## A RESOLUTION

1 2 3	Expressing support for the democratic and European aspirations of the people of Ukraine and their right to choose their own future free of intimidation and fear.
4	WHEREAS, A democratic, prosperous and independent Ukraine is
5	in the national interest of the United States; and
6	WHEREAS, Closer relations with the European Union (EU)
7	through the signing of an Association Agreement will promote
8	democratic values, good governance and economic opportunity in
9	Ukraine; and
10	WHEREAS, Millions of Ukrainian citizens support closer
11	relations with Europe and the signing of an Association
12	Agreement; and
13	WHEREAS, The Government of Ukraine has declared integration
14	with Europe a national priority and has made significant
15	progress toward meeting the requirements for the Association
16	Agreement; and
17	WHEREAS, Ukraine has the sovereign right to enter into
18	voluntary partnerships of its choosing, in keeping with its

1 interests; and

2 WHEREAS, Ukraine's closer relations with the EU do not 3 threaten any other country and will benefit both Ukraine and its 4 neighbors; and

5 WHEREAS, On November 21, 2013, following several months of 6 intense outside pressure, Ukrainian President Viktor Yanukovych 7 abruptly suspended negotiations on the Association Agreement one 8 week before it was due to be signed at the EU's Eastern Partnership Summit in Vilnius, Lithuania; and 9 10 WHEREAS, This reversal of stated government policy precipitated demonstrations by hundreds of thousands of 11 12 Ukrainian citizens in Kyiv as well as in cities throughout the 13 country; and

14 WHEREAS, The demonstrators have been WERE overwhelmingly <---15 peaceful and have sought to exercise their constitutional rights 16 to freely assemble and express their opposition to President Yanukovych's decision, as well as their support for greater 17 18 government accountability and closer relations with Europe; and 19 WHEREAS, On November 30, 2013, police violently dispersed 20 peaceful demonstrators in Kyiv's Independence Square, resulting in many injuries and the arrest of several dozen individuals; 21 22 and

23 WHEREAS, On December 9, 2013, police raided three opposition 24 media outlets and the headquarters of an opposition party; and 25 WHEREAS, On December 11, 2013, despite President Yanukovych's 26 statement the previous day that he would engage in talks with the opposition, police attempted to forcibly evict peaceful 27 28 protesters from central locations in Kyiv; and 29 WHEREAS, United States, European and other leaders, as well 30 as three former presidents of Ukraine, have urged restraint,

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warned against the use of violence against peaceful protesters
 and called for dialogue with the opposition to resolve the
 current political and economic crisis; and

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WHEREAS, ON JANUARY 16, 2014, THE UKRAINIAN PARLIAMENT
PASSED, AND PRESIDENT YANUKOVYCH SIGNED, LEGISLATION WHICH
SEVERELY LIMITED THE RIGHT OF PEACEFUL PROTEST, CONSTRAINED
FREEDOM OF SPEECH AND THE INDEPENDENT MEDIA AND UNDULY
RESTRICTED CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS; AND

9 WHEREAS, THE PASSAGE OF THESE UNDEMOCRATIC MEASURES AND 10 PRESIDENT YANUKOVYCH'S REFUSAL TO ENGAGE IN SUBSTANTIVE DIALOGUE 11 WITH OPPOSITION LEADERS PRECIPITATED SEVERAL DAYS OF VIOLENCE 12 AND RESULTED IN SEVERAL DEATHS AND HUNDREDS OF INJURIES, AS WELL

13 AS NUMEROUS ALLEGATIONS OF POLICE BRUTALITY; AND

14 WHEREAS, IN THE FACE OF SPREADING DEMONSTRATIONS, UKRAINIAN 15 GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVES AND OPPOSITION LEADERS ENTERED INTO 16 NEGOTIATIONS WHICH ON JANUARY 28, 2014, RESULTED IN THE RESIGNATION OF THE PRIME MINISTER AND HIS CABINET AND THE REPEAL 17 18 OF MOST OF THE ANTIDEMOCRATIC LAWS FROM JANUARY 16, 2014; AND 19 WHEREAS, ON FEBRUARY 20, 2014, UKRAINIAN SECURITY FORCES, 20 INCLUDING HEAVILY ARMED SNIPERS, FIRED ON DEMONSTRATORS IN KYIV, LEAVING DOZENS DEAD AND THE PEOPLE OF UKRAINE REELING FROM THE 21 MOST LETHAL DAY OF VIOLENCE SINCE THE SOVIET ERA, AND MANY OF 22 23 PRESIDENT YANUKOVYCH'S POLITICAL ALLIES, INCLUDING THE MAYOR OF 24 KYIV, RESIGNED FROM HIS GOVERNING PARTY OF REGIONS TO PROTEST 25 THE BLOODSHED; AND

WHEREAS, ON FEBRUARY 22, 2014, THE UKRAINIAN PARLIAMENT FOUND
PRESIDENT YANUKOVYCH UNABLE TO FULFILL HIS DUTIES, EXERCISED ITS
CONSTITUTIONAL POWERS TO REMOVE HIM FROM OFFICE AND SET AN
ELECTION FOR MAY 25, 2014, TO SELECT HIS REPLACEMENT; AND
WHEREAS, ON MARCH 2, 2014, RUSSIAN TROOPS INVADED THE

UKRAINIAN TERRITORY OF CRIMEA, SEIZING CONTROL OF THE PENINSULA,
 BORDER CROSSINGS, GOVERNMENT AND ADMINISTRATIVE BUILDINGS, KEY
 INFRASTRUCTURE AND SURROUNDING UKRAINIAN MILITARY BASES; AND
 WHEREAS, THE MILITARY INTERVENTION BY THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION
 IN CRIMEA IS A VIOLATION OF UKRAINE'S SOVEREIGNTY, INDEPENDENCE
 AND TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY; AND

7 WHEREAS, ON MARCH 16, 2014, CRIMEA HELD A REFERENDUM ON
8 SECEDING FROM UKRAINE AND ACCEDING TO THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION,
9 WHICH VIOLATED THE UKRAINIAN CONSTITUTION, OCCURRED UNDER DURESS
10 OF RUSSIAN MILITARY INTERVENTION AND WAS NOT RECOGNIZED BY THE
11 INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY; AND

12 WHEREAS, ON MARCH 20, 2014, THE RUSSIAN PARLIAMENT VOTED TO 13 ANNEX CRIMEA AND RUSSIAN PRESIDENT PUTIN SIGNED THE TREATY OF 14 ACCESSION ANNEXING CRIMEA TO THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION; AND 15 WHEREAS, ON APRIL 7, 2014, PROTESTERS OCCUPIED GOVERNMENT 16 BUILDINGS IN UKRAINE'S EASTERN CITIES OF DONETSK, LUHANSK AND 17 KHARKIV; AND

WHEREAS, ON APRIL 18, 2014, THE UNITED STATES, RUSSIA,
UKRAINE AND THE EUROPEAN UNION AGREED AT TALKS IN GENEVA ON
STEPS TO DE-ESCALATE THE CRISIS IN EASTERN UKRAINE; AND
WHEREAS, ON APRIL 22, 2014, UKRAINE'S ACTING PRESIDENT
ORDERED THE RELAUNCH OF MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST PRO-RUSSIAN
MILITANTS IN THE EAST AFTER TWO MEN WERE FOUND TORTURED TO DEATH
IN THE DONETSK REGION; AND

WHEREAS, ON MAY 25, 2014, UKRAINE HELD A PRESIDENTIAL
ELECTION, BUT MOST POLLING STATIONS IN THE EAST REMAINED CLOSED;
AND

28 WHEREAS, PETRO POROSHENKO WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT AND VOWED TO 29 BRING "PEACE TO A UNITED AND FREE UKRAINE"; AND 30 WHEREAS, The Senate greatly values the warm and close

relationship the United States has established with Ukraine
 since that country regained its independence in 1991; therefore
 be it

4 RESOLVED, That the Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 5 express support for the democratic and European aspirations of 6 the people of Ukraine and their right to choose their own future 7 free of intimidation and fear; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Senate call on the United States and the 8 9 European Union to continue to work together to support a 10 peaceful resolution to the crisis and to continue to support the desire of millions of Ukrainian citizens for closer relations 11 with Europe through FINALIZING the signing of an Association 12 <---13 Agreement, as well as for a democratic future; and be it further 14 RESOLVED, THAT THE SENATE CONDEMN THE UNPROVOKED AND ILLEGAL <--RUSSIAN MILITARY SEIZURE AND ANNEXATION OF THE UKRAINIAN CRIMEA; 15 16 AND BE IT FURTHER

17 RESOLVED, That the Senate urge the Government of Ukraine, 18 Ukrainian opposition parties and all protesters to exercise the 19 utmost restraint and avoid confrontation and call on the 20 Government of Ukraine to live up to its international obligations and respect and uphold the democratic rights of its 21 citizens, including the freedom of assembly and expression, as 22 23 well as the freedom of the press; and be it further 24 RESOLVED, That in the event of further violence by government <--25 authorities against peaceful protesters, the President of the United States and Congress consider targeted sanctions against 26 27 those who authorize or engage in the use of force; and be it 28 further

29 RESOLVED, That the Senate urge all parties to engage in30 constructive, sustained dialogue in order to find a peaceful

solution to Ukraine's current political and economic crisis; and
 be it further

3 RESOLVED, That a copy of the resolution be transmitted to the 4 President of the United States, the presiding officers of each 5 house of Congress and each member of Congress from Pennsylvania.
