AN ACT

Amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), entitled 1 "An act providing for and reorganizing the conduct of the 2 3 executive and administrative work of the Commonwealth by the 4 Executive Department thereof and the administrative 5 departments, boards, commissions, and officers thereof, б including the boards of trustees of State Normal Schools, or 7 Teachers Colleges; abolishing, creating, reorganizing or 8 authorizing the reorganization of certain administrative 9 departments, boards, and commissions; defining the powers and 10 duties of the Governor and other executive and administrative 11 officers, and of the several administrative departments, 12 boards, commissions, and officers; fixing the salaries of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and certain other executive 13 14 and administrative officers; providing for the appointment of 15 certain administrative officers, and of all deputies and other assistants and employes in certain departments, boards, 16 and commissions; and prescribing the manner in which the 17 18 number and compensation of the deputies and all other 19 assistants and employes of certain departments, boards and 20 commissions shall be determined, " further providing for the 21 powers and duties of the Board of the Ben Franklin 22 Partnership Fund.

23 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

1 hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section 2503-B of the act of April 9, 1929
(P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929,
amended December 6, 1982 (P.L.774, No.223) and December 15, 1988
(P.L.1239, No.152), is amended to read:

6 Section 2503-B. Duties and Powers of the Board of the Ben Franklin Partnership Fund.--(a) The Board of the Ben Franklin 7 Partnership Fund is authorized to promote, stimulate and 8 encourage (i) basic and applied scientific research and 9 10 development in Pennsylvania and (ii) scientific and 11 technological education in Pennsylvania, which may reasonably be expected to advance the Commonwealth's economic growth and 12 13 welfare. In addition, the board shall, upon request, provide 14 advice to the Governor and the executive agencies concerning 15 scientific, technological and engineering matters, which relate 16 to the economic growth and the health, safety and welfare of the 17 Commonwealth and its citizens; shall establish a program to 18 assist Pennsylvania small businesses to enter into exporting activities; and may establish advanced technology centers which 19 20 shall serve as university-based consortiums between business, 21 universities and government to provide advanced technology 22 research and development, training, education and related 23 activities which show significant potential in diversification 24 of Pennsylvania's economy and the State's economic growth. 25 (b) With the approval of the Governor, the board is 26 authorized to enter into mutually satisfactory contracts, 27 agreements or grants with educational institutions, nonprofit institutions and organizations, business enterprises and other 28 29 persons concerned with scientific and technological research, 30 and development in the Commonwealth, as well as any State or

Federal agency, to foster and support scientific and 1 technological research, development, education and promotion of 2 3 applied advanced technology activities. The board may, subject 4 to the approval of the Governor, make grants to educational 5 institutions, nonprofit institutions and organizations, and other persons for the same purposes. The board may sponsor and 6 conduct conferences and studies, collect and disseminate 7 information, and issue periodic reports relating to scientific 8 9 and technological research, development, and education in the 10 Commonwealth, including grants for Governor's chairs to 11 Pennsylvania colleges and universities in the field of new materials; maintain registers and inventories of scientific and 12 13 technological personnel and facilities, including but not limited to scientific libraries and data centers. It may receive 14 15 gifts, grants, bequests or devises from any source, including 16 funds from the Federal government.

17 (b.1) With the approval of the Governor, the board is

18 authorized to enter into mutually satisfactory contracts,

19 agreements or grants with educational institutions, nonprofit

20 institutions and organizations, business enterprises and other

21 persons, as well as any Federal or State agency, to foster and

22 <u>support a program to assist Pennsylvania small businesses to</u>

23 enter into exporting activities. The board may, subject to the

24 approval of the Governor, make grants to educational

25 institutions, nonprofit institutions and organizations, and

26 other persons for the same purposes. The board may sponsor and

27 <u>conduct conferences and studies, collect and disseminate</u>

28 information, issue periodic reports and maintain data centers on

29 exporting programs, activities and assistance for Pennsylvania

30 small businesses. It may receive gifts, grants, bequests or

1 devises from any source, including funds from the Federal

2 government.

3 (c) The board may enter into a matching grant program, 4 involving consortiums of college or university and private 5 sector organizations for the purposes of establishing, operating and promoting advanced technology centers throughout the 6 Commonwealth. Such centers shall receive no more than fifty per 7 centum (50%) of their financial support from this board. 8 Applicants for funds provided under this section shall secure 9 10 financial commitments from profit and nonprofit groups and 11 organizations, including the Federal government or local political subdivisions and shall be required to submit 12 applications in accordance with policies and criteria issued by 13 14 the board. The board shall utilize adequate financial controls, 15 including a program of audits, to implement the matching grant 16 program. Such centers shall utilize to the extent possible, 17 existing or new private businesses operating or willing to 18 operate in the fields of expertise needed to accomplish the 19 purposes of the center. Eligible purposes which the board may 20 fund under this matching grant program include, but are not 21 limited to:

(1) Development and strengthening of joint research and development efforts including facilities for advanced technologies activities, equipment, personnel, land and related activities, which will lead to new technologies which will create or preserve jobs.

(2) Providing training and curriculum development related to
advanced technology in order to provide a skilled work force to
secure employment in advanced technology industries.

on an areawide or Statewide basis to transfer research and
 development activities into the marketplace.

3 (4) Assistance through small business incubators, including,
4 but not limited to space, services and technical assistance.
5 (5) Market development, feasibility studies and other
6 activities related to increasing jobs in advanced technology
7 industries.

8 (6) Staff support for advanced technology councils or other 9 mechanisms to encourage labor, business, university and 10 governmental linkages in promoting advanced technology 11 industrial diversification.

12 (7) Facilitate establishment of technology parks, which will
13 serve as locations for facilities devoted to research and
14 development and technology-intensive light manufacturing.

15 (c.1) The board may enter into a matching grant program,

16 involving consortiums of college or university and private

17 sector organizations for the purposes of establishing, operating

18 and promoting small business export assistance centers

19 throughout this Commonwealth to assist small businesses in

20 Pennsylvania which desire to export their products. Such centers

21 shall receive no more than fifty per centum (50%) of their

22 financial support from this board. Applicants for funds provided

23 <u>under this section shall secure financial commitments from</u>

24 profit and nonprofit groups and organizations, including the

25 Federal government or local political subdivisions and shall be

26 required to submit applications in accordance with policies and

27 criteria issued by the board. The board shall utilize adequate

28 financial controls, including a program of audits, to implement

29 the matching grant program. Such centers shall utilize to the

30 extent possible, existing or new private businesses operating or

1 willing to operate in the fields of expertise needed to

2 accomplish the purposes of the center.

3 (d) The Ben Franklin Partnership Fund, together with its statutory functions and duties, shall terminate and go out of 4 existence on December 31, 1998, unless reestablished or 5 continued by the General Assembly. Evaluation and review, 6 termination, reestablishment and continuation of the agency 7 8 shall be conducted pursuant to the provisions of the act of December 22, 1981 (P.L.508, No.142), known as the "Sunset Act." 9 (e) As used in this section, the following words and phrases 10 shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection: 11 12 "Small business" means an independently owned and operated 13 for-profit business concern employing two hundred fifty (250) or fewer employes. 14

15 Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
