A RESOLUTION

1 2 3	Honoring Ronald W. Costen, Ph.D., Esquire, on his retirement from Temple University and recognizing his work as the director of the Institute on Protective Services.
4	WHEREAS, In 1999, Temple University's College of Health
5	Professionals and Social Work established the Institute on
6	Protective Services (the Institute) to conduct training of law
7	enforcement agencies and district attorneys on elder abuse
8	issues; and
9	WHEREAS, Since 2000, the Institute has been a collaboration
10	between the Department of Aging and Temple University to provide
11	training and investigative consultation to agencies and law
12	enforcement officials examining cases of physical abuse and
13	financial exploitation of elderly and disabled persons; and
14	WHEREAS, Ronald W. Costen, Ph.D., Esquire, has served as

1 director of the Institute since 2000, providing his expertise to 2 the Commonwealth's 52 area agencies on aging, district attorneys 3 and law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, Since 2011, Dr. Costen and his staff have helped to 4 recover more than \$2.3 million in funds exploited from senior 5 citizens and protect an additional \$5.2 million in at-risk 6 7 assets and have assisted in 21 arrests resulting in 12 8 successful elder financial abuse proceedings; and WHEREAS, Ten years ago, Dr. Costen and his staff established 9 10 the first Elder Abuse Task Force in Pennsylvania to improve 11 communications between district attorneys and area agencies on aging investigating elder abuse; and 12

13 WHEREAS, There are now 33 elder abuse task forces across this 14 Commonwealth; and

15 WHEREAS, Since the initial concept of an elder abuse task 16 force, the Institute's role has expanded to educate district attorneys, police departments, coroners and emergency medical 17 service personnel to recognize signs of elder abuse; and 18 19 WHEREAS, Since 1997, Dr. Costen has worked as a forensic 20 associate, providing legal, educational and program development 21 services to health care providers serving elderly and developmentally disabled persons; and 22

23 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen provided legal, advocacy and life 24 management services to individuals with disabilities and their 25 families, supplied treatment record review and testimony 26 regarding neglect and abuse of individuals in long-term care 27 settings and consulted with district attorneys, police and 28 coroners in criminal cases involving neglect and abuse of older 29 adults and people with disabilities; and

30 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen received his bachelor of arts degree from

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Old Dominion University, Sociology Department, Norfolk,
Virginia, in 1969, his master of arts degree from Duquesne
University, Sociology Department in 1970, his doctor of
philosophy degree from the University of Pittsburgh School of
Social Work in 1975 and his juris doctor degree from Temple
University School of Law in 1987; and

7 WHEREAS, From 1971 to 1989, Dr. Costen held various positions 8 to help protect our most vulnerable citizens, including 9 assistant district attorney for Lackawanna County, educational 10 program specialist with the Council on Social Work Education, Alexandria, Virginia, research associate at the University of 11 Pittsburgh School of Social Work and program director for 12 13 Allegheny County Mental Health/Mental Retardation in Pittsburgh; 14 and

WHEREAS, From 1976 to 1989, Dr. Costen served as assistant dean, assistant professor and chairperson of the Gerontology Institute at Marywood University, Scranton, teaching graduate courses in social policy, aging, human behavior and health care; and

20 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen planned, developed and implemented 21 Marywood University's Gerontology Institute, off-campus and 22 weekend graduate social work programs and the Rural Aging Mental 23 Health Training Project; and

24 WHEREAS, From 1989 to 1997, Dr. Costen served as Deputy 25 Attorney General in the Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General, 26 Criminal Law Division, investigating and prosecuting cases of 27 abuse and neglect of children and elderly and developmentally 28 disabled persons; and

29 WHEREAS, As Deputy Attorney General, Dr. Costen operated the30 Pennsylvania Medical/Legal Advisory Board on Child Abuse,

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directed the Pennsylvania Elder Abuse Statewide Law Enforcement
Training Project and the Pennsylvania Interdisciplinary Child
Abuse Investigation Training Project and served as legislative
counsel for elder abuse and neglect issues; and

5 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen holds several professional licenses and 6 memberships; and

7 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen is admitted to practice before the 8 Supreme Court of Pennsylvania and is a licensed social worker; 9 and

10 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen's memberships include the Pennsylvania 11 Bar Association, Pennsylvania Board of Social Work Examiners and 12 National Association of Social Workers; and

13 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen retired from Temple University on January 14 1, 2015, to pursue a master of divinity degree from the Lutheran 15 Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; and 16 WHEREAS, Dr. Costen will continue to provide his professional expertise to elder abuse task forces, area agencies on aging and 17 18 local law enforcement fighting elder abuse; therefore be it 19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives honor Ronald W. 20 Costen, Ph.D., Esquire, for his decades of service to our most vulnerable citizens and recognize the work of Dr. Costen and his 21 staff in fighting physical and financial abuse of elderly and 22 23 disabled persons.

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
