1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10	Amending the act of December 20, 1985 (P.L.457, No.112), entitled "An act relating to the right to practice medicine and surgery and the right to practice medically related acts; reestablishing the State Board of Medical Education and Licensure as the State Board of Medicine and providing for its composition, powers and duties; providing for the issuance of licenses and certificates and the suspension and revocation of licenses and certificates; providing penalties; and making repeals," providing for certification of athletic trainers by the State Board of Medicine; and making repeals.

13	Section 1. Section 2 of the act of December 20, 1985
14	(P.L.457, No.112), known as the Medical Practice Act of 1985, is
15	amended by adding definitions to read:
16	Section 2. Definitions.
17	The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
18	have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
19	context clearly indicates otherwise:

1	team sports, athletic games or recreational sport activity.	
2	"Athletic training services." The planning, coordination and	
3	supervision of health care for an athlete or other person with	
4	the direction of a licensed physician. The term includes the

6	"ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES." THE MANAGEMENT AND PROVISION <	<—

10	prevention programs and providing appropriate preventative and

23	"Certified athletic trainer." A person who is certified to	
24	perform athletic training services by the State Board of	
25	Medicine or State Board of Osteopathic Medicine.

27	"Direction." Supervision over the actions of a certified	
28	athletic trainer via referral by prescription to treat	
29	conditions for a physically active person from a licensed	
30	physician, dentist or podiatrist or written protocol approved by	
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1	a supervising physician, dentist or podiatrist, except that the	
2	physical presence of the supervising physician, dentist or	
3	podiatrist is not required if the supervising physician, dentist	
4	or podiatrist is readily available for consultation by direct	
5	communication, radio, telephone, facsimile, telecommunications	
6	<u>or via other electronic means.</u>

1 Establishment.--The State Board of Medicine shall (a) consist of the commissioner or his designee, the Secretary of 2 3 Health or his designee, two members appointed by the Governor 4 who shall be persons representing the public at large and seven 5 members appointed by the Governor, six of whom shall be medical doctors with unrestricted licenses to practice medicine and 6 7 surgery in this Commonwealth for five years immediately preceding their appointment and one who shall be a nurse 8 9 midwife, physician assistant, certified registered nurse 10 practitioner [or], respiratory care practitioner or certified 11 athletic trainer licensed or certified under the laws of this Commonwealth. All professional and public members of the board 12 13 shall be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent 14 of a majority of the members elected to the Senate. * * * 15

16 Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
17 Section 51.1. Athletic trainers.

18 (a) General rule. -- An athletic trainer certified by the board may, under the direction of a physician, podiatrist or 19 20 dentist, provide athletic training services to a physically 21 active person under the care of a physician, dentist or 22 podiatrist. An athletic trainer certified under this section 23 shall refer any person with health care problems outside the 24 scope of athletic training SHALL REFER A PHYSICALLY ACTIVE 25 PERSON WITH CONDITIONS OUTSIDE THE SCOPE OF ATHLETIC TRAINING 26 services to a physician, dentist or podiatrist. 27 (b) Temporary certifications. -- Any athletic trainer who 28 holds a valid certificate issued by the State Board of Physical Therapy under the act of October 10, 1975 (P.L.383, No.110), 29 known as the Physical Therapy Practice Act, relating to the 30

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practice of athletic training, prior to the effective date of 1 this act shall, on and after the effective date hereof, be 2 3 deemed to be certified by the State Board of Medicine or State 4 Board of Osteopathic Medicine as provided for in this act. 5 (c) Certification, title and limitation on practice.--An athletic trainer who meets the requirements of this section 6 7 shall be certified, may use the title "athletic trainer" or the abbreviation for the title, "A.T.C.," and may perform athletic 8 9 training services. A person who is not certified under this 10 section may not use the designation of certified athletic 11 trainer, athletic trainer, or any of the listed abbreviations for that title, including "C.A.T.," or "A.T.C.," or any similar 12 13 designation. This section shall not prohibit any person trained 14 and licensed or certified under any other law from engaging in 15 the licensed or certified practice in which the person is 16 trained. 17 (d) Regulations.--The State Board of Medicine and State 18 Board of Osteopathic Medicine shall promulgate regulations which 19 define the circumstances and protocol under which a certified 20 athletic trainer may perform athletic training services. Until 21 such regulations are promulgated by the State Board of Medicine 22 and State Board of Osteopathic Medicine, the athletic trainer 23 shall be regulated by the regulations, duly promulgated by the State Board of Physical Therapy prior to the enactment of this 24 25 amendatory act governing the activities of certified athletic 26 trainers, which are not inconsistent with this act. 27 (e) Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine.--Notwithstanding any 28 provision of the act of October 5, 1978 (P.L.1109, No.261), known as the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act, to the contrary, 29 30 doctors of osteopathic medicine may supervise and direct the

б	(f) JurisdictionThe State Board of Medicine and the State	<

8	certification of all athletic trainers. Jurisdiction will be	<
9	determined by the type of physician who supervises and directs	
10	the certified athletic trainer. Certified athletic trainers	
11	supervised by physicians regulated by the Medical Practice Act	
12	of 1985 shall fall within the jurisdiction of the State Board of	
13	Medicine. Certified athletic trainers supervised by a doctor of	<
14	osteopathy shall fall within the jurisdiction of the State Board	
15	<u>of Osteopathic Medicine.</u>	
16	Section 4. Nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent	
17	a licensed physical therapist from any practice authorized by	
18	the act of October 10, 1975 (P.L.383, No.110), known as the	
19	Physical Therapy Practice Act.	
20	SECTION 4. THE PRACTICE OF ATHLETIC TRAINING SHALL NOT	<
21	INCLUDE THE PRACTICE OF PHYSICAL THERAPY AS DEFINED BY THE ACT	
22	OF OCTOBER 10, 1975 (P.L.383, NO.110), KNOWN AS THE PHYSICAL	
23	THERAPY PRACTICE ACT, HOWEVER, THAT EXCLUSION SHALL NOT OPERATE	
24	TO PROHIBIT THE RENDERING OF ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES AS	
25	DEFINED IN THE ACT.	
26	Section 5. The following acts and parts of acts are repealed	
27	insofar as they are inconsistent with this act:	
28	The act of October 10, 1975 (P.L.383, No.110), known as the	
29	Physical Therapy Practice Act.
