A RESOLUTION

1 2	Designating April 2012 as "Esophageal Cancer Awareness and Prevention Month" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, It is estimated that more than 17,000 people will be
4	diagnosed with esophageal cancer in the United States in 2012,
5	and more than 15,000 will die from the disease; and
6	WHEREAS, Esophageal cancer is among the deadliest cancers and
7	fewer than one in five patients will survive for five years; and
8	WHEREAS, Esophageal cancer often is not detected and
9	diagnosed until the disease has reached the later stages, and
10	treatment is often radical, likely to cause complications and
11	the outcomes are poor; and
12	WHEREAS, One of the most common causes of esophageal cancer
13	is heartburn or gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), which is

1 viewed by many sufferers as an acceptable condition of life, and 2 GERD can lead to Barrett's Esophagus, which results in as much 3 as a 125-fold increase in a person's chance to develop 4 esophageal cancer; and

5 WHEREAS, With monitoring and treatment of GERD, the potential 6 for long-term irreversible damage leading to esophageal cancer 7 can be avoided; and

8 WHEREAS, Esophageal cancer can even occur without reflux 9 symptoms, history of smoking or excessive alcohol use; and 10 WHEREAS, Esophageal cancer is among the cancers that receive the least amount of Federal medical research funding; and 11 12 WHEREAS, The health and well-being of all Pennsylvanians will 13 be enhanced by improving esophageal cancer awareness, prevention 14 and increased research funding into the early detection and treatment strategies; therefore be it 15

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate April 2012 as "Esophageal Cancer Awareness and Prevention Month" in Pennsylvania and encourage citizens to take steps to prevent this disease through treatment of gastroesophageal reflux.

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
