The definition of "emergency vehicle" in section 13 102 of Title 75 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes is amended and the section is amended by adding a definition to 14 15 read: § 102. Definitions. 16

17 Subject to additional definitions contained in subsequent 18 provisions of this title which are applicable to specific 19 provisions of this title, the following words and phrases when 20 used in this title shall have, unless the context clearly 21 indicates otherwise, the meanings given to them in this section: 22 * * *

23 "Emergency vehicle." A State or county emergency management 24 vehicle, fire department vehicle, police vehicle, sheriff 25 vehicle, ambulance, advanced life support squad vehicle, basic 26 life support squad vehicle, emergency canteen support service 27 organization vehicle, blood delivery vehicle, human organ delivery vehicle, hazardous material response vehicle, armed 28 29 forces emergency vehicle, one vehicle operated by a coroner or chief county medical examiner and one vehicle operated by a 30 31 chief deputy coroner or deputy chief county medical examiner used for answering emergency calls, a vehicle owned by or leased 32 33 to a regional emergency medical services council that is used as authorized by the Department of Health to respond to an actual 34

or potential disaster, mass casualty situation or substantial 1 threat to public health, a vehicle owned by a county or regional 2 police association and operated by a police officer that is used 3 for police transport or victim extraction, a vehicle that is 4 owned and operated by a county correctional institution in a 5 city of the first class and used to respond to an emergency at a 6 correctional institution in a city of the first class or to 7 escort an ambulance which is transporting sick or injured 8 prisoners in a city of the first class, any vehicle operated by 9 a special agent, special agent supervisor, narcotics agent or 10 11 narcotics agent supervisor while performing official duties as 12 employees of the Office of Attorney General, any vehicle owned 13 and operated by the Philadelphia Parking Authority established in accordance with 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 55 (relating to parking 14 15 authorities) and used in the enforcement of 53 Pa.C.S. Ch. 57 16 (relating to taxicabs and limousines in first class cities), a vehicle owned by a city of the first class and operated by first 17 18 judicial district certified armed probation officers, a vehicle owned and operated by the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission that 19 20 is used by an emergency service responder as dispatched by the 21 Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission's traffic operations center, or 22 any other vehicle designated by the State Police under section 23 6106 (relating to designation of emergency vehicles by Pennsylvania State Police), or a privately owned vehicle used in 24 25 answering an emergency call when used by any of the following: A police chief and assistant chief. 26 (1) 27 A fire chief, assistant chief and, when a fire (2)28 company has three or more fire vehicles, a second or third 29 assistant chief. 30 (3) A fire police captain and fire police lieutenant. 31 (4) An ambulance corps commander and assistant 32 commander. 33 (5) A river rescue commander and assistant commander. (6) A county emergency management coordinator. 34 35 (7) A fire marshal. 36 (8) A rescue service chief and assistant chief. 37 (9) The chief or operations director of a county 38 hazardous materials response team. * * * 39 "Solid waste collection vehicle." A vehicle used for the 40 41 curbside collection of municipal solid waste or recyclables. * * * 42 43 Section 2. Section 4572(a) introductory paragraph of Title 44 75 is amended and the subsection is amended by adding a 45 paragraph to read: § 4572. Visual signals on authorized vehicles. 46 47 (a) Flashing or revolving blue lights. -- Ambulance personnel, 48 volunteer firefighters, certified volunteer search and rescue 49 organization members and owners and handlers of dogs used in 50 tracking humans may each equip one motor vehicle with no more 51 than two flashing or revolving blue lights. The following shall

3	(7) The department may not prohibit the use of flashing
4	<u>or revolving blue lights mounted internally in the passenger</u>
5	<u>compartment of a privately-owned vehicle used in answering an</u>

9	Section 3. Title 75 is amended by adding sections to read:
10	<u>§ 4572.1. Flashing or revolving yellow and white lights.</u>
11	<u>(a) General ruleTow trucks may be equipped with one or</u>
12	more flashing or revolving yellow lights and one or more
13	flashing or revolving white lights. The manner in which the
14	light or lights shall be displayed and the intensity shall be
15	<u>determined by regulation of the department.</u>
16	(b) LimitationsThe flashing or revolving yellow and white
17	lights on tow trucks shall be activated only when the vehicle is
18	actively performing the type of work which is the basis of the
19	designation of the vehicle as an authorized vehicle or is within
20	the vicinity of an emergency response area. Tow trucks shall not
21	operate with activated flashing or revolving yellow and white
22	lights when:
23	(1) Not engaged in the act of towing a vehicle.
24 25	(2) Brake lights, turn signals and operating lights are

33	(a) General ruleUpon approaching and passing a stationary
34	solid waste collection vehicle that is giving a visual signal by
35	means of bright yellow strobe light as required under subsection
36	(b), the driver of an approaching vehicle shall proceed as
37	follows:
38	(1) make a lane change into a lane not adjacent to the
39	solid waste collection vehicle, if possible in the existing
40	safety and traffic conditions; or
41	(2) if a lane change under paragraph (1) would be
42	impossible, prohibited by law or unsafe, reduce the speed of
43	the motor vehicle to a reasonable and proper speed for the
44	existing road and traffic conditions, which shall be less
45	than the posted speed limit, and be prepared to stop.
46	(b) Requirements for solid waste collection vehiclesSolid
47	waste collection vehicles shall be equipped with a bright yellow
48	strobe light affixed to the roof, which shall be mounted to
49	provide visibility to vehicles approaching from any direction,
50	in accordance with department regulations. The strobe light
51	shall be active while stopped upon a street and while engaged in

1 the collection of garbage, solid wastes, recyclables and refuse

2 or while moving between stops at a speed not greater than 10 3 <u>miles per hour.</u>
