AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial 3 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," further providing for continuing 5 professional development; and providing for access to 6 advanced placement for all students. 7 8 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 10 Section 1. Section 1205.1(c.1)(3) of the act of March 10, 11 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, 12 amended July 11, 2006 (P.L.1092, No.114), is amended to read: 13 Section 1205.1. Continuing Professional Development. --* * * 14 The continuing professional education plan shall specify the professional education needs that will be met by 15 16 completion of each continuing professional education option and 17 how it relates to areas of assignment and certification or potential administrative certification. The options may include, 18 but shall not be limited to: 19

- 2 (3) Other programs, activities or learning experiences taken
- 3 for credit or hourly, to include:
- 4 (i) curriculum development and other program design and
- 5 delivery activities at the school entity or grade level as
- 6 determined by the school entity and approved by the board of
- 7 directors;
- 8 (ii) participation in professional conferences and
- 9 workshops;
- 10 (iii) education in the workplace, where the work relates to
- 11 the professional educator's area of assignment and is approved
- 12 by the board of directors;
- 13 (iv) review, redesign and restructuring of school programs,
- 14 organizations and functions as determined by the school entity
- 15 and approved by the board of directors;
- 16 (v) in-service programs that comply with guidelines
- 17 established by the department;
- 18 (vi) early childhood and child development activities for
- 19 professional educators whose area of assignment includes
- 20 kindergarten through third grade;
- 21 (vii) special education activities for professional
- 22 educators whose area of assignment includes students with
- 23 special needs;
- 24 (viii) successful completion of department training for
- 25 service as a Distinguished Educator if the professional educator
- 26 participates in and completes at least one assignment in the
- 27 Distinguished Educators Program; [or]
- 28 (ix) other continuing professional education courses,
- 29 programs, activities or learning experiences sponsored by the
- 30 department[.]; or

- 1 (x) access to the Advanced Placement Course for All Students

- 4 Section 2. The act is amended by adding an article to read:
- 5 ARTICLE XVII-C
- 6 <u>ACCESS TO ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSES</u>
- 7 <u>FOR ALL STUDENTS</u>
- 8 <u>Section 1701-C. Scope of article.</u>
- 9 This article relates to access to advanced placement courses
- 10 for all students.
- 11 <u>Section 1702-C. Definitions.</u>
- 12 The following words and phrases when used in this article
- 13 shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 14 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 15 "Advanced placement course." A high school-level preparatory
- 16 course for a college advanced placement test that:
- 17 (1) incorporates all topics specified by the college
- 18 board on its standards syllabus for a given subject area; and
- 19 (2) is authorized by the college board.
- 20 "Department." The Department of Education of the
- 21 <u>Commonwealth</u>.
- 22 "Eligible teacher." A professional employee that is
- 23 certified in the subject area of the advanced placement course
- 24 that the teacher will be teaching.
- 25 "Four core academic areas." Advanced placement courses in
- 26 mathematics, English language arts, science and social science.
- 27 <u>"Poverty level." The percentage of students in a school</u>
- 28 <u>district eliqible for free or reduced price lunch.</u>
- 29 "Program." The Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program.
- 30 "School entity." Any public school district, intermediate

- 1 unit, area vocational-technical school, charter school or cyber
- 2 charter school.
- 3 "Teacher training entities." Institutions of higher
- 4 <u>education</u>, intermediate units or organizations endorsed by the
- 5 <u>college board to train teachers to teach advanced placement</u>
- 6 <u>courses.</u>
- 7 <u>"Virtual learning instruction." Providing academic courses</u>
- 8 to students via the Internet and the use of technology in
- 9 providing instruction to students.
- 10 Section 1703-C. Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program.
- 11 (a) Purpose. -- The purpose of the Advanced Placement Teacher
- 12 Training Program is to provide access to advanced placement
- 13 <u>courses in the four core academic areas for all students by</u>
- 14 training teachers in advanced placement course instruction at
- 15 all high schools that do not presently provide advanced
- 16 placement courses in one or more of these disciplines. The
- 17 importance of providing access to advanced placement courses for
- 18 all students is evident in the fact that the Pennsylvania School
- 19 Performance Profiles established in 2012 include advanced
- 20 placement participation and performance of a high school as an
- 21 <u>indicator of academic achievement that determines a high</u>
- 22 school's academic performance score.
- 23 (b) Establishment.--Beginning in the 2014-2015 school year,
- 24 the Advanced Placement Teacher Training Program shall be
- 25 established in the department to train teachers in eligible
- 26 school entities to teach advanced placement courses in the four
- 27 <u>core academic areas.</u>
- 28 (c) Eligible school entities. -- Eligible school entities are
- 29 those that do not have in each of their high schools at least
- 30 one advanced placement course in the four core academic areas or

- 1 will no longer have an advanced placement course in one of the
- 2 four core academic areas due to the retirement or loss of a
- 3 teacher who teaches an advanced placement course.
- 4 (1) A school entity that has an advanced placement
- 5 <u>course in one or more of the four core academic areas but not</u>
- 6 <u>in all four core academic areas is only eligible to have a</u>
- 7 <u>teacher trained in those core academic areas in which the</u>
- 8 school entity does not have an advanced placement course.
- 9 (2) No more than one teacher per core academic area in
- 10 <u>each high school of an eligible school entity shall be</u>
- 11 <u>trained under this program.</u>
- 12 (3) More than one eligible school entity may apply
- jointly to the program to train a teacher in advanced
- 14 placement course instruction if that teacher is to provide
- such instruction in more than one school entity either
- through classroom instruction or through virtual learning
- instruction.
- 18 (d) Application requirements for eligible school entities. --
- 19 The application by an eligible school entity seeking funding for
- 20 the program shall include the following:
- 21 (1) The subject areas that currently have advanced
- 22 placement courses in each of the school entity's high
- 23 schools.
- 24 (2) The subject areas among the four core academic areas
- 25 <u>that the school entity does not have an advanced placement</u>
- course in each of the school entity's high schools.
- 27 (3) The names of the eligible teachers, including:
- 28 (i) the high schools where they are teaching;
- 29 (ii) the advanced placement academic subject area
- that each of the teachers will be providing instruction;

2	(iii) whether the instruction will be in a
3	classroom, through virtual learning instruction, or both.
4	(4) The names of the eligible teacher training entities
5	that shall be providing the training for teachers in advanced
6	placement instruction.
7	(5) Agreement to offer the advanced placement course for
8	high school students for at least three years.
9	(6) Guidelines the school entity will use in determining
10	which students may be eligible to enroll in an advanced
11	placement course. In developing the guidelines, a school
12	entity shall utilize data and information on the academic
13	performance of students, which may include the academic
14	performance of students on the Pre-Scholastic Aptitude Test
15	and the Scholastic Aptitude Test in consultation with the
16	college board, and shall eliminate barriers that restrict
17	access to advanced placement courses for student populations
18	that have been traditionally underserved and shall make every
19	effort to ensure that advanced placement classes reflect the
20	diversity of the student population. The school entity shall
21	not discriminate on any basis in enrollment of the students
22	that is illegal under Federal or State law.
23	(7) Agreement to annually report to the department for
24	each of the four core academic areas that were taught by
25	teachers whose training was funded by this program. The
26	agreement shall include the following information:
27	(i) the number of students taking advanced placement
28	courses;
29	(ii) the grade levels where advanced placement is
30	<pre>being taught;</pre>

1	<u>(iii) the number of students who took advanced</u>
2	placement examinations; and
3	(iv) the number of students scoring a three or
4	higher on advanced placement examinations.
5	(8) Agreement to annually report to the department for
6	each of the four core academic areas the following
7	<pre>information:</pre>
8	(i) the number of students taking advanced placement
9	courses;
10	(ii) the grade levels where advanced placement is
11	<pre>being taught;</pre>
12	(iii) the number of students who took advanced
13	<pre>placement examinations;</pre>
14	(iv) the number of students scoring a three or
15	higher on advanced placement examinations; and
16	(v) the number of teachers teaching advanced
17	placement courses.
18	Section 1704-C. Powers and duties of department.
19	(a) Guidelines The department shall promulgate rules,
20	regulations and procedures necessary for the implementation of
21	this article, including the following:
22	(1) In consultation with the college board, certify
23	those teacher training entities that are endorsed by the
24	college board to provide training of teachers to teach
25	advanced placement courses in the four core academic areas.
26	(2) In certifying teacher training entities for this
27	program, the department shall ensure that the training times
28	and locations will be geographically accessible for teachers
29	from eligible school entities to attend.
30	(3) The department, in consultation with the college

1	board, shall ensure that training provided by teacher
2	training entities must provide teachers of advanced placement
3	courses with the necessary content knowledge and
4	instructional skills to prepare students for success in
5	advanced placement courses and examinations.
6	(4) Starting at the end of the first year of the program
7	and every year thereafter the department shall issue a report
8	to the General Assembly on the program that shall include:
9	(i) The number of teachers receiving training in
10	advanced placement instruction in school entities, school
11	districts and high schools in each of the four core
12	academic areas.
13	(ii) The number and percentage of high schools that
14	offer advanced placement courses in all four core
15	academic areas.
16	(iii) The number and percentage of high schools that
17	offer advanced placement courses in each of the four core
18	academic areas.
19	(iv) The number and percentage of students taking
20	advanced placement courses at school entities in each of
21	the four core academic areas.
22	(v) The number and percentage of students scoring a
23	three or more on an advanced placement examination at
24	school entities in each of the four core academic areas.
25	(vi) The number of school entities and high schools
26	that do not offer advanced placement courses.
27	(vii) The number of teachers trained outside the
28	four core academic areas teaching other advanced
29	placement courses.
30	(b) (Reserved).

- 1 <u>Section 1705-C. Funding to teacher training entities.</u>
- 2 To the extent funds are appropriated for this program, the
- 3 department shall allocate the funds based on per teacher
- 4 <u>attendance to each certified teacher training entity that</u>
- 5 provides training to a teacher to teach advanced placement
- 6 courses upon completion of the training program.
- 7 <u>Section 1706-C. Program funding.</u>
- 8 (a) Funding. -- Funding for this program shall be made from
- 9 <u>annual appropriations made by the General Assembly to the</u>
- 10 department for that purpose.
- 11 (b) Funding priorities. -- In the event that insufficient
- 12 moneys are appropriated in any fiscal year to provide funding
- 13 for all eligible school entities applying to the program, the
- 14 department shall prioritize funding of eligible school entities
- 15 based on the poverty level of the school districts in which high
- 16 school students who will be taking the advanced placement
- 17 courses reside.
- 18 Section 1707-C. Availability of advanced placement courses.
- 19 (a) Eligibility. -- Any school entity offering advanced
- 20 placement courses to students shall notify parents of their
- 21 availability and the guidelines the school entity uses in
- 22 determining which students may be eligible to enroll in an
- 23 advanced placement course.
- 24 (b) Publication and guidelines. -- Any school entity offering
- 25 advanced placement courses to students shall publish on the
- 26 school entity's Internet website the names of the advanced
- 27 placement courses being offered to students and the guidelines
- 28 the school entity uses in determining which students may be
- 29 <u>eligible to enroll in an advanced placement course.</u>
- 30 Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
