AN ACT

- 1 Providing standards for carbon monoxide alarms in child care facilities; and imposing penalties.
- 3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 4 hereby enacts as follows:
- 5 Section 1. Short title.
- 6 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Carbon
- 7 Monoxide Alarm Standards in Child Care Facilities Act.
- 8 Section 2. Definitions.
- 9 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 10 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 11 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 12 "Approved carbon monoxide alarm." The term includes:
- 13 (1) A single or multiple station carbon monoxide alarm
- 14 listed as complying with the Approved American National
- 15 Standard for Single and Multiple Station Carbon Monoxide
- 16 Alarms (ANSI/UL2034) or a carbon monoxide detector listed as
- 17 complying with the Approved American National Standard for
- 18 Gas and Vapor Detectors and Sensors (ANSI/UL2075) installed

1 in accordance with this act.

- (2) A device that may be combined with a smoke alarm or smoke detector if the combined smoke alarm or detector meets all of the following:
 - (i) Complies with either of the following:
 - (A) The Approved American National Standard for Single and Multiple Station Carbon Monoxide Alarms (ANSI/UL2034) for carbon monoxide alarms and the Approved American National Standard for Single and Multiple Station Smoke Alarms (ANSI/UL217) for smoke alarms.
 - (B) The Approved American National Standard for Gas and Vapor Detectors and Sensors (ANSI/UL2075) for carbon monoxide detectors and the Approved American National Standard for Safety for Smoke Detectors for Fire Alarm Systems (ANSI/UL268) for smoke detectors.
 - (ii) Emits an alarm in a manner that clearly differentiates between detecting the presence of carbon monoxide and the presence of smoke.
- 20 A carbon monoxide detection system that includes 21 carbon monoxide detectors and audible notification appliances 22 that are installed and maintained in accordance with the 23 National Fire Alarm and Signaling Code (NFPA 72) and the 24 Standard for the Installation of Carbon Monoxide (CO) 25 Detection and Warning Equipment (NFPA 720) and are in 26 compliance with the Approved American National Standard for 27 Gas and Vapor Detectors and Sensors (ANSI/UL2075). 28 "Child care facility." Any of the following:
- 29 (1) A boarding home for children as defined under 30 section 1001 of the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21),

- 1 known as the Public Welfare Code.
- 2 (2) A child care center as defined under section 1001 of
- 3 the Public Welfare Code.
- 4 (3) A nursery school that is licensed and regulated by
- 5 the Commonwealth.
- 6 "Fossil fuel." Coal, kerosene, oil, wood, fuel gases and
- 7 other petroleum or hydrocarbon products which emit carbon
- 8 monoxide as a by-product of combustion.
- 9 "Installed." A carbon monoxide alarm that is hardwired into
- 10 the electrical wiring, directly plugged into an electrical
- 11 outlet without a switch, other than a circuit breaker, or, if
- 12 the alarm is battery-powered, attached to the wall or ceiling of
- 13 a unit of a child care facility, in accordance with the Standard
- 14 for the Installation of Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detection and
- 15 Warning Equipment (NFPA) 720.
- 16 "Operational." Working and in service.
- 17 "Unit." A room or suite of two or more rooms that is
- 18 occupied as a residence, intended or designed to be occupied as
- 19 a residence, or is occupied by a client of a child care
- 20 facility.
- 21 Section 3. Administration.
- Nothing in this act is intended to modify the authority and
- 23 responsibilities of the Department of Labor and Industry under
- 24 the act of November 10, 1999 (P.L.491, No.45), known as the
- 25 Pennsylvania Construction Code Act.
- 26 Section 4. Carbon monoxide alarm requirements.
- 27 (a) Child care facilities. -- Each child care facility, which
- 28 uses a fossil fuel-burning heater or appliance, fireplace or an
- 29 attached garage, must have an operational, centrally located and
- 30 approved carbon monoxide alarm installed in the vicinity of the

- 1 fossil fuel-burning heater or fireplace and every unit that is
- 2 located on the same story as the fossil-burning heater or
- 3 appliance within 18 months of the effective date of this
- 4 section.
- 5 (b) Maintenance, repair or replacement. -- The owner of a
- 6 child care facility is responsible for providing for the
- 7 maintenance, repair or replacement of an approved carbon
- 8 monoxide alarm or the care and replacement of batteries.
- 9 Section 5. Enforcement.
- 10 Willful failure to install or maintain in operating condition
- 11 any approved carbon monoxide alarm required by this act is a
- 12 summary offense punishable by a fine of up to \$50.
- 13 Section 6. Effective date.
- 14 This act shall take effect immediately.
