## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Urging the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission to research
- and report to the General Assembly regarding guidelines for
- 3 use of 211 service codes for public services Statewide.
- 4 WHEREAS, Establishing a 211 dialing code as a simple
- 5 telephone number would allow people to access community
- 6 information and resources and to locate aid, such as counseling,
- 7 emergency financial assistance, clothing, shelter and other
- 8 basic human needs as well as volunteer opportunities; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The 211 dialing code service which originated in
- 10 Atlanta, Georgia, has been successfully demonstrated and
- 11 implemented and can now be found throughout Connecticut and in
- 12 Columbus, Georgia; Lafayette, Louisiana; and Knox County,
- 13 Tennessee; and
- 14 WHEREAS, The Federal Communications Commission recently
- 15 approved a petition by the 2-1-1 Collaborative, comprised of the

- 1 United Way of America, United Ways in Connecticut and Atlanta,
- 2 the Alliance of Information and Referral Systems, the Texas I&R
- 3 Network and the Florida Alliance of Information and Referral
- 4 Services, declaring that there exist "sufficient public benefits
- 5 to justify use of a scarce public resource, and we therefore
- 6 assign 211 to be used for access to community information and
- 7 referral services. Individuals facing serious threats to life,
- 8 health and mental well being have urgent and critical human
- 9 needs that are not addressed by dialing 911 for emergency
- 10 assistance or 311 for nonemergency police assistance. ... a
- 11 public need exists for an easy to use, easy to remember 211 code
- 12 to efficiently bring community information and referral services
- 13 to those who need them, providing a national safety network for
- 14 persons to get access readily to assistance"; therefore be it
- 15 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the
- 16 Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission to research and report to
- 17 the General Assembly regarding guidelines for use of 211 service
- 18 codes for public services Statewide.
