A RESOLUTION

- 1 Declaring the week of March 18 through 24, 2001, as "Poison
- 2 Prevention Week" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, The health and safety of this Commonwealth's
- 4 citizens, especially our children, is an omnipresent and
- 5 pressing concern; and
- 6 WHEREAS, More than 7 million accidental poisonings occur each
- 7 year in the United States; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Of these accidental poisonings, 90% occur in the
- 9 home, with 60% involving children under six years of age; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Many of these poisonings could be avoided through
- 11 education and simple safety precautions; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The poison control centers serving this Commonwealth
- 13 give immediate information and treatment advice from toxicology
- 14 professionals regarding suspected toxic exposures to drugs,
- 15 chemicals and plants; and
- 16 WHEREAS, These poison control centers provide services 24
- 17 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year; and

- 1 WHEREAS, These poison control centers have managed 130,000
- 2 poison exposure calls and have provided information for an
- 3 additional 47,000 callers; and
- 4 WHEREAS, These poison control centers provide services that
- 5 allow for 75% of poison exposures to be treated in the home,
- 6 avoiding unnecessary hospital emergency room costs; and
- 7 WHEREAS, It has been estimated that the poison control
- 8 centers save \$26 million annually in emergency health care costs
- 9 in this Commonwealth, with an estimated savings of \$5 million to
- 10 the Medicaid program and \$18 million to private insurers;
- 11 therefore be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the Senate declare the week of March 18
- 13 through 24, 2001, as "Poison Prevention Week" in Pennsylvania
- 14 and express appreciation to the poison control centers in this
- 15 Commonwealth for their efforts to promote the reduction of
- 16 morbidity and mortality from poisonings through the
- 17 dissemination of poison information and treatment advice, public
- 18 and professional education and scientific research.
