AN ACT

1 2 3 4 5 6	Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," providing for a quality instruction program; and making an appropriation.
7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
10	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an
11	article to read:
12	ARTICLE XII-A.
13	IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF INSTRUCTION PROGRAM.
14	Section 1201-A. Legislative FindingsThe General Assembly
15	finds and declares as follows:
16	(1) A well-trained and well-educated work force is essential
17	to the economic well-being of this Commonwealth and its

1 <u>citizens.</u>

2	(2) A system of public education that provides a quality
3	education for all the children of this Commonwealth is essential
4	in maintaining a well-trained and well-educated work force.
5	(3) One of the greatest influences on the quality of
6	education and academic performance of students is the quality of
7	instruction with particular emphasis on the knowledge, skills
8	and qualifications of teachers. Fully trained and certified
9	teachers provide better instruction leading to higher student
10	achievement. A well-trained teacher work force also saves money
11	in the long run over emergency hires and alternatively certified
12	teachers who receive only a few days or weeks of training before
13	they are hired.
14	(4) It is in the interests of the Commonwealth to assist
15	school districts, especially financially poor school districts,
16	in their efforts to improve the quality of instruction for all
17	children in public education and more specifically to improve
18	the knowledge, skills and qualifications of teachers in public
19	schools.
20	(5) It is in the interests of the Commonwealth to assist
21	school districts, especially financially poor school districts,
22	to improve their teacher work force through National Board
23	<u>Certification of their teachers and to provide incentives to</u>
24	those teachers attaining National Board Certification to serve
25	as mentors to new and existing teachers. National Board
26	<u>Certification of teachers is a nationally recognized process</u>
27	designed to certify teachers so that they, like professionals in
28	other fields, can achieve distinction by meeting rigorous
29	standards of knowledge and performance. The certification
30	requirements far exceed existing State recertification
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1	requirements. National Board Certification is endorsed by
2	leading business groups including: United States Chamber of
3	Commerce, National Association of Manufacturers, American
4	Business Conference, Business Higher Education Forum, Council on
5	Competitiveness and Council of Growing Companies.
6	(6) In order to address the fact that some school districts,
7	due to teacher shortages, are forced to hire teachers not
8	certified in their area of instruction, particularly in the
9	areas of science and mathematics, the State should provide
10	assistance to school districts in the continuing education of
11	teachers to ensure that all of their teachers are certified in
12	their area of instruction.
13	(7) In order to ensure that new technology in our children's
14	classrooms serves to improve the quality of instruction, the
15	State should provide assistance to school districts to ensure
16	that their teachers are properly trained and capable of using
17	the new technology and integrating computers into classroom
18	instruction.
19	(8) It is in the interests of the Commonwealth for the State
20	to provide assistance to school districts, especially
21	financially poor school districts, to provide every high school
22	student with academic promise with the opportunity to take an
23	Advanced Placement course. Advanced placement courses are
24	recognized as a proven program exposing high school students to
25	academically rigorous coursework and challenging standards.
26	Pennsylvania presently lags behind other surrounding states in
27	providing advanced placement courses to its brightest and most
28	promising students.
29	Section 1202-A. DefinitionsFor the purposes of this
30	article, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

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	<u>"Advanced placement courses" shall mean high school level</u>
2	preparatory courses for advanced placement examination that is
3	approved by the College Board and Educational Testing Service.
4	"Advanced placement examination" shall mean the advanced
5	placement examinations conducted by the College Entrance
6	Examination Board, on the basis of which participating
7	institutions of post-secondary education award post-secondary
8	academic credit.
9	"Applicant" shall mean a school district or a combination of
10	school districts which applies for funds under this article.
11	"Average daily membership" shall have the same meaning as it
12	is defined in section 2501.
13	"Continuing professional education opportunities" shall mean
14	continuing professional education courses, programs, activities
15	and other learning experiences approved to meet continuing
16	professional requirements under section 1205.2.
17	"Department" shall mean the Department of Education of the
18	Commonwealth.
19	"Higher education institutions" shall mean any institution of
20	higher education in this Commonwealth authorized to grant
21	collegiate level degrees and which has received total
22	institutional accreditation by an accrediting agency recognized
23	by the Federal Government, the Department of Education and the
24	State Board of Education.
25	<u>"Educator" shall mean an individual who holds a Pennsylvania</u>
26	teacher, educational specialist or administrative certification
27	<u>or letter of eligibility.</u>
28	<u>"Market Value/Personal Income Aid Ratio" shall have the same</u>
29	meaning as it is defined in section 2501.

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1	education program established by the private nonprofit National
2	Board for Professional Teaching Standards designed to certify
3	experienced teachers that complete a demanding demonstration of
4	their content knowledge and teacher skills. Teachers achieving
5	National Board Certification are recognized by their peers as
б	ones who meet high and rigorous professional standards and
7	accomplished teaching practices.
8	"School district" shall have the same meaning as in section
9	<u>102.</u>
10	"School entity" shall mean any public school district,
11	intermediate unit or area vocational-technical school.
12	"Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of Education of the
13	Commonwealth.
14	Section 1203-A. Establishment of ProgramThere is hereby
15	established in the department the Quality Instruction Program.
16	The program shall provide Quality Instruction Entitlement Grants
17	and Quality Instruction Competitive Grants to eligible school
18	districts for the purpose of improving the quality of
19	instruction for all children in public education and more
20	specifically to improve the knowledge, skills and qualifications
21	of teachers in public schools.
22	Section 1204-A. Applications(a) Applicants for grant
23	funding under section 1205-A or 1206-A shall submit applications
24	at the time, in the manner and containing or accompanied by such
25	information as the department may prescribe but, in any case,
26	shall include a plan for the expenditure of grant funds that
27	documents the following:
28	(1) That the plan is developed in consultation with the
29	faculty and administrative staff of the schools within the
30	school district and members of the community that will be
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1 affected by the plan.

2	(2) That the plan indicates how the grant funds will be
3	allocated for eligible uses under section 1206-A and how grant
4	funds will be allocated to school entities within the school
5	<u>district.</u>
6	(3) That the plan provides qualitative and quantitative
7	measures that will be used to determine whether the eligible
8	uses of grant funds have improved the academic performance of
9	students benefiting from the grant funds and improved the
10	knowledge, skills and qualifications of educators.
11	(b) Two or more school districts eligible for funding under
12	section 1205-A and/or 1206-A may submit a joint application.
13	Section 1205-A. Quality Instruction Entitlement GrantsThe
14	department shall provide Quality Instruction Entitlement Grants
15	to those school districts eligible for Quality Instruction
16	Entitlement Grants whose Market Value/Personal Income Aid Ratio
17	(MV/PIAR) is greater than the State median (MV/PIAR) for the
18	prior school year. Those school districts that are eligible for
19	funding shall receive twelve dollars (\$12) for each student
20	included in the school district's average daily membership. No
21	school district eligible for a Quality Instruction Entitlement
22	<u>Grant shall receive less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000)</u>
23	of grant funding.
24	Section 1206-A. Quality Instruction Competitive Grants(a)
25	School districts that are not eligible for funding under section
26	1205-A may apply to the department for Quality Instruction
27	Competitive Grants. A school district eligible for funding under
28	section 1205-A is not eligible for funding under this section.
29	(b) The department shall develop a competitive grant
30	procedure that shall factor in the size and the relative wealth
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1	of the school districts in determining which school districts
2	would receive Quality Instruction Competitive Grants. The
3	department shall also determine a minimum and maximum grant
4	amount that a school district could receive.
5	<u>Section 1207-A. Eligible Uses of Grant Funding(a) School</u>
6	districts receiving funding under section 1205-A or 1206-A may
7	use funding for the following purposes:
8	(1) To provide incentives for educators to seek National
9	Board Certification by reimbursing educators up to two thousand
10	dollars (\$2,000) per educator for the cost for seeking National
11	Board Certification.
12	(2) To provide those educators that have completed National
13	Board Certification with up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per
14	educator per year to serve as mentors to other teachers in their
15	school district.
16	(3) To provide continuing professional education
17	opportunities to those educators that are teaching in a
18	classroom outside of their area of certification in order to
19	become certified in their areas of instruction. School districts
20	may collaborate with other school entities and/or higher
21	education institutions to provide these continuing education
22	courses through distance learning technology.
23	(4) To provide continuing professional education
24	opportunities to educators and reading aides to improve the
25	knowledge and skills in the area of reading instruction,
26	curriculum and programs.
27	(5) Promote Learning to Link by providing continuing
28	professional education opportunities and training to educators
29	in the use of new technologies and computers in educating
30	students, including integrating new education technologies into
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1	classroom instruction to improve student academic performance.
2	(6) To train educators to teach advanced placement courses
3	and/or to pay for materials or equipment needed to offer
4	Advanced Placement courses.
5	(7) To improve a teacher induction program that monitors and
6	supports new teachers to ensure quality instruction. No funding
7	under this article may be used by the school district for
8	services already provided in an existing teacher induction
9	program.
10	(8) For programs developed by the school district and
11	approved by the department that have demonstrated improvements
12	in the quality of instruction and improved the academic
13	performance of students in the school district.
14	(b) Two or more school districts receiving funding under
15	section 1205-A and/or 1206-A may combine their funding to
16	provide for one or more of the eligible uses for funding.
17	(c) Educators who participate in activities specified under
18	this section shall earn professional development credit as
19	required under section 1205.2.
20	Section 1208-A. Reports(a) All school districts
21	receiving funding under section 1205-A or 1206-A shall on an
22	annual basis submit a report to the department detailing the
23	allocation of grant funds by eligible uses under section 1207-A
24	and by a school entity within the school district. The report
25	shall also document both qualitatively and quantitatively the
26	impact of the grant funding on improving the academic
27	performance of students benefiting from the grant funds and
28	improving the knowledge, skills and qualifications of educators.
29	The department shall develop the procedures and format that
30	school districts will use in preparing their report.
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1	(b) The department shall submit to the General Assembly and
2	make public a report on the allocation of grant funds by school
3	district and by eligible uses under section 1207-A. The report
4	shall also document both qualitatively and quantitatively the
5	impact both Statewide and by school district of the grant
6	funding on improving the academic performance of students
7	benefiting from the grant funds and improving the knowledge,
8	skills and qualifications of educators.
9	Section 1209-A. State FundingThe sum of thirteen and one-
10	half million dollars (\$13,500,000), or as much thereof as may be
11	necessary, is hereby appropriated to the Department of Education
12	for each fiscal year from fiscal year 2000-2001 through fiscal
13	year 2004-2005 for the purpose of this article. Of this
14	appropriation amount, no more than nine million dollars
15	(\$9,000,000) shall be allocated each year for funding under
16	section 1205-A and no less than four and one-half million
17	dollars (\$4,500,000) shall be allocated for funding under
18	section 1206-A.

19 Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
