## A RESOLUTION

1 2	Urging the Commonwealth to adopt and utilize person-first language with respect to people with disabilities.
3	WHEREAS, Approximately one in every six residents of this
4	Commonwealth is a person with a disability; and
5	WHEREAS, These persons, approximately 1.8 million
6	individuals, comprise every geographic, socioeconomic, racial
7	and ethnic, age, gender and religious group; and
8	WHEREAS, These persons, approximately 700,000 children and
9	youths and 1.1 million adults, are a part of our communities,
10	schools and workplaces; and
11	WHEREAS, People with disabilities are protected by Federal
12	and State laws prohibiting discrimination and promoting
13	integration, inclusion and participation in society, including
14	in the receipt of services, education, employment,
15	transportation and housing; and
16	WHEREAS, People with disabilities continue to encounter

1 negative attitudes, barriers, segregation, discrimination and 2 isolation in society; and

3 WHEREAS, Using language that puts a disability before the 4 individual or that describes the individual by a medical 5 diagnosis devalues and disrespects the humanity of that 6 individual; and

7 WHEREAS, Inaccurate descriptions, outdated words, 8 generalizations and other negative language about people with 9 disabilities contribute to stigma, misinformation, negative 10 stereotypes and attitudinal barriers; and

WHEREAS, Person-first language, also known as people-first language, places the individual before the disability and uses neutral, objective, accurate and nonpejorative language; and WHEREAS, Person-first language results in positive, realistic and balanced communication about people with disabilities and treats each person as an individual not defined solely by a disability; and

18 WHEREAS, Language shapes the ideas, attitudes and beliefs of 19 individuals and society; and

20 WHEREAS, Language thus influences government decisions,21 policies and laws; therefore be it

22 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize that 23 the use of language that is not person-first language with 24 respect to people with disabilities hinders their integration, 25 inclusion, participation and respect in society and negatively 26 influences government decisions, policies and laws; and be it 27 further

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge adoption and utilization by the Commonwealth of person-first language with respect to people with disabilities; and be it further

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1 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge adoption and 2 utilization of person-first language in legislation, 3 cosponsorship memos, reports, policies and other documents of 4 the General Assembly in print or electronic format; and be it 5 further

6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge adoption and 7 utilization of person-first language by executive branch 8 agencies and the judiciary in regulations, policies, reports and other documents in print or electronic format; and be it further 9 10 RESOLVED, That, for purposes of this resolution, person-first language or people-first language means language that places the 11 individual before his or her disability, does not reduce the 12 13 individual to a series of labels, symptoms or medical terms and 14 does not use outdated, inaccurate or pejorative descriptors or terms; and be it further 15

16 RESOLVED, That the following examples serve as models of 17 appropriate use of person-first language:

18 (1) "individual with a disability," not "disabled 19 individual";

20 (2) "individual who uses a wheelchair," not "individual 21 who is wheelchair-bound" or "confined to a wheelchair";

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(3) "individuals who are blind," not "the blind";

23 (4) "an individual with a mental health condition," not
24 "an individual who suffers from a mental disorder";

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(5) "individual with paraplegia," not "a paraplegic";(6) "individual who is deaf or hard of hearing," not

27 "the deaf" or "the hard of hearing"; and

(7) "individual with an intellectual disability," not
"mental retardation";

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RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to
 the Honorable Thomas Saylor, the Chief Justice of the
 Pennsylvania Supreme Court, to each Justice of the Pennsylvania
 Supreme Court and to the Court's officers and administrators.
