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MAJORITY SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIRMAN SCHEMEL: Good morning. I'd like to call this meeting of the House Subcommittee on Courts to order.

Elana, if you'd please call the roll.

(The roll was taken)

Thank you very much. Appears that we have a quorum present.

I'd first like to begin by recognizing Chairman Stephens. Chairman Stephens chaired this subcommittee for some time. He is now chair of a full committee of his own. Chairman, we are very pleased and honored that you are able to be here as a member with your experience.

I'd also like to recognize the co-chair, Chairman Hohenstein. Very thankful for you to be here with us as well.

House Resolution 99 passed the House by unanimous, bipartisan vote 200-0 on November 10, 2021. Since the resolution initiated this investigation, a similar resolution has been introduced in the Pennsylvania State Senate.

Numerous public officials and citizens have called upon Commissioner Halcovage to resign from office. It has become clear that Mr. Halcovage has no such

intention. That being the case, the process of impeachment will need to move forward.

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Significantly, House Resolution 99 authorizes the House Judiciary Committee and this Subcommittee to subpoena witnesses, documents and other materials for the purpose of performing its duties. The resolution states, "Resolved, that the Subcommittee on Courts is authorized and empowered to [take and] make recommendations to the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives and, in the performance of its duties may:

- (1) send for individuals and papers and subpoena witnesses, documents and other materials under the seal of the subcommittee chairperson;
 - (2) administer oaths to witnesses;
 - (3) take testimony; and
- (4) prepare and file pleadings and other legal documents."

Under the Rules of the House and the resolution, this subcommittee is authorized to use its subpoena power to compel the production of testimony and documents.

Evidence can be received either in open public forum or in executive session.

If the committee believes that it would be appropriate under the circumstances, I believe it is incumbent upon us to use the subpoena power to ensure the

relevant witnesses are heard and documents are produced and reviewed in an orderly and expeditious manor. Accordingly, I've called this meeting of the subcommittee to conduct some housekeeping measures so we can be in a position to take testimony and receive documents efficiently and effectively as this investigation proceeds. To that end we will consider a motion in a moment. But first, Chairman Hohenstein, do you have any remarks?

MINORITY SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIRMAN HOHENSTEIN: Thank you Chairman Schemel, and I simply want to go on record that impeachment is one of the most serious processes that we as a body have. And we here in this committee, I think, are taking this specific process very seriously, handling it with professionalism that it deserves and also looking to hold to account our fellow elected representatives and in so doing actually holding ourselves to account for how we conduct the public's business. And I appreciate Chairman Schemel and his work thus far and look forward to being able to conduct ourselves in the way that befits this type of proceeding. Thank you.

MAJORITY SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIRMAN SCHEMEL: Thank you Chairman Hohenstein.

That being said we've heard the motion. Is there a motion to consider the resolution?
