A RESOLUTION

- 1 Designating the week of October 15 through 21, 2023, as
- "Military Sexual Trauma Survivor Week" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, The United States Department of Defense's 2021
- 4 Annual Report on Sexual Assault in the Military revealed in
- 5 stark detail that sexual assault and sexual harassment remain
- 6 persistent and distressing problems in our military; and
- WHEREAS, Service member sexual assault reports increased by
- 8 13% in 2021 compared to the 2020 report; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Shame and stigma create a barrier to reporting
- 10 sexual assault; and
- 11 WHEREAS, On average, only one out of every three sexual
- 12 assault survivors come forward to report the assault; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Even though women make up only 20% of the United
- 14 States Armed Forces members, they are the targets of 63% of
- 15 sexual assaults; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Sexual assault in the military is not only a woman's

- 2 WHEREAS, More than 100,000 men have been sexually assaulted
- 3 in the military in recent decades; and
- WHEREAS, In today's military, rape culture is an epidemic and <--
- 5 military sexual assault survivors are often forgotten; and
- 6 SEXUAL ASSAULT AND MISCONDUCT PERSIST DESPITE ONGOING EFFORTS <--
- 7 WITHIN THE MILITARY TO STOP SEXUAL ASSAULTS, PUNISH PERPETRATORS
- 8 AND CARE FOR SURVIVORS; AND
- 9 WHEREAS, Prior to being assaulted, many military sexual
- 10 assault survivors had dreams of serving for 20 or more years in
- 11 the United States Armed Forces and were happy in their
- 12 workplace; and
- 13 WHEREAS, While some military sexual assault survivors may
- 14 choose to stay in the military, the psychological impact of the
- 15 assault and resulting trauma can push survivors out of the
- 16 service and lead to tremendous difficulty readjusting to their
- 17 civilian lives; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Survivors of military sexual assault often decide
- 19 not to report the assault for the reasons of embarrassment, fear
- 20 and shame and professional and personal implications; and
- 21 WHEREAS, The military's culture of duty, teamwork, strength
- 22 and accomplishment conflicts with military sexual assault
- 23 survivors' needs, resulting in them being stigmatized as weak or
- 24 failing their fellow service members; and
- 25 WHEREAS, The uniqueness of military life causes additional
- 26 anxiety to a sexual assault survivor and complicates the
- 27 survivor's life, which may result in lack of promotion or
- 28 removal from service; and
- 29 WHEREAS, The personal stories of survivors underscore the
- 30 need for meaningful change to provide healing to those affected

- 1 by military sexual assault trauma through adequate medical and
- 2 mental health services; and
- 3 WHEREAS, To highlight the epidemic of sexual assault in the
- 4 United States Armed Forces, policymakers should initiate an
- 5 examination of military culture and military justice at the
- 6 Statewide level; and
- 7 WHEREAS, In this Commonwealth, the Department of Military and
- 8 Veterans Affairs, local veterans' centers and United States
- 9 Department of Veterans Affairs medical centers are able to offer
- 10 resources for military sexual assault survivors; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The House of Representatives must honor the
- 12 strength, resolve and perseverance of military sexual assault
- 13 survivors and work urgently to end sexual violence in the
- 14 military throughout this Commonwealth; therefore be it
- 15 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the
- 16 week of October 15 through 21, 2023, as "Military Sexual Trauma
- 17 Survivor Week" in Pennsylvania.
