AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An 2 act relating to the public school system, including certain 3 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," further providing for financial 5 programs for operating community colleges. 6 7 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 9 Section 1. Section 1913-A(b)(1.4)(ii) of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 10 11 1949, amended July 11, 1996 (P.L.633, No.107), is amended to 12 read: 13 Section 1913-A. Financial Program; Reimbursement or 14 Payments. -- * * * 15 (b) * * * The equivalent full-time student reimbursement of a 16

community college shall be the sum of credit course, noncredit

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- 1 course and stipend reimbursements. These reimbursements shall be
- 2 calculated using a reimbursement factor of one thousand and
- 3 forty dollars (\$1,040) for the 1993-1994 fiscal year, of one
- 4 thousand eighty dollars (\$1,080) for the 1994-1995 fiscal year
- 5 and of one thousand one hundred eighty dollars (\$1,180) for the
- 6 1995-1996 fiscal year and one thousand and two hundred and ten
- 7 dollars (\$1,210) for the 1996-1997 fiscal year and for each year
- 8 thereafter and shall be determined as follows:
- 9 * * *
- 10 (ii) [Noncredit] Except for courses defined under
- 11 <u>subparagraph (D), noncredit</u> course reimbursement shall be
- 12 calculated as follows:
- (A) eighty percent (80%) of the reimbursement factor
- 14 multiplied by the number of equivalent full-time students
- 15 enrolled in eligible noncredit courses for the 1993-1994 fiscal
- 16 year, as determined by the audit referred to in paragraph (i);
- 17 (B) seventy percent (70%) of the reimbursement factor
- 18 multiplied by the number of equivalent full-time students
- 19 enrolled in eligible noncredit courses for the 1994-1995 fiscal
- 20 year and for each year thereafter, as determined by the audit
- 21 referred to in paragraph (i); or
- 22 (C) one hundred percent (100%) of the reimbursement factor
- 23 multiplied by the number of equivalent full-time students
- 24 enrolled in eligible noncredit public safety courses that
- 25 provide training for volunteer firefighters and emergency
- 26 medical services for the 1995-1996 fiscal year and for each year
- 27 thereafter, as determined by the audit referred to in paragraph
- 28 (i).
- 29 (D) Those noncredit courses defined herein as "work force
- 30 <u>development courses" shall be reimbursed using the reimbursement</u>

- 1 factor stipulated in clause (1.4). "Noncredit work force
- 2 <u>development courses</u>" shall be defined as those courses, the
- 3 specific purpose of which is to provide students with
- 4 opportunities to upgrade and/or develop skills necessary or
- 5 useful for gainful employment, but which do not lead to an
- 6 <u>associate's degree or other academic award. The subject matter</u>
- 7 of noncredit work force development courses may encompass any of
- 8 the following:
- 9 (I) Computers, including the study of both hardware and
- 10 software applications.
- 11 (II) Management and supervision, including, but not limited
- 12 to, team-building training, management and supervisory skills,
- 13 conflict resolution, interviewing skills, problem solving,
- 14 developing leadership skills, team and individual decision
- 15 making and the application of Federal and State laws to the work
- 16 place.
- 17 (III) Health-related fields, including, but not limited to,
- 18 continuing education for registered nurses, licensed practical
- 19 nurses, critical care nurses, dental assistants and hygienists
- 20 <u>and certification for nurse aides.</u>
- 21 (IV) Vocational and industrial jobs in such fields as
- 22 welding, machine tool and die, electronics, safety, plastics
- 23 technology, hydraulics, construction, warehouse materials
- 24 management, automotive repair and management, heating,
- 25 ventilation and air conditioning, and refrigeration.
- 26 (V) Professional development, including required continuing
- 27 education courses in a variety of fields, including, but not
- 28 <u>limited to, real estate, travel industry, early childhood</u>
- 29 education, child care, food service management and supervision,
- 30 <u>and dietary management and supervision.</u>

- 1 (VI) New categories of noncredit work force development
- 2 courses shall be added and existing categories expanded from
- 3 time to time by the Department of Education in consultation with
- 4 the community colleges as technology advances and changes in the
- 5 <u>nature of jobs in the work place may require.</u>
- 6 (VII) Noncredit work force development courses may be
- 7 offered by a community college at an off-campus site or at any
- 8 of its facilities.

- 10 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
