A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 2 3	Establishing the Joint Select Committee on the Implementation of the Environmental Protection Agency's Greenhouse Gas Regulation.
4	WHEREAS, Reasonably priced, reliable sources of electric
5	power generated in this Commonwealth are vital to the health,
6	safety and welfare of the residents and to the prosperity of
7	this Commonwealth's economy; and
8	WHEREAS, It is the responsibility of the Commonwealth to
9	ensure that a reliable supply of electric power is generated at
10	a level consistent with the need for electric power for the
11	protection of public health, safety and the environment; and
12	WHEREAS, Electric generation power plants are developed
13	primarily through the free enterprise system and require a
14	significant commitment of funds and resources from shareholders,
15	and the potential decision to deactivate or retire an electric
16	generation power plant will have a long-term impact on this

1 Commonwealth's economy; and

2 WHEREAS, The Environmental Protection Agency is currently 3 promulgating rules to regulate carbon dioxide emissions for 4 existing stationary sources, including coal-fired electric 5 generation plants; and

WHEREAS, The Environmental Protection Agency's proposed 6 7 carbon dioxide rule published under docket EPA-HQ-OAR-2013-0602 8 does not just regulate existing stationary source emissions, but seeks to regulate beyond a stationary source's fenceline; and 9 10 WHEREAS, The Environmental Protection Agency's rule will impact all types of electric generation, including natural gas 11 generation, renewable generation sources, demand response and 12 13 energy efficiency and nuclear generation as well as coal-fired 14 generation sources; and

15 WHEREAS, Once the Environmental Protection Agency publishes 16 the final rule, the Commonwealth will be given the opportunity 17 to develop a State Implementation Plan to meet the Federal 18 requirements; and

19 WHEREAS, The final Environmental Protection Agency carbon 20 dioxide rule is expected to be published during the summer of 21 2015; and

22 WHEREAS, The General Assembly enacted Act 175 of 2014, known 23 as the Pennsylvania Greenhouse Gas Regulation Implementation 24 Act, in anticipation of the Environmental Protection Agency's 25 carbon dioxide rule; and

26 WHEREAS, Act 175 provides that the elected legislators of the 27 General Assembly should have an integral role in the development 28 and submission of the Commonwealth's State Implementation Plan 29 for carbon dioxide reductions; and

30 WHEREAS, Due to the complexity of the Federal carbon dioxide

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1 rule, the speed at which the Commonwealth must develop a State
2 Implementation Plan once the Federal rule is finalized, and the
3 various policy and legislative issues which will be impacted by
4 the Federal rule, a special select committee of the General
5 Assembly is necessary; and

WHEREAS, No one standing committee of the Senate or the House 6 7 of Representatives is best positioned to consider the 8 interrelated issues involved in the Federal carbon dioxide rule, including the impact to the various sectors of the electric 9 10 power generation industry, the impact to consumers of 11 electricity, the impact to public health, the environmental 12 impact to air quality and the impact to the Commonwealth's 13 overall economy; therefore be it

14 RESOLVED (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly 15 establish the Joint Select Committee on the Implementation of 16 the Environmental Protection Agency's Greenhouse Gas Regulation 17 to examine, investigate and complete a report on the most 18 appropriate manner in which to comply with the Federal carbon 19 dioxide rule; and be it further

20 RESOLVED, That the Joint Select Committee established under 21 this resolution consist of the following:

(1) Three members of the Senate appointed by thePresident pro tempore of the Senate.

24 (2) Three members of the Senate appointed by the25 Minority Leader of the Senate.

26 (3) Three members of the House of Representatives27 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

(4) Three members of the House of Representatives
appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of
Representatives.

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(5) The chairman and minority chairman of the
 Environmental Resources and Energy Committee of the Senate.

3 (6) The chairman and minority chairman of the
4 Environmental Resources and Energy Committee of the House of
5 Representatives.

6 (7) The chairman and minority chairman of the Consumer 7 Protection and Professional Licensure Committee of the 8 Senate.

9 (8) The chairman and minority chairman of the Consumer 10 Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives; 11 and be it further

12 RESOLVED, That the members of the Joint Select Committee 13 under this resolution be appointed within 20 days of the 14 adoption of this resolution; and be it further

15 RESOLVED, That the Joint Select Committee under this 16 resolution meet within 10 days after all members are appointed; 17 and be it further

18 RESOLVED, That the Joint Select Committee under this 19 resolution elect joint chairpersons from among the members of 20 the committee, with one being from the Senate and one being from 21 House of Representatives; and be it further

22 RESOLVED, That the Joint Select Committee be subject to 65 23 Pa.C.S. Ch. 7 (relating to public officers) and the act of 24 February 14, 2008 (P.L.6, No.3), known as the Right-to-Know Law; 25 and be it further

26 RESOLVED, That the Joint Select Committee under this 27 resolution:

(1) send for persons, subpoena and examine witnesses and
 compel the production and examination of documents and other
 evidence that may be necessary for the discharging of duties

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imposed under this resolution under the seal of the
 chairpersons of the Joint Select Committee;

3 (2) conduct at least four public hearings in
4 geographically dispersed locations in this Commonwealth,
5 including locations that would be directly economically
6 affected by the carbon dioxide regulation;

7 (3) accept written testimony and consider, as part of
8 the deliberations, all written and oral testimony provided;
9 and

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(4) consider all of the following:

(i) whether to rely on measures the Environmental Protection Agency used to calculate the carbon dioxide reduction goal, as well as other measures that were not part of the Environmental Protection Agency's goalsetting process;

16 (ii) whether the Commonwealth should participate in 17 multistate programs that already exist or whether a new 18 multistate carbon dioxide reduction program should be 19 created;

(iii) whether the Commonwealth should invest in
energy efficiency programs during the compliance period
to assist in meeting the carbon dioxide reduction goals;

23 (iv) whether the Commonwealth should work in
24 partnership with other states;

25 (v) when individual power plants must make 26 reductions;

(vi) the extent to which any of the following should
be included in the State Implementation Plan:

29 (A) demand-side energy efficiency programs;
30 (B) renewable energy standards;

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1 (C) efficiency improvements at existing affected 2 power plants; 3 (D) co-firing or switching to natural gas; transmission efficiency improvements; 4 (E) energy storage technologies; 5 (F) the retirement or deactivation of existing 6 (G) 7 affected generation units or facilities; 8 (H) the expansion of non-emitting sources, such 9 as nuclear power; 10 market-based trading programs; or (I) 11 other energy conservation programs; (J) 12 (vii) how best to avoid stranded investments in 13 existing affected power plants; 14 prioritize the components of the State (5) 15 Implementation Plan options based on a least-cost compliance 16 approach to benefit consumers of electricity; 17 take into consideration the necessity and value to (6) having a diverse generation fleet to ensure electric 18 19 reliability in this Commonwealth; and 20 (7) consider the direct impact of the Federal carbon 21 dioxide rule on employment in this Commonwealth by industry 22 sector, including private sector union employment; and be it further 23 24 RESOLVED, That no later than 12 months from the date of the 25 appointment of the members to the Joint Select Committee, the 26 committee submit a report of its findings to the following: 27 The President pro tempore of the Senate. (1)28 (2) The Speaker of the House of Representatives. 29 The Secretary of Environmental Protection; (3) 30 and be it further 20150HR0259PN1249 - 6 -

1 RESOLVED, That the ordinary and reasonable expenses incurred 2 by the Joint Select Committee be paid from accounts under the 3 control of the Chief Clerk of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of 4 the House of Representatives; and be it further

5 RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to 6 the following:

(1) The Pennsylvania Congressional Delegation.

8 (2) The Administrator of the Environmental Protection9 Agency.

10 (3) The Secretary of the Department of Environmental 11 Protection, including the following message with the 12 submittal:

13 Be advised that the General Assembly has enacted a 14 Resolution establishing a Joint Select Committee to 15 examine, investigate and complete a report on the most 16 appropriate manner in which to comply with the Federal 17 carbon dioxide rule, consistent with the Pennsylvania 18 Greenhouse Gas Regulation Implementation Act. Under Act 19 175 of 2014, the Department of Environmental Protection 20 must consider the views of the elected members of the 21 General Assembly in the development of the State 22 Implementation Plan for compliance with the Federal 23 carbon dioxide rule for existing stationary sources. It 24 is the intention of this Select Committee to further 25 direct the Department of Environmental Protection in the 26 development of the State Implementation Plan that will 27 ultimately be submitted to the House of Representatives 28 and the Senate for approval.

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
