INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, MAY 19, 2016

A RESOLUTION

- Designating the months of June, July and August 2016 as "Summer Reading Games Months 2016" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Libraries throughout this Commonwealth contribute to
- 4 the intellectual growth of children and teens during the summer
- 5 months through reading programs. According to the American
- 6 Library Association, summer reading programs began in the 1890s
- 7 as a way to encourage school children, particularly those in
- 8 urban areas who were not needed for farm work, to read during
- 9 summer vacation, use the library and develop a habit of reading;
- 10 and
- 11 WHEREAS, Summer reading programs attract children and teens
- 12 to libraries where they can participate in reading and cultural
- 13 activities. Children and teens benefit from summer programs that
- 14 combine elements of youth development principles with academic
- 15 enrichment; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Visiting local libraries provides children with
- 2 access to unlimited amounts of reading materials; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Studies done by researchers at Johns Hopkins
- 4 University in Baltimore, Maryland, show that disadvantaged youth
- 5 fall significantly behind other students because of a lack of
- 6 access to reading materials and a loss of encouragement in the
- 7 home and elsewhere to participate in any reading. Such a drop-
- 8 off of reading outside of the school year results in achievement
- 9 gaps not only in school, but also later in life. Communities
- 10 that offer summer reading encourage youth to develop reading as
- 11 a lifelong habit, draw in reluctant readers through activities,
- 12 help ensure children, particularly those in disadvantaged homes,
- 13 to read during the summer months to maintain and increase
- 14 reading skills and generate interest in free public libraries
- 15 and the services they offer; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Schools and public librarians throughout this
- 17 Commonwealth and the nation have cooperatively produced summer
- 18 reading lists to enhance both learning and recreation. Library
- 19 officials in Pennsylvania have worked with their counterparts
- 20 from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, American Samoa and
- 21 the Mariana Islands through the Collaborative Summer Library
- 22 Program (CSLP) to provide high-quality summer reading program
- 23 materials for children at the lowest cost possible for their
- 24 public libraries. The CSLP annually establishes themes for
- 25 summer reading. This year's themes are "On Your Mark, Get Set,
- 26 Read!" for children, "Get in the Game, Read!" for teens and
- 27 "Escape Your Mind, Read!" for adults; and
- 28 WHEREAS, Support of summer reading programs give all library
- 29 users an opportunity to become lifelong readers and learners by
- 30 visiting the library frequently. In fact, the Johns Hopkins

- 1 University and other studies have shown that those who increase
- 2 their reading have greater success in school and in the job
- 3 market, while those who have difficulty with reading may have a
- 4 greater risk of failing in the job field and turning to crime;
- 5 therefore be it
- 6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the
- 7 months of June, July and August 2016 as "Summer Reading Games"
- 8 Months 2016" in Pennsylvania to encourage all children and teens
- 9 in this Commonwealth to participate in all summer library
- 10 reading programs and to compete in games and other competitions
- 11 established by the libraries and other groups to increase summer
- 12 reading; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize all
- 14 libraries in Pennsylvania for the summer reading programs that
- 15 they offer and urge all State lawmakers, parents and community
- 16 leaders to assist, fully support and otherwise get involved in
- 17 programs to promote lifelong reading at home and elsewhere by
- 18 our children, youths and adults.
