## AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," creating a financial incentive for school districts to reduce class sizes in kindergarten through third grade.

The General Assembly finds that it is in the public interest that school districts in this Commonwealth establish and maintain small class sizes, particularly for children in kindergarten and the early grades who have varying needs and maturation levels. Research and experience demonstrate that young children in small classes have higher achievement than young children in larger classes where they may have difficulty adhering to standardized norms of progress and achievement.

Self-esteem and confidence can be established or damaged by the child's experience in the lower grades. Small class size, by allowing individual help and assistance, and by allowing teachers to construct an individual plan for each child's progress, provides a better foundation for future learning and achievement in the higher grades.

The General Assembly, therefore, declares that the purpose of this act is to provide financial incentives to school districts to maintain or achieve small class size in the lower grades. However, it is not the intention of the General Assembly that class size in the higher grades be increased so that districts may qualify for this financial assistance. The money authorized by this act is designed to increase the level of commitment of the Commonwealth and its school districts to quality education at grades kindergarten through third grade.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section 2501 of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding clauses to read:

Section 2501. Definitions.--For the purposes of this article the following terms shall have the following meanings:

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(10.3) "Reduced Class Size Supplement." Districts that have students enrolled in classrooms of twenty-one (21) students or less in kindergarten through third grade shall be entitled to a "Reduced Class Size Supplement" which shall be in addition to any other State funding to which the district is entitled. After the district's instructional subsidy has been calculated pursuant to the provisions of this act, the district shall then
