1 2 3	Amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in forgery and fraudulent practices, providing for identity theft verification passport.
4	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
5	hereby enacts as follows:
6	Section 1. Title 18 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated
7	Statutes is amended by adding a section to read:
8	§ 4121. Identity theft verification passport.
9	(a) Issuance
10	(1) The Attorney General in cooperation with any law
11	enforcement agency may issue an identity theft passport to a
12	person who meets all of the following criteria:
13	(i) Is a resident of this Commonwealth.
14	(ii) Learns or reasonably believes the person is a
15	victim of identity theft.
16	(iii) Has filed a police report citing that the
17	person is a victim of a violation of section 4120

1	(relating to identity theft).
2	(2) A person who learns or reasonably suspects that the
3	person is a victim of identity theft may contact the local
4	law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction where the person
5	resides. The local law enforcement agency:
6	(i) Shall make a police report of the matter whether
7	or not the agency has jurisdiction to investigate and
8	prosecute a crime of identity theft against the victim.
9	(ii) Shall provide the victim with a copy of the
10	report.
11	(iii) May refer the report to a law enforcement
12	agency with jurisdiction to investigate and prosecute a
13	crime of identify theft.
14	(3) Nothing in this subsection shall interfere with the
15	discretion of a local law enforcement agency to allocate
16	resources for investigations of crimes.
17	(4) A report filed by a victim of identity theft is not
18	required to be counted as an open case for purposes of
19	compiling open case statistics.
20	(5) A victim may apply for an identity theft passport by
21	sending a copy of the police report, an application for an
22	identity theft passport and any other supporting
23	documentation requested by the Attorney General to the Office
24	of Attorney General.
25	(6) The Attorney General shall process the application
26	and supporting police report and may issue the victim of
27	identity theft an identity theft passport in the form of a
28	<pre>card or certificate.</pre>
29	(b) Use A verification card or certificate issued by the
30	Attorney General may be presented to any of the following:

- 1 (1) A law enforcement agency to assist the agency in its
- 2 <u>investigation into whether false charges were made against</u>
- 3 the victim for an offense committed by a person other than
- 4 the victim who is using the victim's identity.
- 5 (2) Any creditor of the victim to aid in the creditor's
- 6 <u>investigation and establishment of whether fraudulent charges</u>
- 7 were made against accounts in the victim's name or whether
- 8 <u>accounts were opened using the victim's identity.</u>
- 9 <u>(3) Any other entity to aid in the entity's</u>
- 10 <u>investigation of whether the victim's identity was obtained</u>
- fraudulently or used without the victim's consent.
- 12 <u>(c) Acceptance.--Acceptance of the identity theft</u>
- 13 <u>verification passport by a law enforcement agency, creditor or</u>
- 14 other entity in accordance with subsection (b) is at the
- 15 <u>discretion of the law enforcement agency, creditor or entity.</u>
- 16 The identity theft passport as well as surrounding circumstances
- 17 and available information concerning the offense of identity
- 18 theft against the victim may be considered in determining
- 19 whether to accept the identity theft passport.
- 20 (d) Public record. -- An application for an identity theft
- 21 passport under subsection (a) and any supporting documentation
- 22 are not a public record. However, the Attorney General may
- 23 provide access to the applications and supporting documentation
- 24 to other criminal justice or law enforcement agencies in this
- 25 Commonwealth or another state.
- 26 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
