire is going to be qualified to do that. Again, you know, we're in a State that you have to be certified and, you know, you have to maintain a certain level of standards with being a hairdresser, a barber. I don't see why, as a fire service, we don't maintain the same standards for something this critical in nature.

Again, we work with Lehigh County Special Operations. You know, their hazmat team, they have to be qualified to a certain level, and that should echo within just the normal fire response groups.

Also, I'd like to take this opportunity, too, to address the S.R. 6 package as a whole. We're trying to look at the -- have different avenues to retain and recruit volunteer firefighters. One thing that -- and I know this

Committee has not overlooked but is being overlooked is the mental health aspect of things, too, because if we're looking to invest in trying to retain and recruit people, we also need to send a message that mental health is also a priority of ours when these volunteers happen to see something or whoever. So I would like to -- hopefully, we could get a second consideration ran on House Bill 432, and that's ultimately something that needs to be addressed when we're talking about the S.R. 6-type package.

REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: First of all, my hats are off to you. And I'm a retired Marine. I just have to applaud you for everything you're doing. I can't conceivably imagine the level of difficulty and the education you need to be a firefighter, volunteer or

The question I have for you is more of a 30,000foot level. Do you think this Commission, if it gets
passed as-is, will provide the State Fire Commissioner with
the tools necessary to identify what we really need to do
to solve the problem? I mean, we're seeing situations
where the complexity of what you do in fighting a fire is
second to none. When I was in the Marine Corps, we had

crash crew and fire rescue, and we're seeing some of the issues that are -- the long-term effects of people who fought those fires are dealing with. Do you think this Commission will help or make it more difficult or just kick the issue down the road again longer to the point where at some point in time the system fails?

MR. CHIARAMONTE: I believe that the Commission would be a good first step. I believe that reading House Bill 1819, if I've read it correctly, I believe that you're putting the pieces in place. You can't correct everything at one time.

REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: Okay.

MR. CHIARAMONTE: But if we step in and we start with the base and we work from there, it's not going to work -- maybe we'll develop the Commission, set it up, and find out that there's parts of it that don't work. You can always come back and modify it. But I think leaving the system the way it is is definitely going to short-sight and short the public and the firefighters that we serve.

REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: So you don't think it would be an impediment to getting something resolved but instead facilitate potentially?

 $$\operatorname{MR.}$ CHIARAMONTE: I think it would be a facilitation, yes.

REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: Okay. Thank you.

1 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Any further questions? Thank you, gentlemen. Hopefully, you have a 2 All right. 3 quiet --4 MR. PERREAULT: Thank you. 5 REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: -- shift tonight, Adam. 6 MR. PERREAULT: Yeah, we'll see. Hopefully. 7 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: All right. We're back on track with the panels. If we can have Dylan Ferguson, the 8 9 Director of the Bureau of EMS for the Commonwealth come 10 forward. 11 MR. FERGUSON: Good afternoon, Chairman Farry, 12 Chairman Sainato, and Members of the Committee. I'm Dylan Ferguson, and I currently serve as the Director of the 13 14 Bureau of Emergency Medical Services with the Pennsylvania 15 Department of Health. 16 I've had the opportunity to be involved in EMS 17 and fire issues for the course of the last 15 years, and 18 I've had the honor of serving as Pennsylvania's State EMS 19 Director for the last two. I'd like to thank you all for 20 the opportunity to provide testimony here today as it relates to House Bill 1819, which would create the 21 22 Pennsylvania State Fire Commission under the leadership of the proposed position of the State Fire Chief. 23 The Department of Health, specifically through 24

the Bureau of EMS, has enjoyed a very collaborative working

25

relationship with the Office of the State Fire Commissioner for many years. Our respective offices, while having at times very different roles, functions, and responsibilities, have a great respect for one another. It is this respect and collaboration that has led to such successful programs such as the Joint Pennsylvania Rescue program, otherwise known as the Voluntary Rescue Services Recognition program or VRSR for short. This program was last articulated in a memorandum of understanding between our respective offices last in 2011.

House Bill 1819 is a byproduct of the work done on the Senate Resolution 6 Commission. The Department of Health has been and will continue to be very supportive of the various pieces of legislation that have been introduced as a result of S.R. 6 and will continue to work to support the mission of propelling emergency services forward throughout the Commonwealth and in working to ensuring a sustainable future.

As it relates to House Bill 1819 specifically and the general concept of the formation of a Fire Commission for the purposes of providing oversight and coordination of fire-related activities, the Department of Health defers the task of providing specific commentary on that topic to the current Office of the State Fire Commissioner and the fire departments across Pennsylvania. Allowing the State

Fire Commissioner and fire departments to provide input will mirror the process that EMS agencies and organizations took to construct their structure in 1985, and again in 2009 with the passage of Act 37.

The Department appreciates that the proposed legislation provides for EMS representation on the Commission with the appointment of both the EMS Bureau Director and representation of both a volunteer and a career ambulance or rescue organization. Particularly, because, as proposed, the Commission would be responsible for administration of both the Volunteer Fire and EMS Grant Program, and the Volunteer Loan Assistance Program, or VLAP. These are programs that financially impact emergency medical services agencies throughout our Commonwealth and are areas that the Department currently provides information and consultation to the Office of the State Fire Commissioner, including representation on the current Vehicle Funding Review Committee for the VLAP program.

As the State's lead EMS agency, we stand at the ready to provide whatever assistance, support, and information we can to assist the General Assembly and specifically this Committee in ensuring the continued provision of high-quality emergency services throughout our State.

I want to again thank you for the opportunity to

testify before you today, and I'd be happy to take any questions you may have.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Questions from any of the Committee Members? Okay.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you.

And we are actually combining our last two
panels. So we have Chas McGarvey, who is the Chief Fire
Officer and Fire Marshal for Lower Merion Township; Jay
Delaney, who is the Fire Chief of Wilkes-Barre and also the
President of the Pennsylvania Career Fire Chief's
Association; and Steve Bair, who is the Chief of Regional
Fire Protection in State College. And he is also here in
the capacity of President of the Pennsylvania Fire and
Emergency Services Institute.

Gentlemen, begin when ready.

MR. MCGARVEY: Good afternoon. My name is Chas McGarvey, and I'm the Chief Fire Officer of the Township of Lower Merion Fire Department. I've also had the pleasure to serve on the S.R. 6 Commission, specifically as the Chair of the S.R. 6 Government Support Subcommittee.

Before I begin my testimony, I do want to express my sincere disappointment with Representative Jason
Ortitay's proposed legislation to eliminate the Office of the State Fire Commissioner. This proposition disregards

everything that the Members of the Commission have worked so hard to complete over the past two years in an effort to begin to address the very real needs and issues of the Commonwealth's Fire and EMS services. It is my sincere hope that all of you will work to defeat this ill-advised proposed legislation.

With that said, I'd like to begin by first thanking Chairman Farry, Chairman Sainato, and all the Members of the Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee for inviting me back to testify before you regarding the work of the Government Support Subcommittee, specifically in reference to Recommendation 5 and House Bill 1819.

As I have testified previously, we are down to less than 38,000 volunteers today from over 300,000 in the 1970s. As we continue to lose volunteers, our fire and EMS companies become more and more stressed, and I believe the opportunity being presented today is a great beginning to help remedy the crisis we face.

First and foremost, let me begin by saying that I fully support the creation of an Independent State Fire Commission, as recommended by the Government Support Subcommittee to the S.R. 6 Commission, and put forth in the final report as recommendation number 5. I further believe that the final legislation to be passed should mirror

Recommendation 5 as closely as possible, as it was developed by fire service professionals from across the State. I also agree that the membership of this Commission should be representative of the Commonwealth as a whole and should be comprised of members from the three types of fire services that serve our Commonwealth, namely the volunteer, the combination and the career fire services.

House Bill 1819 is a start on the right path, but I do have some concerns with its current format, and I believe that many of my colleagues share this same opinion. House Bill 1819 creates eight geographical regions across the Commonwealth and includes as members Representatives from business and industry, a certified architect representative, and an insurance representative. I question the necessity of these last three positions, as the duty of this Commission should be focused on the administration, training, standards and performance of our fire service. I don't see how these positions will be able to complement this Commission. However, if it is determined that these positions are necessary, I would recommend that they be nonvoting members whose sole purpose would be to provide support and guidance.

House Bill 1819 calls for the Commission to meet twice a year. I know in serving on the S.R. 6 Commission we found ourselves meeting a lot more than was originally

anticipated. I would recommend meeting quarterly, especially in the onset.

The proposed bill asks for an annual report to be completed by January 31st. My recommendation would be to give the Commission till the end of March to put together their annual report. I can tell you in doing my report for the township, it takes a few months to complete, and I don't think a month will allow for enough time to prepare a thorough and comprehensive report.

House Bill 1819 also proposes the creation of a Fire Safety Advisory Committee that is to advise the Fire Commissioner, or Chief as proposed in this bill, on the operation of the State Fire Academy. I don't think this is necessary, as we will have a Commission in place to handle such things. I also disagree with the proposed makeup of the Fire Service Advisory Committee, as the leaders of our fire service, namely the Chief Fire Officers, aren't represented on this advisory committee at all.

In addition, there are other duties named throughout the bill that the Commission would become responsible for such as administering the Volunteer Loan Assistance Program, administering the Fire Company Grant Program, administering the firefighter's relief funds and the use of these funds, overseeing a statewide recruitment and retention coordinator, and overseeing technical

advisors for the geographical districts. It is my belief that these duties should remain as duties of the State Fire Commissioner or Chief and not the Commission. The Commissioner would be responsible to update the Commission on the administration of these programs, but ultimately these duties should be administered by the Commissioner.

Lastly, the title of the State Fire Commissioner should not change to State Fire Chief. In the fire service, the title of Commissioner in most areas outranks a Chief. The Chief is also more of an operational role within the fire service, and therefore, the title should remain as currently titled, State Fire Commissioner.

In closing, I want to thank you once again for providing me with the opportunity to come before you and in taking the time to support the Fire and EMS emergency services in our Commonwealth. This ends my report, and I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.

MR. DELANEY: Chairman Farry, Democratic Chair
Chris Sainato, and Members of the House Veterans Affairs
and Emergency Preparedness Committee, thank you for
inviting me here today to discuss House Bill 1819. I'm the
Fire Chief of the city of Wilkes-Barre. I've been honored
to serve the city in that role for over 14 years and a
total of 39 years in emergency services. I'm also the
Emergency Management Coordinator for the city of Wilkes-

- 1 Barre and a certified paramedic. In addition, I'm the
- 2 President of the Pennsylvania Career Fire Chiefs
- 3 Association representing career and combination Fire Chiefs
- 4 | from across the Commonwealth.
- 5 From January 23rd, 2017, to November 30th, 2018,
- 6 I had the honor to serve on the Senate Resolution 6
- 7 Committee. During this nearly two years, the 39-member
- 8 | Commission was made up of major fire & EMS organizations,
- 9 elected officials, and leaders throughout the Commonwealth.
- During this time, the committee came up with 92
- 11 recommendations that were triaged down to the final 27
- recommendations. Subcommittees were formed. Most of my
- work was done with the Government Support Committee under
- 14 the Chairmanship of Chief Chas McGarvey from Lower Merion
- 15 Township Fire Department.
- During our work and investigation, we felt a need
- 17 to update the model for the State Fire Commissioners
- 18 Office, namely creating a Fire Commission. S.R. 6,
- 19 Recommendation 5, clearly states the following: The Office
- of State Fire Commissioner would be clearly designated as a
- 21 lead agency for fire service in the Commonwealth. The new
- 22 State Fire Commission should be created. The State Fire
- Commission would set minimum standards to be followed by
- all companies and departments in the Commonwealth.
- The Office of State Fire Commissioner would be

responsible for grant administration. The Office of State
Fire Commissioner would be responsible for the State Fire
Academy. Data collection and analysis of the statewide
fire experience and system conditions must be collected on
an ongoing basis, fire prevention measures and
improvements, along with the administration of the
firemen's relief funds, also provide technical assistance
directly to fire departments, and be authorized to take
corrective deficiencies related to statewide minimum
standard of cover.

the Senate Resolution 6, Recommendation 5. We are thankful to Representative Davis and all of the House Bill 1819 cosponsors to date. We would respectfully request the following considerations to H.B. 1819: The first is to remove State Fire Chief and keep the position State Fire Commissioner. Also, the creation of an independent Fire Commission is directly supported by Senate Resolution 6, Recommendation 5, and is supported by the Pennsylvania Career Fire Chiefs Association.

The independent Fire Commission should only have a membership supported by fire and EMS members. Private industry representation should not be part of the independent Fire Commission.

The creation of a Fire Safety Advisory Committee

should have greater representation of combination fire departments. Both career and volunteer firefighters would be part of the makeup of the proposed Fire Safety Advisory Committee. Fifty percent of the membership of the Pennsylvania Career Fire Chiefs Association are combination fire departments. The current trend in the fire service is combination fire departments as the demand for fire services increases. We propose adding one or two members from combination fire departments to the Advisory Committee.

This concludes my testimony today. I am grateful to the House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee for the opportunity to add my voice and that of the Pennsylvania Career Fire Chiefs Association membership. Thank you.

MR. BAIR: Thank you, Chairman Farry, Chairman Sainato. Good afternoon. I'm Steve Bair. I'm Chief of the Regional Fire Protection Program of the Centre Region Council of Governments in State College, and I'm Board President of the Pennsylvania Fire and Emergency Services Institute. I began my fire service career as a volunteer here in suburban Harrisburg in 1975, and in very early 2007 I left my industrial career to begin my career as a Fire Chief in State College.

Ours is a regional program providing primary

protection to five municipalities and the University Park
Campus of Penn State. We have four career personnel, 93
volunteers, and we protect approximately 93,000 people in
an area of about 104 square miles, responding to about
1,200 incidents annually. Our service is essentially the
city of Allentown with a volunteer fire department. And in
addition to the fire protection duties, our program
includes local emergency management, Fire Marshals focused
on investigations, and we manage and staff the Penn State
Hazmat Team.

I was honored to be a member of the S.R. 6

Commission representing the Pennsylvania Association of

Councils of Government, and I appreciate this opportunity

to testify on the efforts to restructure the Office of the

State Fire Commissioner. I thank Representative Davis and

the cosponsors of House Bill 1819 for their interest in,

and assistance to, the Pennsylvania Fire Service.

My testimony today is focused on three elements of House Bill 1819: the creation of the independent State Fire Commission, the creation of the Fire Safety Advisory Committee, and the nomenclature used to identify the agency executive.

I support the creation of an independent State Fire Commission, as recommended in the S.R. 6 report, which is Recommendation 5, and I agree its membership should be

constructed in such manner to provide voice-of-the-customer from the whole of Pennsylvania Fire Service. The challenges facing the fire service are complex, and understanding these challenges in enough detail to address them can be a daunting task for individual legislators.

The solutions to address these challenges are also daunting, as they also often involve technical details, resource modeling, everchanging conditions, and very specific localized needs. The S.R. 6 report repeatedly reminds its readers that Pennsylvania is not, nor will become, a one-size-fits-all enterprise.

House Bill 1819 in its current form provides fire service representation from eight geographic regions, with each region including approximately one-eighth of the Commonwealth's population. The remaining three voting members of the Commission are representative of business and industry, a certified architect representative, and an insurance industry representative.

The scope of the Commission's duties as described in this bill are directly focused on fire service performance, training, and administration. They are not focused on related elements such as building codes.

Therefore, I believe a better voice-of-the-customer process and hence better outcomes will be achieved by modifying this bill to have all voting members representing the fire

service with those members drawn from perhaps 10 geographic regions, each region representing approximately one-tenth of the Commonwealth's population.

Business and industry, design professionals, and the insurance industry are already amply represented to the Legislature. The fire service has considerably less opportunity to participate in the legislative process, which was the impetus for creating the Office of the State Fire Commissioner.

In addition to the State Fire Commission, House
Bill 1819 proposes establishment of a Fire Safety Advisory
Committee. The stated charge of this committee is to
advise the Commissioner -- or Chief, as the defined
nomenclature within the bill -- on matters pertaining to
the operation of the Pennsylvania State Fire Academy. This
appears to conflict with the charge of the Commission to
oversee the Pennsylvania State Fire Academy, and I am
concerned that the fire academy could find itself trying to
serve multiple masters, each with differing directives,
guidance, and priorities. I believe this bill would be
strengthened by eliminating the Fire Safety Advisory
Committee component.

My final suggestion to improve this bill is to retain the title of Commissioner rather than adopt the term Chief to identify the agency executive. Within the fire

1 service generally, a Chief is subordinate to a Commissioner, and a Commissioner usually has a broader 2 scope of duties than those of a Chief. I believe the 3 proposed change in nomenclature will likely create more 4 5 confusion and uncertainty rather than clarity. 6 This concludes my testimony on House Bill 1819, 7 and thank you for providing me this opportunity to express my opinions. 8 9 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Thank you, gentlemen. 10 Chief McGarvey, we have some good news. 11 MR. MCGARVEY: Thank you. 12 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: -- cosponsor memo that was 13 filed that you mentioned in your testimony was pulled from 14 the system after only being in for a day and a half, so --15 MR. MCGARVEY: Thank you. REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: -- hopefully, that issue 16 17 is dead. Before we go to Members with questions, I'd like 18 19 to turn it over to Executive Director Hillman. I think he 2.0 has a clarifying point on the legislation. 21 MR. HILLMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Yes, I 22 actually have more good news for you all. The Fire Safety Advisory Committee, as you may have heard from the Fire 23

Commissioner, already exists. It's been in law for several

years. I'm not sure how long. This bill would actually

members into the Commission. That's the structure of the bill, which could be confusing. I know we do this on a daily basis, but the brackets and the lines-through and all that, it can be hard to follow. So this would not create a Fire Safety Advisory Committee. It would actually eliminate the existing one in favor of the Commission.

MR. MCGARVEY: Excellent.

MR. HILLMAN: And if I may just ask one question on the Chief Commissioner point. Because we would be expanding this to be a Commission where each member would be arguably titled a Commissioner, that's why we made the choice in the bill to call one of them the Chief. Do you have any insight into how we could maybe do that differently? Could it just be the Chair of the Commission or any way to distinguish who would be the head of that group?

MR. MCGARVEY: I think you could just leave, you know, the State Fire Commissioner as a Commissioner and everyone else are Deputy Commissioners. I mean, that's kind of in the rank structure of the fire service. You have your Chief, your Deputy Chief, so it would stay consistent. And as Chief Bair said, it doesn't muddy the waters up.

MR. DELANEY: And just as another case in point,

1 with the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission and the Pennsylvania Game Commission, they have Commissioners, and 2 each of them have an Executive Director. 3 4 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: All right. Representative 5 Ryan? 6 REPRESENTATIVE RYAN: Actually, you answered the 7 question. [inaudible] actually pulled it within a day, and he said it was circulated in error. So I just wanted to 8 9 make sure it was clearly known. 10 MALE SPEAKER: Thank you. 11 REPRESENTATIVE FARRY: Do we have any questions 12 from any other Members? 13 Okay. Well, thank you, gentlemen.
