## AN ACT

- 1 Requiring certain hospitals HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS to disseminate <--
- information relating to pertussis education; and imposing a
- duty on the Department of Health.
- 4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 5 hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Short title.
- 7 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Pertussis
- 8 Education Act.
- 9 Section 2. Purpose of act.
- 10 The purpose of this act is to educate mothers of newborn
- 11 infants regarding EXPECTANT MOTHERS ABOUT pertussis disease and <--
- 12 the availability of vaccine to protect newborn children against
- 13 pertussis disease.
- 14 Section 3. Findings.
- 15 The General Assembly finds as follows:
- 16 (1) Commonly known as whooping cough, pertussis is a
- highly contagious disease that can be prevented by

- 1 vaccination.
- 2 (2) During 2012, the Centers for Disease Control and 3 Prevention (CDC) reported an increase in pertussis in the 4 majority of states.
- 5 (3) Pennsylvania ranked 13th in the country in the 6 incidence of reported cases of pertussis.
- 7 (4) Pennsylvania's incidence of pertussis is higher than 8 the national incidence of cases of pertussis.
- 9 (5) Recommended vaccination for children is at 2, 4 and
  10 6 months of age, followed by vaccination at 15 to 18 months
  11 of age, with the final vaccination when the child enters <-12 school. FOLLOWED BY VACCINATION WHEN THE CHILD ENTERS SCHOOL, <-13 WITH THE FINAL VACCINATION WHEN THE CHILD IS BETWEEN 11 AND
  14 12 YEARS OF AGE.
- 15 (6) Pertussis can cause very serious illness which can
  16 be potentially life threatening in infants too young to be
  17 vaccinated.
- 18 (7) More than half of infants who contract pertussis
  19 must be hospitalized.
  - (8) Of those infants who are hospitalized with pertussis about 1 in 5 will get pneumonia and 1 in 100 will die.
  - (9) By getting immunized during pregnancy, an expectant mother can transfer pertussis antibodies to her newborn child and likely protect against pertussis early in life before the infant is old enough to receive the pertussis vaccine.
- 26 (10) The CDC recommends that providers of prenatal care
  27 implement a program of pertussis immunization for all
  28 pregnant women, preferably at 28 through 36 weeks of
  29 gestation.
- 30 (11) The CDC recommends that families and caregivers of

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- 1 newborns be vaccinated at least two weeks prior to coming
- 2 into close contact with a newborn.
- 3 SECTION 4. DEFINITIONS.

4 THE FOLLOWING WORDS AND PHRASES WHEN USED IN THIS ACT SHALL

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- 5 HAVE THE MEANINGS GIVEN TO THEM IN THIS SECTION UNLESS THE
- 6 CONTEXT CLEARLY INDICATES OTHERWISE:
- 7 "HEALTH CARE PROVIDER." A PERSON WHO IS LICENSED, CERTIFIED
- 8 OR OTHERWISE AUTHORIZED BY LAW TO PROVIDE OR RENDER HEALTH CARE
- 9 SERVICES TO PREGNANT WOMEN IN THIS COMMONWEALTH.
- 10 "PRENATAL APPOINTMENTS." A SERIES OF VISITS BETWEEN A HEALTH
- 11 CARE PROVIDER AND A PREGNANT WOMAN THAT TAKE PLACE AT SCHEDULED
- 12 INTERVALS BETWEEN THE CONFIRMATION OF PREGNANCY AND THE
- 13 INITIATION OF LABOR.
- 14 Section 4 5. Dissemination of pertussis information by
- 15 <u>hospitals</u> HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS.
- 16 (a) Options.--A hospital HEALTH CARE PROVIDER that provides <--
- 17 health care services to a pregnant woman, which services are
- 18 directly related to her pregnancy, shall before discharge after <--
- 19 giving birth, provide her with educational information on
- 20 pertussis disease and the availability of a vaccine to protect
- 21 against pertussis AT HER FIRST PRENATAL APPOINTMENT. Provision <-
- 22 in a timely manner of publications prepared by the Department of
- 23 Health pursuant to section 5 shall constitute compliance with
- 24 this subsection.
- 25 (b) Construction. -- Nothing in this section shall be
- 26 construed as requiring:
- 27 (1) A health care provider to provide or pay for
- 28 vaccination against pertussis.
- 29 (2) A pregnant woman to receive vaccination against
- 30 pertussis.

- 1 Section  $\frac{5}{6}$  6. Informational publications by Department of
- 2 Health.
- 3 The Department of Health shall, on the department's publicly

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- 4 accessible Internet website, make available to health care
- 5 providers printable publications that include information on the
- 6 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's recommendations
- 7 that pregnant women, family members and infant caregivers
- 8 receive vaccination against pertussis during the postpartum <--
- 9 period to protect their newborns from the transmission of
- 10 pertussis.
- 11 Section 6 7. Effective date.
- 12 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
