AN ACT

- Amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), entitled, as 1 reenacted, "An act relating to alcoholic liquors, alcohol and 2 malt and brewed beverages; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto; regulating and restricting the manufacture, purchase, sale, possession, 5 consumption, importation, transportation, furnishing, holding 6 in bond, holding in storage, traffic in and use of alcoholic 7 liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages and the 8 9 persons engaged or employed therein; defining the powers and duties of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; providing 10 for the establishment and operation of State liquor stores, 11 for the payment of certain license fees to the respective 12 municipalities and townships, for the abatement of certain 13 14 nuisances and, in certain cases, for search and seizure 15 without warrant; prescribing penalties and forfeitures; providing for local option, and repealing existing laws," in 16 licenses and regulations and liquor, alcohol and malt and 17 brewed beverages, further providing for responsible alcohol 18 19 management.
- 20 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 21 hereby enacts as follows:
- 22 Section 1. Section 471.1 of the act of April 12, 1951
- 23 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the Liquor Code, reenacted and amended
- 24 June 29, 1987 (P.L.32, No.14), is amended by adding subsections
- 25 to read:

- 1 Section 471.1. Responsible Alcohol Management. --* * *
- 2 (a.1) It is the intent of the General Assembly that:
- 3 (1) The board's Bureau of Alcohol Education expand training
- 4 opportunities for alcohol service personnel by certifying all
- 5 private third-party providers of alcohol education who, at a
- 6 minimum, teach the information contained in the Bureau of
- 7 Alcohol Education's standard curriculum. Private industry in
- 8 this Commonwealth engaged in the business of training alcohol
- 9 <u>service personnel will become more competitive by creating the</u>
- 10 opportunity for enhanced training beyond the scope of the Bureau
- 11 of Alcohol Education's standard curriculum while not
- 12 compromising the standards set forth by the board.
- 13 (2) The board allow private third-party providers of alcohol
- 14 education flexibility in the manner by which they present
- 15 training materials to alcohol service personnel. The private
- 16 <u>industry offers a variety of successful training programs, and</u>
- 17 certifying these entities will not diminish the training
- 18 received, but will enhance it.
- 19 (3) The Bureau of Alcohol Education notify within thirty
- 20 days those private third-party providers of alcohol education
- 21 whose curriculum is deemed deficient and provide a written
- 22 explanation detailing what content is deemed to be deficient. By
- 23 establishing a certification process, private industry will have
- 24 a more predictable and transparent relationship with the board
- 25 and a better understanding of the Bureau of Alcohol Education's
- 26 certification process. Private third-party providers of training
- 27 to alcohol service personnel will be better able to:
- 28 (i) Provide the opportunity to more easily receive
- 29 <u>additional industry-related certifications</u>, making the service
- 30 personnel more marketable to employers and better trained in

- 1 their field.
- 2 (ii) Operate more efficiently with the board.
- 3 (iii) Increase the amount of trainers in this Commonwealth,
- 4 which will allow business to more easily expand.
- 5 * * *
- 6 (h) (1) Within sixty days of the effective date of this
- 7 subsection, the board shall certify private third-party
- 8 providers of training under subsection (b) that cover, at a
- 9 minimum, the content contained in the Bureau of Alcohol
- 10 Education's standard curriculum.
- 11 (2) In the event that the third-party provider's curriculum
- 12 is not equivalent to the standard curriculum, the provider shall
- 13 be advised by the board within sixty days as to where the
- 14 <u>curriculum is deficient.</u>
- 15 (3) The board shall permit private third-party providers of
- 16 alcohol training to modify the order in which the content of the
- 17 Bureau of Alcohol Education's standard curriculum is presented
- 18 so long as the material is taught.
- 19 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
