AN ACT

- 1 Amending the act of June 22, 1964 (Sp.Sess., P.L.84, No.6),
- 2 entitled "An act to codify, amend, revise and consolidate the
- laws relating to eminent domain, "further providing for
- 4 effect of condemnation on subsequent value.
- 5 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 6 hereby enacts as follows:
- 7 Section 1. Section 606 of the act of June 22, 1964
- 8 (Sp.Sess., P.L.84, No.6), known as the Eminent Domain Code, is
- 9 amended to read:
- 10 Section 606. Effect of Condemnation Use on After Value. -- In
- 11 determining the fair market value of the remaining property
- 12 after a partial taking, consideration shall be given to the use
- 13 to which the property condemned is to be put and the damages or
- 14 benefits specially affecting the remaining property due to its
- 15 proximity to the improvement for which the property was taken.
- 16 This consideration shall include apprehension of injuries to
- 17 person or property and diminution in value of property which

- 1 result from the use to which the property condemned is to be
- 2 put. Future damages and general benefits which will affect the
- 3 entire community beyond the properties directly abutting the
- 4 property taken shall not be considered in arriving at the after
- 5 value. Special benefits to the remaining property shall in no
- 6 event exceed the total damages except in such cases where the
- 7 condemnor is authorized under existing law, to make special
- 8 assessments for benefits.
- 9 Section 2. The amendment of section 606 of the act shall
- 10 apply to condemnations initiated on or after March 5, 1993.
- 11 Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
