A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the outstanding contributions and achievements of Julian Abele, an accomplished architect and Philadelphia
- 3 resident.
- 4 WHEREAS, Julian Francis Abele, the first African-American
- 5 graduate of the architecture program at the University of
- 6 Pennsylvania, received scant recognition during his lifetime
- 7 despite his many significant professional contributions; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Although Fiske Kimball, noted architectural
- 9 historian and director of the Philadelphia Museum of Art,
- 10 acknowledged that Abele was one of the most sensitive designers
- 11 anywhere in America in 1942, Abele remained virtually unknown
- 12 outside Philadelphia's architectural community until the 1970s
- 13 and 1980s; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Born in Philadelphia in 1881, Abele lived most of
- 15 his life in the city, residing at 1515 Christian Street for
- 16 several decades of his adult life; and

- 1 WHEREAS, An accomplished student, Abele graduated from the
- 2 Philadelphia Museum and School of Industrial Art in 1898 and
- 3 entered the prestigious architecture program at the University
- 4 of Pennsylvania that same year, where he won several impressive
- 5 awards and served as president of the university's Architectural
- 6 Society during his senior year; and
- 7 WHEREAS, After graduating from Penn in 1902, Abele augmented
- 8 his education by studying architectural design at the
- 9 Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts while working evenings for
- 10 the noted Philadelphia architect Louis C. Hickman; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Abele spent the next few years studying design in
- 12 Paris and was influenced by 18th century French architecture
- 13 throughout his career; and
- 14 WHEREAS, In 1906, Abele returned to Philadelphia and joined
- 15 the firm of Horace Trumbauer, a popular architectural design
- 16 house that was responsible for many mansions in Philadelphia,
- 17 New York and Newport, Rhode Island, as well as apartment houses,
- 18 offices, school buildings, theaters, hospitals, clubhouses,
- 19 churches, libraries and museums; and
- 20 WHEREAS, One of Abele's largest projects was the firm's
- 21 commission to design and supervise the construction of the
- 22 Philadelphia Museum of Art; and
- WHEREAS, In 1909, he ascended to the firm's top position,
- 24 chief designer, a remarkable accomplishment in light of his
- 25 young age and race and he continued to be the top designer of
- 26 the Trumbauer firm until his death in 1950; and
- 27 WHEREAS, He designed the Duke University Chapel, as well as
- 28 many other buildings on the campus; and
- 29 WHEREAS, In 1942, Abele was elected to the American Institute
- 30 of Architects; and

- 1 WHEREAS, In his private life, Abele was a quiet, serious man,
- 2 yet brilliant and witty, who appreciated all things French,
- 3 enjoying fine wine, classical music and opera, and who engaged
- 4 in watercolor painting, sketching and jewelry and furniture
- 5 making; and
- 6 WHEREAS, He married Marguerite Bulle, a French woman, and had
- 7 two children, a son and a daughter, but after several years the
- 8 couple parted although they never divorced; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Today, we appreciate Abele as one of the early 20th
- 10 century's most adept designers of revival buildings, who
- 11 rejuvenated many long-dormant styles as vital, modern forms of
- 12 architectural expression and changed the skyline of Philadelphia
- 13 and much of the United States; therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 15 outstanding contributions and achievements of Julian Abele, an
- 16 accomplished architect and Philadelphia resident.
