AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 3 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the 5 laws relating thereto," establishing criteria and authority for school districts to include character education in curriculum planning and the Character Education Grant 7 8 Program. 9 The General Assembly finds that: 10 Character education assists in positive social, 11 emotional and ethical development of students by teaching, 12 modeling and practicing basic civic values and character traits. 13 14 (2) Integration of these character traits into the 15 curriculum, extracurricular activities and school-wide 16 culture combined with an emphasis on community outreach and a service ethic furthers the internalization of core civic 17 18 values. Where character education initiatives have been 19 (3)

1	assessed in studies spanning over 20 years, results
2	consistently show that students in those schools:
3	(i) Engage in more pro-social behavior.
4	(ii) Are more skilled at resolving interpersonal
5	conflicts.
6	(iii) Are more concerned about others.
7	(iv) Are more committed to civic values.
8	(v) Are more interested in learning.
9	(4) The purposes of a character education program are
10	to:
11	(i) Educate students in basic civic values and
12	character traits that are:
13	(A) Beneficial and essential to civilized
14	society.
15	(B) Common to the diverse social, cultural and
16	religious groups of this Commonwealth.
17	(ii) Instill in students a service ethic and
18	encourage individual outreach to the community.
19	(iii) Promote student achievement and learning and
20	develop civic-minded students through character
21	education.
22	(iv) Reduce student disciplinary problems through
23	character education.
24	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
25	hereby enacts as follows:
26	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
27	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an
28	article to read:
29	ARTICLE XV-D
30	CHARACTER EDUCATION PROGRAM

- 1 Section 1501-D. Definitions.
- 2 The following words and phrases when used in this article
- 3 shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 4 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 5 <u>"Character education."</u> A course of instruction designed to
- 6 educate and assist students in developing basic civic values and
- 7 character traits, a service ethic and community outreach and
- 8 thus to improve the school environment and student achievement
- 9 and learning.
- "Character education program" or "program." A program
- 11 <u>designed and implemented by a school district to provide a</u>
- 12 course of character education to students in that school
- 13 <u>district</u>. This term includes, but is not limited to:
- 14 (1) <u>Professional education for professional educators</u>
- for the delivery of character education.
- 16 (2) Participation in professional education programs by
- 17 members of the Character Education Advisory Group.
- 18 "Department." The Department of Education of the
- 19 Commonwealth.
- 20 "Grant program." The Character Education Grant Program
- 21 <u>established by section 1504-D.</u>
- 22 "Professional educator." An individual who holds a
- 23 Pennsylvania teacher, educational specialist or administrative
- 24 <u>certification or letter of eligibility.</u>
- 25 <u>"Secretary." The Secretary of Education of the Commonwealth.</u>
- 26 <u>Section 1502-D. Character education program.</u>
- 27 (a) Authorization. -- The board of school directors of a
- 28 school district may establish and implement a character
- 29 <u>education program in its schools.</u>
- 30 (b) Curriculum contents. -- The program may include and teach

- 1 the following basic civil values and character traits:
- 2 (1) Trustworthiness, including honesty, integrity,
- 3 <u>reliability and loyalty.</u>
- 4 (2) Respect, including regard for others, tolerance and
- 5 <u>courtesy</u>.
- 6 (3) Responsibility, including hard work, economic self-
- 7 <u>reliance, accountability, diligence, perseverance and self-</u>
- 8 control.
- 9 (4) Fairness, including justice, consequences of bad
- 10 <u>behavior</u>, <u>principles</u> of <u>nondiscrimination</u> and <u>freedom</u> from
- 11 <u>prejudice</u>.
- 12 (5) Caring, including kindness, empathy, compassion,
- consideration, generosity and charity.
- 14 (6) Citizenship, including love of country, concern for
- the common good, respect for authority and the law and
- 16 community mindedness.
- 17 (c) Additional elements. -- The program may also include and
- 18 teach the importance of a service ethic and community outreach.
- 19 (d) Character education advisory group. --
- 20 (1) If a board of school directors elects to establish
- 21 the program, the board of school directors shall develop the
- 22 program in consultation with a character education advisory
- 23 group. The board of directors of a school district shall
- 24 appoint the members of the character education advisory
- 25 group.
- 26 (2) A character education advisory group shall consult
- 27 with and advise the board of school directors in the
- development of the program. The members of the character
- 29 <u>education advisory group shall elect a chairperson of the</u>
- 30 group.

1	(3) The board of school directors shall appoint to the
2	character education advisory group no less than two
3	representatives from each of the following groups:
4	(i) Parents and legal guardians of students in the
5	school district.
6	(ii) Teachers and administrators employed by the
7	school district.
8	(iii) Other members of the community where the
9	school district is located, including social, cultural,
10	business and religious leaders.
11	(4) The board of school directors shall:
12	(i) Cooperate and consult with the character
13	education advisory group.
14	(ii) Provide assistance and relevant materials to
15	the character education advisory group.
16	(5) (i) The character education advisory group shall
17	consult with and advise the board of school directors
18	until such time that the program is fully developed and
19	deemed completed.
20	(ii) The board of school directors shall have the
21	sole authority to determine the completion of the
22	program, and may elect to continue the duration of the
23	character education advisory group for up to two
24	additional years for the purpose of receiving
25	consultation and advice from the character education
26	advisory group regarding the school district's
27	implementation of the program.
28	(e) Integration of concepts into total curriculum The
29	program shall be integrated into the school procedures and
30	environment and structured to instruct primarily through

- 1 example. Classroom instruction may also be used to supplement
- 2 the program.
- 3 <u>Section 1503-D. Department duties and powers.</u>
- 4 The department shall:
- 5 (1) Establish criteria and guidelines for the
- 6 <u>establishment and implementation of programs that are</u>
- 7 <u>consistent with this article. These guidelines shall also</u>
- 8 <u>include methods of evaluating the programs and curricula.</u>
- 9 (2) Provide resources and technical assistance to boards
- of directors of school districts regarding the establishment
- and implementation of successful programs, upon the request
- of the board of directors of the school district.
- 13 (3) Identify and analyze effective programs and
- 14 practices and related professional development for
- 15 professional educators and provide such information to a
- school district upon request of the board of directors of the
- 17 school district.
- 18 (4) Collect and disseminate among school districts
- 19 information regarding programs and practices and potential
- 20 <u>support sources, including character education programs that</u>
- 21 <u>have been successfully established and implemented in other</u>
- 22 states.
- 23 (5) Provide resources and technical assistance to boards
- of school directors of school districts that support the
- 25 <u>professional development of professional educators in the</u>
- 26 establishment and implementation of the program.
- 27 (6) Collect and disseminate among school districts
- 28 <u>information regarding effective professional education for</u>
- 29 <u>professional educators regarding the establishment and</u>
- 30 <u>implementation of the program.</u>

1	(7) Seek, apply for and accept grants or contributions
2	of funds from any public or private source, including the
3	acceptance of Federal funds appropriated by the General
4	Assembly for the purposes of this article.
5	(8) Establish and award grants under the grant program
6	to assist school districts in establishing and implementing
7	programs.
8	(9) Maintain a list of school districts that have
9	established and implemented the program pursuant to this
10	article.
11	(10) Prepare and submit an annual report to the
12	Education Committee of the Senate and the Education Committee
13	of the House of Representatives regarding the administration
14	and operation of programs and grants awarded under the grant
15	program. The report shall include:
16	(i) A summary of the guidelines and criteria
17	established by the department and the establishment and
18	operation of the grant program.
19	(ii) A listing of the sources of funding sought by
20	the department for use in the grant program.
21	(iii) A listing of the number of school districts
22	that established and implemented programs.
23	(iv) A description of each school district's program
24	and the integration into the curriculum.
25	(v) A description of measures utilized by school
26	districts to provide parent, professional educator and
27	community involvement.
28	Section 1504-D. Character Education Grant Program.
29	(a) EstablishmentThere is hereby established in the
30	department the Character Education Grant Program for the purpose

- 1 of funding the establishment and implementation of a program by
- 2 a school district.
- 3 (b) Eligibility.--A school district, that establishes and
- 4 <u>implements the program in compliance with the requirements</u>
- 5 <u>established under section 1502-D and with department criteria</u>
- 6 and quidelines established under section 1503-D, may apply to
- 7 the department for a grant. Grants shall be awarded to eligible
- 8 school districts from funds appropriated and funds received by
- 9 the department for this purpose.
- 10 (c) Permitted uses.--The grant shall be used by a school
- 11 <u>district to fund the establishment and implementation of the</u>
- 12 program.
- (d) Adoption of application procedures. -- The secretary shall
- 14 adopt such procedures, rules and form as may be necessary to
- 15 <u>implement this grant program by regulation</u>.
- 16 (e) Application forms. -- Applications shall be made to the
- 17 <u>department in such form and at such time as the secretary may</u>
- 18 prescribe by regulation.
- 19 (f) Other funding sources. -- Funds received under the grant
- 20 program may be used in conjunction with funds received from any
- 21 <u>other public or private source.</u>
- 22 Section 1505-D. Prohibited instruction.
- Nothing in this article shall be construed to authorize a
- 24 board of school directors of a school district to establish and
- 25 <u>implement the program in such a manner that it instructs</u>,
- 26 proselytizes or indoctrinates students in a specific religious
- 27 or political belief.
- 28 <u>Section 1506-D. Local control.</u>
- 29 <u>Nothing in this article shall be construed to require a board</u>
- 30 of school directors of a school district to establish and

- 1 <u>implement the program or to apply for any grant from the</u>
- 2 Commonwealth or any other source for the purposes of funding the
- 3 <u>establishment or implementation of the program.</u>
- 4 Section 2. This act shall take effect as follows:
- 5 (1) The addition of section 1503-D(1), (3) and (7) of
- 6 the act shall take effect immediately.
- 7 (2) This section shall take effect immediately.
- 8 (3) The remainder of this act shall take effect in 90
- 9 days.
