### AN ACT

8	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

10	Section 1. Article IX-A, act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30,
11	No.14), known as the "Public School Code of 1949," added May 4,
12	1970 (P.L.311, No.102), clause (16) of section 914-A added

17	INTERMEDIATE <u>SERVICE</u> UNITS
18	Section 901-A. Establishment of Intermediate Service
19	UnitsEach school district of the Commonwealth shall be
20	assigned to an intermediate service unit, and shall be entitled
21	to the services of an intermediate <u>service</u> unit in accordance

with a program of services adopted by the intermediate service 1 2 unit board of directors. The arrangement of the school districts 3 of the Commonwealth into intermediate service units shall reflect consideration of (i) the number of public school 4 5 children enrolled in kindergarten through grade twelve, (ii) ease of travel within each intermediate service unit, and (iii) 6 7 the opportunity to provide adequate basic services. Intermediate service units shall be part of the public school system of this 8 9 Commonwealth, and shall become operative on July 1, 1971. 10 Section 902-A. Arrangement of School Districts Into 11 Intermediate <u>Service</u> Units. -- The school districts are arranged in intermediate service units as follows: 12

Transfer of Membership. -- Any school district may apply for transfer from one intermediate service unit to 18 another intermediate service unit with which its boundaries are 19 20 contiguous by submitting a written request for such transfer to 21 the State Board of Education, along with reasons for requesting 22 such transfer and with the written approval or disapproval of all school districts within the intermediate service unit of 23 which the school district is a member and all school districts 24 25 within the intermediate service unit to which it wishes to 26 transfer. If the State Board of Education approves the transfer, 27 it shall be effective the following July 1. In no event shall a transfer be made without the approval of all the school 28 districts within all intermediate service units involved in said 29 30 transfer.

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1 Section 904-A. Merger of Intermediate Service Units .-- Two or more intermediate service units may, with the approval of a 2 3 majority of the members of each intermediate service unit board 4 of directors and all school districts within each intermediate 5 service unit, submit a written request to the State Board of Education for consolidation. If the State Board of Education 6 approves such consolidation, it shall be effective the following 7 8 July 1.

9 Section 905-A. Regulations.--The State Board of Education 10 shall adopt such regulations as it deems necessary to guide the 11 organization and operation of intermediate <u>service</u> units and to 12 provide procedures for amendment of the State plan of 13 intermediate service units.

14 Section 906-A. Program of Services.--From July 1, 1971 to 15 June 30, 1972, intermediate service units shall provide 16 essential services formerly provided by county boards of school 17 directors, collect and analyze informational data and adopt the 18 program of services to be provided by the intermediate service 19 unit. On or before May 1, 1971, and annually thereafter, each 20 intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall submit a program of services for 21 the next school year to the [Superintendent of Public 22 Instruction] <u>Secretary of Education</u> for budgetary approval. Such 23 program of services shall be developed and submitted in accordance with law, as hereinafter provided. 24

25 Section 907-A. Subsidies for Services.--Intermediate <u>service</u> 26 units shall receive subsidies from the Commonwealth as herein 27 provided only for services performed pursuant to and authorized 28 by law, as hereinafter provided. Nothing contained herein shall 29 prohibit intermediate <u>service</u> units from receiving funds from 30 school districts and other sources including nonpublic nonprofit 19730S1163B1364 - 11 - schools and expending such funds to provide additional services
 not included in the approved program of services.

3 Section 908-A. Special Pupil Services. -- All powers and 4 duties of county boards of school directors with respect to 5 special pupil services are hereby transferred to intermediate service unit boards of directors, effective July 1, 1971, and 6 7 all Commonwealth payments theretofore paid to county boards of school directors on account of special pupil services shall 8 9 thereafter be paid to intermediate <u>service</u> unit boards of 10 directors.

11 Section 909-A. Vocational-Technical Education.--All powers 12 and duties of county boards of school directors with respect to 13 vocational-technical education are hereby transferred to 14 intermediate <u>service</u> unit boards of directors, effective July 1, 15 1971; and all Commonwealth payments theretofore paid to county 16 boards of school directors on account of vocational-technical education shall thereafter be paid to intermediate service unit 17 18 boards of directors.

19 Section 910-A. Intermediate Service Unit Board of Directors.--(a) Each intermediate service unit board of 20 21 directors shall be composed of thirteen members, chosen for 22 terms of three years from among members of the boards of school directors of school districts comprising the intermediate 23 24 service unit. An intermediate service unit director may succeed 25 himself for two additional terms. Unless there are fewer than 26 thirteen school districts in an intermediate service unit, at no 27 time shall more than one director from any school district be elected to an intermediate service unit board of directors. 28 Where there are fewer than thirteen school districts within an 29 30 intermediate service unit, there shall be at least one school - 12 -19730S1163B1364

director from each school district elected to the intermediate 1 service unit board of directors. The election of intermediate 2 3 service unit boards of directors shall be by proportionate 4 ballot, and each school director of each school district within 5 an intermediate service unit shall be entitled to cast votes 6 determined by dividing the weighted average daily membership of 7 the school district by the total weighted average daily membership within the intermediate service unit, multiplying the 8 quotient so obtained by one thousand, dividing the product so 9 10 obtained by thirteen, and rounding such dividend to the nearest 11 whole number: Provided, however, That each school director shall have at least one vote. The [Superintendent of Public 12 13 Instruction] Secretary of Education shall annually, not later 14 than the first day of February, certify the weighted average 15 daily membership for the previous school year for each school 16 district and for each intermediate service unit, and shall 17 compute the number of votes to which each school director of 18 each school district within an intermediate service unit shall 19 be entitled.

(b) Except for the initial election, directors shall be
elected annually in April by convention of the school directors
of the school districts comprising an intermediate <u>service</u> unit
as follows: five every third year, four each other year.
Intermediate <u>service</u> unit boards of directors shall organize
annually in July.

(c) The initial election of directors shall be held between the effective date of this act and January 15, 1971; and thirteen directors shall be elected for terms to begin on January 15, 1971, to expire for four directors on June 30, 1972, for four directors on June 30, 1973 and for five directors on 19730S1163B1364 - 13 - June 30, 1974. From the date of election to July 1, 1971 the
 directors elected initially shall serve as intermediate <u>service</u>
 unit planning committees to plan for the operations of
 intermediate <u>service</u> units commencing July 1, 1971.

5 (d) Vacancies on an intermediate service unit board of directors shall be filled by appointment by majority vote of the 6 remaining intermediate service unit directors. A director so 7 appointed shall serve until the annual convention, at which time 8 the convention shall elect a director to serve the unexpired 9 10 portion of the term. An intermediate service unit director 11 elected to fill a vacancy may succeed himself for three additional terms. Vacancies shall occur upon the death, 12 13 resignation, or removal of an intermediate service unit director, or when he no longer holds office as a school 14 director. In the event vacancies exist or occur in the 15 16 membership of all of the members of an intermediate service unit 17 board of directors, a special convention, called by the 18 [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of Education, shall be held of school directors of the school districts 19 20 comprising the intermediate service unit for the purpose of electing directors to fill the vacancies. 21

(e) Any member of an intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors may be removed in the same manner and for the same cause as provided by law for removal of members of boards of school directors.

26 (f) Elections of intermediate <u>service</u> unit directors and the 27 organization of intermediate <u>service</u> unit boards of directors 28 shall be conducted in accordance with regulations adopted by the 29 State Board of Education.

30 (g) In the case of an intermediate <u>service</u> unit comprised of 19730S1163B1364 - 14 - a single school district, the board of education of the school
 district shall be the intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of
 directors.

4 Section 911-A. Annual Conventions. -- The executive director 5 of each intermediate service unit shall call a convention to be held annually in April for the purpose of electing members to 6 the intermediate service unit board of directors, approval of 7 the budget of the intermediate service unit by a majority of 8 votes of the directors present and voting and for the 9 10 consideration and discussion of matters pertaining to the 11 improvement of education in the public schools within the intermediate service unit and such other business as may 12 13 properly come before the convention. The executive director 14 shall at least one week prior to such annual convention furnish 15 each director of each district comprising the unit with a 16 printed copy of the budget proposed for adoption. In addition, 17 the intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors may call into 18 special convention the school directors of all school districts 19 within an intermediate service unit at any time for the 20 consideration of business which may properly come before a 21 special convention. On petition of a majority of the school 22 directors of all school districts within the unit for a special 23 convention for a stated purpose relating to proper business of the intermediate service unit, the intermediate service unit 24 25 board of directors shall call into special convention the school 26 directors of all school districts within the unit for 27 consideration of such stated purpose. Notice to each such 28 district director shall be given at least five days prior to 29 such special convention.

30 Section 912-A. Election of Officers.--(a) During the month 19730S1163B1364 - 15 - of July, 1971, each intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors
 shall elect a president and a vice president from among its
 members, a secretary and a treasurer, who need not be members.
 The treasurer may be any corporation duly qualified and legally
 authorized to transact a fiduciary business in the Commonwealth.
 (b) Before entering upon his duties, the treasurer shall

7 furnish a bond in an amount and with surety or sureties as the 8 intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors shall approve, 9 conditioned upon the faithful performance of his duties. The 10 cost of the bond shall be paid out of the funds of the 11 intermediate <u>service</u> unit. No bond shall be required where a 12 bank or trust company serves as treasurer.

13 (c) Not later than January 15, 1971, each intermediate 14 <u>service</u> unit planning committee shall elect officers in the 15 manner provided herein, to serve until the election of officers 16 in July, 1971.

17 Section 913-A. Staff.--(a) The staff of an intermediate 18 service unit shall consist of an executive director and such 19 assistant executive directors, program specialists, and other 20 personnel as the intermediate service unit board of directors 21 deems necessary to employ. In the case of an intermediate 22 service unit comprised of a single school district, the district superintendent shall serve as executive director of the 23 24 intermediate service unit. His salary shall not be charged to 25 the intermediate service unit budget; and, the salary of his 26 assistants shall be charged to the intermediate service unit 27 budget only to the extent that such assistants are engaged in providing approved intermediate service unit services as 28 determined by the executive director. 29

30 (b) An executive director shall be appointed by each 19730S1163B1364 - 16 -

intermediate service unit board of directors for a term of four 1 years: Provided, That the initial term shall commence July 1, 2 3 1971 and terminate June 30, 1974: And, provided further, however, That each intermediate service unit planning committee 4 5 may employ an executive director-elect to serve prior to July 1, 1971. An executive director shall hold a commission issued by 6 the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of 7 Education, in accordance with regulations adopted by the State 8 Board of Education. 9

10 (c) Assistant executive directors may be appointed by each intermediate service unit board of directors upon recommendation 11 of the executive director for a term of four years: Provided, 12 13 That the initial term shall commence July 1, 1971, and terminate 14 June 30, 1974: And provided further, however, That each 15 intermediate <u>service</u> unit planning committee may employ 16 assistant executive directors-elect upon recommendation of the executive director-elect to serve prior to July 1, 1971. An 17 assistant executive director shall hold a commission issued by 18 the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of 19 20 Education, in accordance with regulations adopted by the State Board of Education. 21

(d) All persons holding a commission for the office of county superintendent or assistant county superintendent valid for the term of office beginning July 1966, shall be eligible for election to the office of executive director or assistant executive director in 1971, and, if elected to either office, shall remain eligible for election or reelection to either office thereafter.

29 (e) All professional and temporary professional employes of 30 an intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall have the same rights of 19730S1163B1364 - 17 - tenure, minimum salaries and increments, leaves of absence
 because of illness, professional study or physical disability,
 sabbatical leaves, military leaves and exchange teacher leaves
 as professional and temporary professional employes of school
 districts.

6 (f) Program specialists shall satisfy minimum qualifications7 adopted by the State Board of Education.

8 (g) All employes of an intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall be 9 eligible for and become members of the Public School Employes' 10 Retirement System of Pennsylvania, except that members of the 11 State Employes' Retirement System may elect to remain members of 12 such retirement system.

13 (h) All persons employed by an intermediate service unit 14 prior to July 1, 1971, other than the executive director and 15 assistant executive directors, shall be selected, as the need arises, and to the extent such persons are available, from among 16 17 those persons who, on the effective date of this act, are 18 employed by or assigned to the offices of the county boards of 19 school directors replaced by the intermediate service unit. 20 Position placement and salaries shall be determined by an intermediate service unit board of directors upon recommendation 21 22 of the executive director, who shall be guided by the program of services to be offered by the intermediate service unit. 23 Section 914-A. Powers and Duties of the Intermediate Service 24 25 Unit Board of Directors. -- An intermediate service unit board of

26 directors shall have the power and its duty shall be:

27 (1) To appoint an executive director and determine his28 salary.

29 (2) To appoint assistant executive directors upon 30 recommendation of the executive director and determine their 19730S1163B1364 - 18 - 1 salaries.

2 (3) To approve professional staff appointments made by the3 executive director.

4 (4) To adopt employment policies for nonprofessional staff. 5 (5) To adopt a program of services. Each intermediate service unit may provide, but shall, except as hereinafter 6 provided, be limited to, the following services; (i) curriculum 7 8 development and instructional improvement services; (ii) educational planning services; (iii) instructional materials 9 10 services; (iv) continuing professional education services; (v) 11 pupil personnel services; (vi) State and Federal agency liaison services, and (vii) management services. Each additional service 12 13 to be provided shall be first approved by a majority of all the boards of school directors comprising the intermediate service 14 15 unit at a meeting called by the intermediate service unit board 16 of directors for the express purpose of approving or 17 disapproving any such additional service. Each intermediate 18 service unit may provide for the furnishing of any of the services mentioned in this clause or elsewhere in this act to 19 20 nonpublic, nonprofit schools which schools are hereby authorized 21 to contract for and purchase services from intermediate service 22 units so as to participate in the intermediate program. 23 (6) To adopt and advertise the intermediate <u>service</u> unit 24 budget. The budget shall be approved by (i) at least a majority 25 of the school districts comprising the intermediate service 26 unit; and (ii) at least a majority of the proportionate votes of 27 all school directors present and voting in convention, and shall 28 be filed annually with the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of Education and advertised or notice 29 30 thereof given to the public in each of its component school - 19 -19730S1163B1364

districts as required of local school district budgets by 1 2 section 687 of this act on or before the first day of May. 3 Budgeted expenditures shall be those expenditures classified as 4 current expenses, capital outlays, debt redemptions and outgoing 5 transfers according to the Manual of Accounting and Related Financial Procedures for Pennsylvania School Systems and 6 amendments and supplements thereto published by the [Department 7 8 of Public Instruction] Department of Education.

9 (7) To provide for and conduct programs of services 10 authorized by the State Board of Education, including services 11 performed under contract with component school districts. Except as otherwise provided by law, all powers and duties of county 12 13 boards of school directors in regard to classes and schools for 14 exceptional children, educational broadcasting, audio-visual 15 libraries, instructional materials centers, area technical 16 schools and area vocational-technical schools are hereby 17 transferred to and conferred upon intermediate service unit 18 boards of directors. An intermediate service unit may contract 19 with school districts to provide services on behalf of the 20 intermediate service unit.

21 (8) To contract for specialized services.

(9) To receive Federal, State, school district and other moneys and expend the same to conduct programs of services. (10) To designate one or more banks or bank and trust companies as a depository or depositories for its funds. Each such depository shall furnish a bond or collateral in lieu thereof as is provided in the case of depositories of school funds.

29 (11) To lease land, buildings and equipment.

30 (12) To employ a solicitor for such purposes as may be 19730S1163B1364 - 20 - 1 required and fix his compensation.

2 (13) To select a name for the intermediate <u>service</u> unit,
3 which shall be filed with and approved by the [Superintendent of
4 Public Instruction] <u>Secretary of Education</u>.

5 (14) To consolidate and let combined bids for bulk6 purchases.

7 (15) To perform such other duties as may be required by8 regulation of the State Board of Education.

9 (16) To prepare and submit to the State Board for Vocational 10 Education proposals for arranging school districts of the 11 intermediate service unit into area vocational-technical attendance areas or any revisions thereof. A school district in 12 an adjacent intermediate service unit may be included in such 13 14 proposed attendance area with the concurring approval of the board of school directors of the school district and the 15 intermediate service unit to which it belongs. 16

17 (17) To coordinate transportation within the intermediate
18 service unit.

Section 915-A. Powers and Duties of Executive Director.--The executive director of an intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall have the power and his duty shall be:

22 (1) To administer the intermediate <u>service</u> unit program of23 services.

24 (2) To appoint professional staff subject to the approval of
25 the intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors.

26 (3) To employ nonprofessional staff in accordance with
27 employment policies of the intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of
28 directors.

29 (4) To prepare the budget for adoption by the intermediate
30 <u>service</u> unit board of directors.

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(5) To direct expenditures of funds within the budget or
 other authorizations of the intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of
 directors.

4 (6) To appoint such advisory groups as will assist the staff5 in providing programs of services for school districts.

6 (7) To provide the [Superintendent of Public Instruction]
7 <u>Secretary of Education</u> with information, reports and services.
8 (8) To perform such other duties as may be required by the
9 intermediate <u>service</u> unit board of directors and the regulations
10 of the State Board of Education.

11 Section 916-A. Intermediate <u>Service</u> Unit Council.--Each 12 intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall have an Intermediate <u>Service</u> 13 Unit Council composed of all chief school administrators within 14 the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, to be advisory to the executive 15 director.

16 The executive director of the intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall 17 serve as chairman of the Intermediate <u>Service</u> unit Council. 18 The Intermediate <u>Service</u> Unit Council shall meet at least 19 five times each year and may meet at any other time upon the 20 call of the executive director.

21 Section 917-A. Allocations.--In January 1971, and annually 22 thereafter in January, the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of Education shall allocate to each 23 intermediate service unit a portion of the amount included in 24 25 the Governor's budget for the succeeding fiscal year for the 26 support of intermediate <u>service</u> units. The allocation shall be 27 made in the following manner: (1) Determine for each 28 intermediate <u>service</u> unit the total weighted average daily 29 membership of all school districts comprising the intermediate 30 service unit; (2) compute an aid ratio for each intermediate 19730S1163B1364 - 22 -

service unit in the same manner as in the case of school 1 districts; (3) determine a weight factor for each intermediate 2 service unit by multiplying the total weighted average daily 3 membership of all school districts comprising the intermediate 4 5 service unit by the aid ratio of the intermediate service unit; (4) determine a statewide value per weight factor by dividing 6 7 the amount provided in the Governor's budget for the succeeding fiscal year for the support of intermediate service units by the 8 total weight factors of all intermediate service units within 9 10 the Commonwealth; and (5) determine the allocation to each 11 intermediate <u>service</u> unit by multiplying its weight factor by the statewide value per weight factor: Provided, That no 12 13 intermediate service unit shall be allocated less than the 14 amount received during the 1968-1969 school year by the offices 15 of county superintendents of schools replaced by the 16 intermediate service unit from the Commonwealth and the estimated value of assistance from the respective counties, as 17 determined by the [Department of Public Instruction] Secretary 18 19 of Education.

Section 918-A. General Operating Subsidy.--(a) On or before the first day of May 1971, and annually thereafter, each intermediate <u>service</u> unit shall submit to the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] <u>Secretary of Education</u> for prior review and approval, a budget estimating the cost of operating and administering the intermediate <u>service</u> unit program of services for the ensuing school year.

(b) In May 1971, and annually thereafter in May, the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] <u>Secretary of Education</u> shall estimate the amount to be paid by the Commonwealth to each intermediate <u>service</u> unit based upon approved budgets. In July 19730S1163B1364 - 23 -

1971, and annually thereafter in July, the Commonwealth shall 1 2 pay to each intermediate service unit an advance payment equal 3 to one-half of such estimated amount. In December 1971, the 4 Commonwealth shall pay to each intermediate service unit the 5 balance of such estimated amount. In December 1972, and annually thereafter in December, the Commonwealth shall pay to each 6 intermediate service unit the balance of the State's share of 7 8 the budget approved for such school year, less any State funds paid in the previous school year which were unexpended or 9 10 unencumbered at the end of the previous school year. 11 In computing approved budget expenditures, the (C) [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of Education 12 13 shall not consider Federal payments and payments by the Commonwealth on behalf of the Federal Government. 14 15 Section 919-A. Capital Subsidy.--All leases for office 16 space, classrooms, buses, garages, warehouse space, equipment 17 and similar facilities shall be pre-approved by the 18 [Superintendent of Public Instruction] Secretary of Education. The Commonwealth shall pay to each intermediate service unit on 19 20 account of approved leases annually from funds appropriated for 21 such purposes an amount computed by applying the intermediate 22 service unit aid ratio to the approved lease payment. The aid 23 ratio computed initially shall apply as a minimum for the duration of the lease. 24

Section 920-A. School District Payments.--(a) Where the approved budget exceeds the allocation to the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, each school district within the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, shall contribute to the intermediate <u>service</u> unit a share of the amount by which the budget exceeds the allocation computed in the following manner: (1) Determine a weight factor 19730S1163B1364 - 24 -

for each school district by multiplying the school district's 1 weighted average daily membership by the difference between 2 3 1.0000 and the school district's aid ratio; (2) determine a value per weight factor for the intermediate service unit by 4 5 dividing the amount by which the budget exceeds the allocation by the total weight factors of all school districts comprising 6 the intermediate service unit; and (3) determine each school 7 district's share by multiplying the value per weight factor by 8 the weight factor of the school district. 9

10 (b) Less than a majority of the school districts comprising 11 an intermediate <u>service</u> unit may contract with the intermediate 12 <u>service</u> unit for services to be provided for the contracting 13 school districts by the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, with the cost 14 of such services to be paid by the contracting school districts 15 in such manner as they may agree upon.

16 (c) If a school district desires to independently provide a service that is included in the approved program of services to 17 18 be offered by an intermediate service unit, and the service is to be financed solely by the school district, and if the 19 20 intermediate service unit board of directors determines that the 21 quality of such service is adequate and that such independent 22 action will not adversely affect the service to be offered to the remaining districts by the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, the 23 intermediate service unit board of directors may relieve the 24 25 school district of payment for such service.

(d) Payments due from school districts to an intermediate
service unit shall be withheld by the Commonwealth from
subsidies payable to school districts during November and paid
to the intermediate service unit not later than January 1 each
year.

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Section 921-A. Financial Reports.--An annual financial report shall be submitted to the [Superintendent of Public Instruction] <u>Secretary of Education</u> by each intermediate <u>service</u> unit not later than the first day of October, together with an auditor's report prepared by an independent auditor who shall be a certified public accountant or other competent public accountant.

8 Section 922-A. Auxiliary Services; Nonpublic School Children.--(a) Legislative Finding; Declaration of Policy. The 9 10 welfare of the Commonwealth requires that the present and future 11 generations of school age children be assured ample opportunity to develop to the fullest their intellectual capacities. To 12 13 further this objective, the Commonwealth provides, through tax 14 funds of the Commonwealth, auxiliary services free of charge to 15 children attending public schools within the Commonwealth. 16 Approximately one quarter of all children in the Commonwealth, 17 in compliance with the compulsory attendance provisions of this 18 act, attend nonpublic schools. Although their parents are 19 taxpayers of the Commonwealth, these children do not receive 20 auxiliary services from the Commonwealth. It is the intent of 21 the General Assembly by this enactment to assure the providing 22 of such auxiliary services in such a manner that every school 23 child in the Commonwealth will equitably share in the benefits 24 thereof.

(b) Definitions. The following terms, whenever used or referred to in this section, shall have the following meanings, except in those circumstances where the context clearly indicates otherwise:

29 "Nonpublic school" means any school, other than a public 30 school within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, wherein a 19730S1163B1364 - 26 - resident of the Commonwealth may legally fulfill the compulsory
 school attendance requirements of this act and which meet the
 requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Public
 Law 88-352).

5 "Auxiliary services" means guidance, counseling and testing services; psychological services; services for exceptional 6 7 children; remedial and therapeutic services; speech and hearing services; services for the improvement of the educationally 8 disadvantaged (such as, but not limited to, teaching English as 9 10 a second language), and such other secular, neutral, non-11 ideological services as are of benefit to nonpublic school children and are presently or hereafter provided for public 12 13 school children of the Commonwealth.

(c) Provision of Services. Pursuant to rules and 14 15 regulations established by the secretary, each intermediate 16 service unit shall provide auxiliary services to all children 17 who are enrolled in grades kindergarten through twelve in 18 nonpublic schools wherein the requirements of the compulsory 19 attendance provisions of this act may be met and which are 20 located within the area served by the intermediate <u>service</u> unit, 21 such auxiliary services to be provided in their respective 22 schools. The secretary shall each year apportion to each 23 intermediate service unit an amount equal to the cost of 24 providing such services but in no case shall the amount 25 apportioned be in excess of thirty dollars (\$30) per pupil 26 enrolled in nonpublic schools within the area served by the intermediate service unit. 27

Section 923-A. Loan of Textbooks, Instructional Materials and Equipment, Nonpublic School Children.--(a) Legislative Findings; Declaration of Policy. The welfare of the Commonwealth - 27 -

requires that the present and future generations of school age 1 2 children be assured ample opportunity to develop to the fullest their intellectual capacities. To further this objective, the 3 Commonwealth provides, through tax funds of the Commonwealth, 4 5 textbooks and instructional materials free of charge to children attending public schools within the Commonwealth. Approximately 6 7 one quarter of all children in the Commonwealth, in compliance with the compulsory attendance provisions of this act, attend 8 9 nonpublic schools. Although their parents are taxpayers of the 10 Commonwealth, these children do not receive textbooks or 11 instructional materials from the Commonwealth. It is the intent of the General Assembly by this enactment to assure such a 12 13 distribution of such educational aids that every school child in 14 the Commonwealth will equitably share in the benefits thereof. 15 (b) Definitions. The following terms, whenever used or 16 referred to in this section, shall have the following meanings, 17 except in those circumstances where the context clearly 18 indicates otherwise:

19 "Instructional equipment" means instructional equipment, 20 other than fixtures annexed to and forming part of the real 21 estate, which is suitable for and to be used by children and/or 22 teachers. The term includes but is not limited to projection equipment, recording equipment, laboratory equipment, and any 23 24 other educational secular, neutral, non-ideological equipment as 25 may be of benefit to the instruction of nonpublic school 26 children and are presently or hereafter provided for public school children of the Commonwealth. 27

Instructional materials" means books, periodicals, documents, pamphlets, photographs, reproductions, pictorial or graphic works, musical scores, maps, charts, globes, sound 19730S1163B1364 - 28 -

recordings, including but not limited to those on discs and 1 2 tapes, processed slides, transparencies, films, filmstrips, 3 kinescopes, and video tapes, or any other printed and published materials of a similar nature made by any method now developed 4 5 or hereafter to be developed. The term includes such other secular, neutral, non-ideological materials as are of benefit to 6 7 the instruction of nonpublic school children and are presently or hereafter provided for public school children of the 8 9 Commonwealth.

10 "Nonpublic school" means any school, other than a public 11 school within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, wherein a 12 resident of the Commonwealth may legally fulfill the compulsory 13 school attendance requirements of this act and which meet the 14 requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Public 15 Law 88-352).

16 "Textbooks" means books, reusable workbooks, or manuals, whether bound or in looseleaf form, intended for use as a 17 18 principal source of study material for a given class or group of 19 students, a copy of which is expected to be available for the 20 individual use of each pupil in such class or group. Such 21 textbooks shall be textbooks which are acceptable for use in any 22 public, elementary, or secondary school of the Commonwealth. 23 (c) Loan of Textbooks. The Secretary of Education directly, 24 or through the intermediate service units, shall have the power 25 and duty to purchase textbooks and, upon individual request, to 26 loan them to all children residing in the Commonwealth who are 27 enrolled in grades kindergarten through twelve of a nonpublic 28 school wherein the requirements of the compulsory attendance 29 provisions of this act may be met. Such textbooks shall be 30 loaned free to such children subject to such rules and - 29 -19730S1163B1364

regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of Education. 1 (d) Purchase of Books. The secretary shall not be required 2 3 to purchase or otherwise acquire textbooks, pursuant to this 4 section, the total cost of which, in any school year, shall exceed an amount equal to ten dollars (\$10) multiplied by the 5 number of children residing in the Commonwealth who on the first 6 day of October of such school year are enrolled in grades 7 kindergarten through twelve of a nonpublic school within the 8 Commonwealth in which the requirements of the compulsory 9 10 attendance provisions of this act may be met.

11 (e) Purchase of Instructional Materials and Equipment. Pursuant to requests from the appropriate nonpublic school 12 13 official on behalf of nonpublic school pupils, the Secretary of 14 Education shall have the power and duty to purchase directly, or 15 through the intermediate service units, or otherwise acquire, and to loan to such nonpublic schools, instructional materials 16 17 and equipment, useful to the education of such children, the 18 total cost of which, in any school year, shall be an amount 19 equal to but not more than twenty-five dollars (\$25) multiplied 20 by the number of children residing in the Commonwealth who on the first day of October of such school year, are enrolled in 21 22 grades kindergarten through twelve of a nonpublic school in which the requirements of the compulsory attendance provisions 23 of this act may be met. 24

25 Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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
