A RESOLUTION

- 1 Endorsing "Canine Good Citizen" programs.
- 2 WHEREAS, Dogs play an important role in the lives of many
- 3 Pennsylvania citizens by serving as companions and assistance
- 4 animals; and
- 5 WHEREAS, It is recognized that the "bad dog" problem is most
- 6 often an irresponsible owner problem; and
- WHEREAS, Responsible pet ownership is encouraged in this
- 8 Commonwealth and responsible owners should properly confine and
- 9 provide adequate training for their dogs; and
- 10 WHEREAS, "Canine Good Citizen" programs identify and
- 11 officially recognize those dogs who behave as members in good
- 12 standing with the community; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The "Canine Good Citizen" concept was developed to
- 14 teach pet owners that dogs should exhibit functional good
- 15 citizen behaviors in the presence of other people and animals in
- 16 both the home and the community; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Because many Pennsylvanians are the victims of
- 2 animal bites each year and there is a need for dogs to be well-
- 3 behaved members of the community; therefore be it
- 4 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives endorse "Canine
- 5 Good Citizen" programs as a means of teaching owners responsible
- 6 pet ownership, and as a means of teaching dogs canine good
- 7 citizen behaviors for the community; and be it further
- 8 RESOLVED, That the Commonwealth encourage dog training
- 9 programs and kennel clubs to provide training and education for
- 10 community pet owners that emphasizes the importance of properly
- 11 confining and controlling dogs and providing training which
- 12 results in "Canine Good Citizens."
