AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An 1 act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 3 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial 4 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the 5 laws relating thereto, " imposing restrictions on certain programs; further providing for the adoption of annual 6 7 budgets; and providing for voter approval of certain adopted 8 budgets.

9 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

10 hereby enacts as follows:

11 Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known

12 as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding sections

13 to read:

14 <u>Section 113. Limitation on Program Initiatives and</u>

15 Expansions. -- The board of school directors of a school district

16 shall not be required to implement a Commonwealth-mandated new

17 program or expand an existing program unless the necessary cost

18 of the new or expanded program is fully funded by the

1 <u>Commonwealth.</u>

2 Section 613. Budgetary Preparation and Voter Referendum .--3 (a) (1) The provisions of this subsection apply to any school 4 district which operates on a fiscal year that begins on the 5 first day of January. (2) For purposes of section 664 or 687, the board of public 6 education or the board of school directors shall, annually, at 7 least seventy-five days prior to the scheduled November election 8 day for each calendar year, prepare an estimated budget for the 9 next school fiscal year. The estimated budget shall be 10 11 advertised at least sixty days prior to the scheduled November election day for that calendar year. Final action on the 12 13 proposed budget shall occur no later than forty-five days prior 14 to the scheduled November election day for that calendar year. 15 (3) Whenever the rate of increase in the total amount of the 16 adopted budget divided by the estimated average daily membership 17 for that adopted budget compared to the total amount of the 18 current budget divided by the average daily membership for the current budget exceeds the rate of increase in the most recent 19 20 Consumer Price Index for the immediately preceding twelve 21 months, the board of public education or the board of school directors shall, at the scheduled November election day for that 22 23 calendar year, obtain voter approval of a referendum question 24 approving the total amount of the adopted budget. If the voters 25 refuse to approve the referendum question, the board of public 26 education or the board of school directors shall reopen the 27 adopted budget and reduce the growth of total expenditures per 28 average daily membership to a level that is less than or equal to the rate of increase in the most recent Consumer Price Index 29 for the immediately preceding twelve-month period. 30

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(b) (1) The provisions of this subsection apply to any
 school district which operates on a fiscal year that begins on
 the first day of July.

4 (2) For purposes of section 664 or 687, the board of public 5 education or the board of school directors shall, annually, at least seventy-five days prior to the scheduled primary election 6 day for each calendar year, prepare an estimated budget for the 7 next school fiscal year. The estimated budget shall be 8 9 advertised at least sixty days prior to the scheduled primary election day for that calendar year. Final action on the 10 11 proposed budget shall occur no later than forty-five days prior to the scheduled primary election day for that calendar year. 12 13 (3) Whenever the rate of increase in the total amount of the 14 adopted budget divided by the estimated average daily membership 15 for that adopted budget compared to the total amount of the 16 current budget divided by the average daily membership for the current budget exceeds the rate of increase in the most recent 17 18 Consumer Price Index for the immediately preceding twelve 19 months, the board of public education or the board of school 20 directors shall, at the scheduled primary election day for that calendar year, obtain voter approval of a referendum question 21 22 approving the total amount of the adopted budget. If the voters 23 refuse to approve the referendum question, the board of public education or the board of school directors shall reopen the 24 25 adopted budget and reduce the growth of total expenditures per 26 average daily membership to a level that is less than or equal 27 to the rate of increase in the most recent Consumer Price Index for the immediately preceding twelve-month period. 28 Section 2. Sections 664 and 665 of the act are amended to 29 30 read:

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1 Section 664. Annual Budget; Advertising; Public Hearing .--(a) The board of public education of each school district of 2 3 the first class shall, annually, [at or before the time of 4 levying the annual school taxes,] prepare an approximate 5 estimate of the amount of funds that will be required by the school district in its several departments for the following 6 fiscal year. Such annual estimate shall be apportioned to the 7 several classes of expenditures of the districts as the board of 8 9 public education thereof may determine. The total amount of such 10 estimate shall not exceed the amount of funds, including the 11 proposed annual tax levy and State appropriation, available for school purposes in the district; and, without voter approval 12 13 under section 613, shall not exceed the rate of increase in the most recent Consumer Price Index for the immediately preceding 14 15 twelve-month period. The annual estimates shall be properly certified to the school controller of the district by the 16 17 secretary of the board.

18 The board of public education shall [, at least fifteen (b) days prior to the time final action is taken on any budget,] 19 20 publish, by advertisement at least once in two newspapers of 21 general circulation printed in the municipality in which such 22 school district is located, notice that such proposed budget has been prepared and is open to public inspection at the office of 23 the board of public education. Such advertisement shall include 24 25 a notice of public hearing on the proposed budget, scheduled for 26 at least ten days before final action is taken upon any budget. 27 Section 665. Emergency Appropriations. -- The board of public 28 education in school districts of the first class may, during any 29 fiscal year, make additional appropriations, or increase the 30 existing appropriations, to meet emergencies such as epidemics, 19950H0264B0257 - 4 -

floods, fire or other catastrophies, [and to increase the 1 salaries of the employes of the board,] the funds therefor to be 2 3 provided from unexpended balances in existing appropriations, 4 from unappropriated revenues, if any, or from temporary loans. 5 Such additional appropriations, and such temporary loans, shall be authorized by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the 6 members of the board. If an emergency occurs, then the cost of 7 meeting that emergency shall not be included in the current 8 budget amount which is used to establish the basis for the 9 10 current year's budget for purposes of section 613. 11 The board of public education shall have the power to transfer any unencumbered balance, or any portion thereof, from 12 13 one appropriation to another, or from one spending agency to 14 another, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all the members of the board. 15 Section 3. Section 687(a), (b) and (c) of the act, amended 16 January 21, 1952 (1951 P.L.2195, No.627) and January 14, 1970 17 18 (1969 P.L.468, No.192), are amended to read: 19 Section 687. Annual Budget; Additional or Increased 20 Appropriations; Transfer of Funds.--(a) The board of school directors of each school district of the second, third, or 21 22 fourth class shall, annually, [at least thirty (30) days prior 23 to the adoption of the annual budget,] prepare a proposed budget 24 of the amount of funds that will be required by the school 25 district in its several departments for the following fiscal 26 year. Such proposed budget shall be prepared on a uniform form, 27 prepared and furnished by the Department of [Public Instruction] 28 Education, and shall be apportioned to the several classes of expenditures of the district as the board of school directors 29 30 thereof may determine. Final action shall not be taken on any

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proposed budget, in which the estimated expenditures exceed two 1 thousand dollars (\$2000), until after ten (10) days' public 2 3 notice. Nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent any 4 school district, whose total estimated expenditures do not exceed two thousand dollars (\$2000), from holding a public 5 hearing. The proposed budget shall be printed, or otherwise made 6 7 available for public inspection to all persons who may interest themselves [, at least twenty (20) days prior to the date set 8 9 for the adoption of the budget].

10 (b) The board of school directors, after making such 11 revisions and changes therein as appear advisable, shall adopt 12 the budget and the necessary appropriation measures required to 13 put it into effect. The total amount of such budget shall not: 14 (1) exceed the amount of funds, including the proposed 15 annual tax levy and State appropriation, available for school 16 purposes in that district[.]; and

17 (2) without voter approval as required in section 613, shall 18 not exceed the rate of increase in the most recent Consumer 19 Price Index for the immediately preceding calendar year. 20 Within fifteen (15) days after the adoption of the budget, the 21 board of school directors shall file a copy of the same in the 22 office of the Department of [Public Instruction] Education. 23 (c) The board of school directors may, during any fiscal 24 year, make additional appropriations or increase existing 25 appropriations to meet emergencies, such as epidemics, floods, fires[,] or other catastrophies[, or to provide for the payment 26 27 for rental under leases or contracts to lease from the State 28 Public School Building Authority or any municipality authority 29 entered into subsequent to the date of the adoption of the 30 budget]. The funds therefor shall be provided from unexpended - 6 -19950H0264B0257

balances in existing appropriations, from unappropriated revenue, if any, or from temporary loans. Such temporary loans, when made, shall be approved by a two-thirds vote of the board of school directors. If an emergency occurs, then the cost of meeting that emergency shall not be included in the current budget amount which is used to establish the basis for the current year's budget for purposes of section 613. * * *

9 Section 4. The addition or amendment of sections 613, 664
10 and 687 of the act shall not apply to the costs associated with
11 any collective bargaining agreement or any outstanding bonded
12 indebtedness in effect on the effective date of this act.
13 Section 5. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
