AN ACT

Establishing a state grant program to further assist those school districts wishing to reduce class sizes in primary grades; and imposing powers and duties on the Department of Education and the Secretary of Education.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
hereby enacts as follows:
Section 1. Short title.
This act shall be known and may be cited as the Class Size
Reduction Incentive Act.

Section 2. Definitions.
The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
context clearly indicates otherwise:
"Department." The Department of Education of the
Commonwealth.
"Federal initiative." The Federal Class Size Reduction

Initiative.
"Primary grades." Kindergarten through third grade.
"Secretary." The Secretary of Education of the Commonwealth. Section 3. Purpose.

The grants provided for in this act are intended to act as an incentive to encourage school districts to reduce their class sizes in primary grades by helping to meet the additional costs associated with implementing such reductions.

Section 4. Incentive grants.
Beginning with the 2000-2001 fiscal year and continuing each school year thereafter the department shall award incentive grants to eligible school districts in order to encourage the reduction of class sizes in primary classrooms.

Section 5. Eligibility.
In order to qualify for a grant under this act, a school district must:
(1) Be a participant in the Federal initiative.
(2) Document to the department the number of students per teacher in each classroom for primary grades.
(3) Comply with such application requirements, rules or standards as may be promulgated by the department pursuant to section 8.

Section 6. Funding.
(a) General rule.--The secretary shall allocate grants to eligible school districts from funds appropriated for the implementation of this act.
(b) Amount of grants.--An eligible school district shall receive a grant in the amount of $\$ 5,000$ for each classroom in primary grades in which the number of students per teacher is 20 or fewer.

Section 7. Use of funds.
The grants provided for by this act may be used to:
(1) Make additional class size reductions in primary grades.
(2) Carry out activities to improve teacher quality, including professional development activities.
(3) Offset building construction or renovation costs related to class size reduction efforts.

Section 8. Duties of department.
(a) Form of applications.--Grant applications shall be filed on a form and in such manner as determined by the secretary. The application shall address the determination of eligibility pursuant to section 5 .
(b) Rules and regulations.--The department may promulgate such rules and regulations necessary to administer and enforce this act.
(c) Budget submission.--The secretary shall annually, as part of the department's budget proposal submitted to the Governor, include an estimate of State funds required for the ensuing fiscal year to fund the grants provided by this act. Section 9. Program evaluation.
(a) General rule.--The department shall contract with a Pennsylvania institution of higher education, or consortia thereof, to conduct an ongoing evaluation of class size reduction efforts in this Commonwealth.
(b) Use of evaluation.--This evaluation shall be used to determine the overall effectiveness of whether reduced class sizes improve the classroom learning environment and academic progress of students.
(c) Data to be included.--The evaluation shall specifically
include data comparing student achievement in those school districts undertaking class size reduction initiatives with those that are not participating in such efforts.
(d) Report to General Assembly.--At the conclusion of the 2003-2004 school year, the institution of higher education, or consortia, conducting the evaluation shall prepare a comprehensive report outlining the three-year history of its findings. This final report shall be made to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than December 1, 2004. Section 10. Effective date.

This act shall take effect July 1, 2000, or immediately, whichever is later.
