A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4 5 6	Condemning the recent passage of legislation in Uganda and Nigeria criminalizing same-sex relationships and organizations, and calling upon the leaders of those nations to repeal and reject those laws as gross violations of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) individuals' civil rights.
7	WHEREAS, On December 20, 2013, the Parliament of Uganda
8	passed a law that would prescribe life imprisonment for repeated
9	consensual sexual acts between adults of the same gender; and
10	WHEREAS, The Parliament of Uganda also prescribed
11	imprisonment for failure to report lesbian, gay, bisexual or
12	transgender (LGBT) individuals and for performing same-sex
13	marriages; and
14	WHEREAS, On January 17, 2014, Ugandan President Yuweri
15	Museveni, who described LGBT individuals as "sick people who
16	need help," returned the legislation to Parliament for lack of a
17	quorum; and
18	WHEREAS, The Parliament of Uganda now has the ability to
19	either vote, with a full quorum, for the hateful legislation or
20	to reject it for its clear violations of basic civil rights; and

- 1 WHEREAS, On January 7, 2014, Nigeria, Africa's most populous
- 2 and politically influential nation, also enacted the "Same-Sex
- 3 Marriage Prohibition Act," which criminalizes same-sex marriage,
- 4 as well as membership in or support of any LGBT organization;
- 5 and
- 6 WHEREAS, Police in the northern Nigerian state of Bauchi
- 7 arrested and allegedly tortured dozens of men suspected of being
- 8 gay; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Nigerian President Goodluck Jonathan publicly
- 10 committed to alleviating the epidemic of HIV-AIDS, affecting 34
- 11 million Nigerians, while simultaneously signing into law the
- 12 discriminatory and counterproductive legislation; and
- 13 WHEREAS, HIV-AIDS programs established to assist the Nigerian
- 14 LGBT community, of which 17% are affected by HIV-AIDS, are now
- 15 effectively illegal; and
- 16 WHEREAS, United States Secretary of State John Kerry
- 17 denounced Nigeria's law for "dangerously restrict[ing] freedom
- 18 of assembly, association and expression for all Nigerians";
- 19 therefore be it
- 20 RESOLVED, That the Senate equally condemn, in the strongest
- 21 possible terms, both Uganda and Nigeria for their grave
- 22 violations of civil rights as pertain to LGBT citizens; and be
- 23 it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the Senate strongly urge the full membership
- 25 of the Parliament of Uganda to vote down the vile and
- 26 discriminatory legislation, Ugandan President Yuweri Museveni to
- 27 veto the bill should it be passed by the Parliament of Uganda
- 28 once more and President Goodluck Jonathan to repeal Nigeria's
- 29 equally noxious prohibition on same-sex organizations and
- 30 relationships.
