AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE AMENDMENTS, IN SENATE, OCTOBER 24, 2016

AN ACT

1 Designating a portion of State Route 663 in Montgomery County as
2 the Army Specialist Ray Ira Haas Memorial Highway;
3 designating the portion of State Route 100 from Hereford
4 Township at the Lehigh County line through Washington
5 Township in Berks County as the First Lieutenant William R.
6 Gendebien Memorial Highway; designating a portion of State
7 Route 2026, also known as Blair Mill Road, in Montgomery
8 County as the Private First Class Paul T. Wright Memorial
9 Highway; designating a bridge on a portion of Sheep Bridge
10 Road over I-83, Newberry Township, York County, as the Staff
11 Sgt. Jason M. Faley Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on
12 that portion of State Route 879 over Trout Run in Goshen
13 Township, Clearfield County, as the Private David Kyle
14 McCracken Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of State
15 Route 2034 in Montgomery County as the Cpl. Carl F. Hynek III
16 Memorial Highway; designating a portion of State Route 145 in
17 Salisbury Township, Lehigh County, as the Cpl. Joshua B.
18 Smith Memorial Highway; designating a bridge on that portion
19 of U.S. Route 15 over State Route 114, Upper Allen Township,
20 Cumberland County, as the Cpl. Jonathan Dean Faircloth
21 Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of Byberry Road
22 between Warminster Road and Orangemen's Road in Montgomery
23 County as the Major Jeffrey Toczykowski Memorial Highway;
24 designating a portion of State Route 1010 in Berks County as
25 the DeLight Breidegam, Jr., Memorial Highway; designating a
26 portion of State Route 51 in Fayette County as the Officer
27 Richard Champion Memorial Highway; designating a bridge on
28 that portion of State Route 741 over the Conestoga River,
29 between Pequea Township and Lancaster Township, Lancaster
30 County, as the Cpl. Eric M. Torbert, Jr., Memorial Bridge;
31 designating the interchange of State Route 43, the Mon-
32 Fayette Expressway, with Rubles Mill Road, known as Exit 4,
33 Fayette County, as the Master Sgt. Arthur L. Lilley Memorial

1 Interchange; designating a bridge on that portion of State
2 Route 770 over the Tunungwant Creek, Bradford Township,
3 McKean County, as the Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic Memorial
4 Bridge; designating a bridge to be constructed on that
5 portion of State Route 6 over Dingman Run, Coudersport
6 Borough, Potter County, as the PFC George Pesock Memorial
7 Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of State Route
8 872 over Bailey Run in Wharton Township, Potter County, as
9 the Sgt. Paul M. Brown Memorial Bridge; designating a certain
10 interchange in New Stanton Borough, Westmoreland County, as
11 the E. Jeffrey Wentzel Memorial Interchange; designating a
12 portion of State Route 220 in Lycoming and Sullivan Counties
13 as the Lieutenant Commander John J. Peterman Memorial
14 Highway; designating a portion of State Route 220 in Lycoming
15 County as the Thomas A. Paternostro Memorial Highway;
16 designating a bridge on that portion of ~~State Route 4005~~ <--
17 STATE ROUTE 1027 in Polk Township, Jefferson County, as the <--
18 Polk Township Veterans Memorial Bridge; and making related
19 repeals.

20 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
21 hereby enacts as follows:

22 Section 1. Army Specialist Ray Ira Haas Memorial Highway.

23 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
24 follows:

25 (1) On March 28, 1968, in the Quang Tri Province, South
26 Vietnam, Army Specialist Ray Ira Haas was performing his
27 assigned duty as an infantryman on the battlefield.

28 (2) During these operations, Army Specialist Haas and
29 his infantry came under fire.

30 (3) Army Specialist Haas fought bravely and was mortally
31 wounded during the firefight, later being pronounced dead at
32 a hospital in Vietnam.

33 (b) Designation.--That the portion of State Route 663 from
34 the Bucks County line, through Pennsburg Borough to the end of
35 Upper Hanover Township in Montgomery County, is hereby
36 designated the Army Specialist Ray Ira Haas Memorial Highway.

37 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
38 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
39 traffic in both directions on the highway.

1 Section 2. First Lieutenant William Raymond Gendebien Memorial
2 Highway.

3 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
4 follows:

5 (1) On October 26, 1965, in Quang Nam Province, South
6 Vietnam, VMFA 115 was performing combat operations against
7 hostile forces.

8 (2) First Lieutenant William R. Gendebien was performing
9 his assigned duty as Air Traffic Controller from an aircraft
10 with the assigned crew in support of VMFA 115 in their combat
11 operations.

12 (3) During these operations, hostile actions downed the
13 aircraft with its crew and it made a crash landing.

14 (4) First Lieutenant William R. Gendebien died in the
15 crash of the aircraft.

16 (b) Designation.--That the portion of State Route 100 from
17 Hereford Township at the Lehigh County line through Washington
18 Township in Berks County is hereby designated the First
19 Lieutenant William R. Gendebien Memorial Highway.

20 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
21 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
22 traffic in both directions on the highway.

23 Section 3. Private First Class Paul T. Wright Memorial Highway.

24 (a) Findings.--

25 (1) Private First Class Paul T. Wright was a resident of
26 Willow Grove, Pennsylvania, before enlisting in the United
27 States Army.

28 (2) PFC Wright was assigned to the 3rd Platoon, C
29 Company, 26th Engineer Battalion, Americal Division of the
30 United States Army in Vietnam.

1 (3) While valiantly serving his country, PFC Wright, at
2 20 years of age, was killed by an explosive device on April
3 3, 1968, in the Quang Ngai Province of South Vietnam.

4 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 2026, also
5 known as Blair Mill Road, in Montgomery County from Easton Road
6 to Horsham Road is hereby designated the Private First Class
7 Paul T. Wright Memorial Highway.

8 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
9 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
10 traffic in both directions on the highway.

11 Section 4. Staff Sgt. Jason M. Faley Memorial Bridge.

12 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
13 follows:

14 (1) Staff Sergeant Jason Matthew Faley was born on May
15 19, 1973 and graduated from Red Land High School in 1991.

16 (2) He was a Staff Sergeant in the United States Air
17 Force, Special Operations Tactical Air Control Party, serving
18 with the 5th Special Forces stationed at Fort Campbell,
19 Kentucky, supporting the 101st Airborne Forces.

20 (3) Staff Sergeant Jason M. Faley was killed in Kuwait
21 on March 12, 2001.

22 (4) Prior to his death, he received numerous medals and
23 commendations including the Air Force Achievement Medal, The
24 Army Achievement Medal, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal,
25 the Airborne Parachutist Badge, the Military Free Fall Badge,
26 The Air Assault Badge and the Pathfinder Badge. He was also
27 Ranger certified and a graduate of Airman Leadership School.

28 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on Sheep Bridge Road in
29 Newberry Township, York County, over I-83 is hereby designated
30 the Staff Sgt. Jason M. Faley Memorial Bridge.

1 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
2 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
3 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

4 Section 5. Private David Kyle McCracken Memorial Bridge.

5 The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

6 (a) Findings.--

7 (1) David Kyle McCracken was born March 12, 1924, to J.
8 Ward and Margaret Jane Kyler McCracken of Shawville,
9 Clearfield County.

10 (2) Mr. McCracken graduated from Clearfield High School
11 in 1942 and was employed by the Department of Highways until
12 March 1943, when he was inducted into the Army.

13 (3) Private McCracken received basic training at Camp
14 Walters, Texas, and was sent to North Africa in September
15 1943 as a member of the 15th Engineers Combat Battalion, 9th
16 Division.

17 (4) Private McCracken was later transferred to England,
18 Italy, France and Germany.

19 (5) On December 31, 1944, Private McCracken made the
20 ultimate sacrifice for his country when he was killed in
21 action in Belgium.

22 (6) Private McCracken is the recipient of a Purple
23 Heart.

24 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 879 over
25 Trout Run in Goshen Township, Clearfield County, is hereby
26 designated the Private David Kyle McCracken Memorial Bridge.

27 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
28 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
29 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

30 Section 6. Cpl. Carl F. Hynek III Memorial Highway.

1 (a) Findings.--

2 (1) Cpl. Carl Hynek was born and raised in Upper
3 Moreland Township, Montgomery County.

4 (2) Cpl. Carl Hynek was drafted into the United States
5 Army after his high school graduation and served in Vietnam
6 with the 101st Airborne Division.

7 (3) Cpl. Carl Hynek was killed on October 5, 1967, in
8 Quang Nam, South Vietnam, at 22 years of age from wounds he
9 received in an intense firefight with enemy forces.

10 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 2034 in
11 Montgomery County from Terwood Road to Moreland Road is hereby
12 designated the Cpl. Carl F. Hynek III Memorial Highway.

13 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
14 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
15 traffic in both directions on the highway.

16 Section 7. Cpl. Joshua B. Smith Memorial Highway.

17 (a) Findings.--

18 (1) Cpl. Joshua B. Smith was born on August 18, 1985, in
19 Twentynine Palms, California, and a year later relocated with
20 his family to the Lehigh Valley area.

21 (2) Cpl. Smith lived in Salisbury Township and was a
22 2003 graduate of Salisbury High School where he led the
23 school's soccer team as captain for two years.

24 (3) In 2003, Cpl. Smith joined the Marine Corps and was
25 promoted to private first class upon graduation from Parris
26 Island, South Carolina.

27 (4) After serving eight years in the Marine Corps, Cpl.
28 Smith was honorably discharged in 2011.

29 (5) Cpl. Smith was awarded the National Defense Service
30 Medal, Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation, Global War on

1 Terrorism Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal, Sea
2 Service Deployment Ribbon, Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal,
3 Korean Defense Service Medal, NATO Article 5 Medal and the
4 Navy and Marine Corps Commendation.

5 (6) Cpl. Smith returned home and struggled with
6 posttraumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury
7 until he lost his battle on November 5, 2012.

8 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 145 in
9 Salisbury Township, Lehigh County, from Segment 40 Offset 137 to
10 Segment 40 Offset 3051 is hereby designated the Cpl. Joshua B.
11 Smith Memorial Highway.

12 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
13 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
14 traffic in both directions on the highway.

15 Section 8. Cpl. Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial Bridge.

16 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
17 follows:

18 (1) United States Marine Corps Cpl. Jonathan Dean
19 Faircloth, 22 years of age, died on March 29, 2011, while
20 taking part in training maneuvers at Marine Corps Base
21 Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii; and

22 (2) Cpl. Faircloth was born in York on May 7, 1988, and
23 graduated from Mechanicsburg Area High School in 2006; and

24 (3) Cpl. Faircloth joined the Marine Corps in 2006 and
25 was deployed to Iraq in 2008 and to Afghanistan in 2010; and

26 (4) Cpl. Faircloth served as an aerial observer and
27 aircraft mechanic throughout his five-year military career;
28 and

29 (5) For his exemplary service, Cpl. Faircloth was
30 awarded four Air Medals, two Navy-Marine Corps Achievement

1 Medals, the Iraq Campaign Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign
2 Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal and the
3 National Defense Service Medal.

4 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on U.S. Route 15 in
5 Upper Allen Township, Cumberland County over State Route 114 is
6 hereby designated the Cpl. Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial
7 Bridge.

8 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
9 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
10 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

11 Section 9. Major Jeffrey Toczykowski Memorial Highway.

12 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
13 follows:

14 (1) A native of Upper Moreland Township, Major Jeffrey
15 Toczykowski graduated from Archbishop Wood High School in
16 Warminster.

17 (2) Major Toczykowski was commissioned in 1995 as a
18 second lieutenant through the Reserve Officer Training Corps
19 program at Valley Forge Military Academy.

20 (3) In 1997, Major Toczykowski graduated from Texas A&M
21 University with a degree in criminal justice.

22 (4) After deployments in Germany and Bosnia, Major
23 Toczykowski was assigned to the 10th Special Forces Group in
24 2003.

25 (5) On November 3, 2005, Major Toczykowski made the
26 ultimate sacrifice for his country when he was killed in a
27 fall from a helicopter during a combat infiltration in
28 hostile enemy territory in Al Anbar Province, Iraq.

29 (6) Major Jeffrey Toczykowski's legacy of service lives
30 on through a scholarship fund he established at Valley Forge

1 Military Academy.

2 (b) Designation.--The section of Byberry Road between
3 Warminster Road and Orangemen's Road in Montgomery County is
4 hereby designated the Major Jeffrey Toczykowski Memorial
5 Highway.

6 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
7 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
8 traffic in both directions on the highway.

9 Section 10. DeLight Breidegam, Jr., Memorial Highway.

10 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
11 follows:

12 (1) DeLight Breidegam, Jr., attended Gettysburg College
13 and served in the United States Air Force during World War
14 II.

15 (2) Mr. Breidegam has been honored by many organizations
16 for his leadership, altruism and philanthropy.

17 (3) Among Mr. Breidegam's many awards are the World
18 Entrepreneur Award from Kutztown University, Outstanding
19 Business Leader from Northwood University, Business Person of
20 the Year from the Berks County Chamber of Commerce, the
21 Leadership by Example Award from the Berks County Senior
22 Citizens Council, the Junior Achievement Hall of Fame of
23 Berks County and the Eberly Medal for Philanthropy and
24 Volunteerism from the Fund for the Advancement of the State
25 System of Higher Education, Inc.

26 (4) Mr. Breidegam also held honorary degrees from
27 Moravian College and Kutztown University and served both
28 schools as a board member.

29 (5) Mr. Breidegam was a prominent supporter of our
30 military, serving as a member of the Southeastern

1 Pennsylvania Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve
2 Committee and received the Employer Support of the Guard and
3 Reserve Award from the Department of Defense National
4 Committee.

5 (6) Mr. Breidegam also received the Army Community of
6 Excellence Award and the Freedom Award from the Department of
7 Defense National Committee of Employer Support of the Guard
8 and Reserve.

9 (7) Despite his long list of awards, honors and
10 achievements, Mr. Breidegam always credited his success to
11 those who worked around him.

12 (b) Designation.--The portion of State Route 1010 in Berks
13 County is hereby designated the DeLight Breidegam, Jr., Memorial
14 Highway.

15 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
16 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
17 traffic in both directions on the highway.

18 Section 11. Officer Richard Champion Memorial Highway.

19 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
20 follows:

21 (1) Officer Richard Champion was killed on December 14,
22 2014, in a two-vehicle crash on State Route 51 in Perry
23 Township while pursuing another vehicle.

24 (2) Officer Champion had been a member of the
25 Perryopolis Borough Police Department for only eight months,
26 and had previously worked for Derry Borough Police in
27 Westmoreland County.

28 (3) Before graduating from the Westmoreland Community
29 College Police Academy in November 2013, Officer Champion
30 served with the United States Army, including two tours

1 overseas.

2 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 51 in Fayette
3 County from the southern border of Perryopolis Borough to the
4 southern border of Perry Township is hereby designated the
5 Officer Richard Champion Memorial Highway.

6 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
7 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
8 traffic in both directions on the highway.

9 Section 12. Cpl. Eric M. Torbert, Jr., Memorial Bridge.

10 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
11 follows:

12 (1) Cpl. Eric M. Torbert, Jr., was a 2003 graduate of
13 Penn Manor High School.

14 (2) Cpl. Torbert enlisted with the United States Marine
15 Corps on September 5, 2007, and served as a combat engineer
16 assigned to the 1st Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine
17 Division, 1st Marine Expeditionary Force, based at Camp
18 Pendleton, California.

19 (3) On December 18, 2010, Cpl. Torbert valiantly gave
20 his life in service to his country while conducting combat
21 operations in Helmand Province, Afghanistan.

22 (4) Cpl. Torbert's personal service awards include the
23 Purple Heart, Combat Action Ribbon, National Defense Service
24 Medal and Sea Service Deployment Ribbon.

25 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 741 over
26 the Conestoga River, between Pequea Township and Lancaster
27 Township, Lancaster County, is hereby designated the Cpl. Eric
28 M. Torbert, Jr., Memorial Bridge.

29 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
30 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to

1 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

2 Section 13. Master Sgt. Arthur L. Lilley Memorial Interchange.

3 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
4 follows:

5 (1) Arthur L. Lilley was born on April 19, 1972, to
6 Arthur and Elizabeth Lilley in Uniontown, Pennsylvania.

7 (2) He was a 1990 graduate of Tri-Valley High School in
8 Uniontown, Pennsylvania.

9 (3) In 1990, Arthur L. Lilley joined the United States
10 Army as an infantryman. He served in Operation Desert Shield
11 and Operation Desert Storm as a member of the 101st Airborne
12 Division.

13 (4) In 1992, he was transferred to the 1st Battalion,
14 508th Infantry Regiment, 173rd Infantry Brigade, at Camp
15 Ederle, Italy.

16 (5) After graduating from the Special Forces
17 Qualification Course in 1996, Master Sgt. Lilley was assigned
18 to the 1st Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group as Special
19 Forces Engineer Sgt..

20 (6) In 2000, Master Sgt. Lilley was assigned to the 96th
21 Civil Affairs Battalion at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, where
22 he served as Engineer Sgt. and later as First Sgt..

23 (7) Master Sgt. Lilley was assigned to the 2nd
24 Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group as an Operational
25 Detachment Alpha Team Sgt. in 2005.

26 (8) On June 15, 2007, Master Sgt. Lilley gave his life
27 in the line of duty at 35 years of age while serving in
28 support of Operation Enduring Freedom in Paktika Province,
29 Afghanistan.

30 (9) Master Sgt. Lilley received numerous commendations,

1 including the Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation
2 Medal, Joint Service Achievement Medal, Army Achievement
3 Medal, Army Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service
4 Medal, Southwest Asia Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism
5 Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal,
6 Humanitarian Service Medal, NCO Professional Development
7 Ribbon, Army Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon, Kuwait
8 Liberation Medal (Saudi Arabia), Kuwait Liberation Medal
9 (Kuwait), Expert Infantryman Badge, Combat Infantry Badge,
10 Master Parachutist Badge, Air Assault Badge and Special
11 Forces Tab.

12 (10) An active member of his community, Master Sgt.
13 Lilley served as a youth minister at Saint Andrew's United
14 Methodist Church in Fayetteville, North Carolina.

15 (b) Designation.--The interchange of State Route 43, the
16 Mon-Fayette Expressway, with Rubles Mill Road, known as Exit 4,
17 Fayette County, is hereby designated the Master Sgt. Arthur L.
18 Lilley Memorial Interchange.

19 (c) Signs.--The Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission shall erect
20 and maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the
21 interchange.

22 Section 14. Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic Memorial Bridge.

23 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares:

24 (1) Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic, a native of Bradford
25 Township, McKean County, died on June 24, 2006, in Ghecko,
26 Afghanistan, when his patrol unit came in contact with enemy
27 forces using small arms fire during a cordon and search
28 mission.

29 (2) Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic was assigned to the 2nd
30 Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group, Fort Bragg, North

1 Carolina.

2 (3) Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic was the recipient of
3 Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Joint
4 Service Achievement Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Army Good
5 Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan
6 Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, NCO
7 Professional Development Ribbon, Army Service Ribbon,
8 Overseas Service Ribbon, Expert Field Medical Badge, Special
9 Operations Dive Badge, Master Parachutist Badge, Air Assault
10 Badge and Special Forces Tab. He was posthumously awarded the
11 Purple Heart and Combat Infantryman Badge.

12 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 770 over
13 the Tunungwant Creek in Bradford Township, McKean County, is
14 hereby designated the Master Sgt. Thomas Maholic Memorial
15 Bridge.

16 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
17 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
18 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

19 Section 15. PFC George Pesock Memorial Bridge.

20 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares that
21 PFC George Pesock, a native of Potter County, was killed in
22 action while serving his country in July 1944, on the island of
23 Saipan.

24 (b) Designation.--The bridge to be constructed on State
25 Route 6 over Dingman Run, Coudersport Borough, Potter County, is
26 hereby designated the PFC George Pesock Memorial Bridge.

27 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
28 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
29 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

30 Section 16. Sgt. Paul M. Brown Memorial Bridge.

1 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
2 follows:

3 (1) Paul M. Brown, of Wharton Township, lost his life
4 during combat operations in South Korea on March 2, 1951,
5 during his second tour of duty in service to his country.

6 (2) Brown served as an Army technician fourth grade in
7 World War II for which he received the Asiatic Pacific
8 Theatre Ribbon, Philippines Liberation Ribbon, Good Conduct
9 Medal and World War II Victory Medal.

10 (3) Brown returned to Potter County following his
11 service in World War II. Five years later he was recalled to
12 active service as a member of Company B, 17th Infantry
13 Regiment, 7th Infantry Division in Korea.

14 (4) Brown was killed by enemy fire during heavy fighting
15 that ensued around Cheehon, Chungju and Pyeongchang as part
16 of an effort to push the North Korean and Chinese forces back
17 above the 38th Parallel.

18 (5) Brown was awarded the Purple Heart, Combat
19 Infantryman's Badge, Good Conduct Medal, Korean Service
20 Medal, United Nations Service Medal, National Defense Service
21 Medal, Korean Presidential Unit Citation and the Republic of
22 Korea Service Medal.

23 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on State Route 872 over
24 Bailey Run in Wharton Township, Potter County, as the Sgt. Paul
25 M. Brown Memorial Bridge.

26 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
27 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
28 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

29 Section 17. E. Jeffrey Wentzel Memorial Interchange.

30 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as

1 follows:

2 (1) E. Jeffrey Wentzel was a native of Youngwood and a
3 35-year veteran of the Youngwood Volunteer Hose Company No.
4 1.

5 (2) On March 22, 2014, Mr. Wentzel was part of a group
6 from the fire department using its K-9 Search and Rescue team
7 to aid in a search for a missing woman in North Versailles.
8 As he was searching along railroad tracks, Mr. Wentzel
9 accidentally stepped in front of an oncoming train and was
10 hit from behind by its engine. He died at the scene.

11 (3) Mr. Wentzel was a well-respected and committed
12 volunteer firefighter. He held numerous line officer and
13 board positions within the department during his lengthy
14 service and was named the 2012 Youngwood Firefighter of the
15 Year. Mr. Wentzel took part in the rescue effort at Ground
16 Zero after 9/11.

17 (b) Designation.--The interchange of Interstate 70 and
18 Pennsylvania Route 119 in New Stanton Borough, Westmoreland
19 County, is hereby designated the E. Jeffrey Wentzel Memorial
20 Interchange.

21 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
22 maintain appropriate signs at the interchange displaying the
23 name of the interchange.

24 Section 18. Lieutenant Commander John J. Peterman Memorial
25 Highway.

26 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares as
27 follows:

28 (1) Lieutenant Commander John J. Peterman was born in
29 Nordmont, Sullivan County, on January 19, 1923, and, in 1941,
30 graduated from Sullivan Highlands School, Sonestown. He

1 enlisted in the United States Navy 11 days after graduation.

2 (2) Lieutenant Commander Peterman spent the early years
3 of his service in the Navy assigned to submarines. Lieutenant
4 Commander Peterman was initially assigned to the USS Flying
5 Fish (SS229). While abroad, Lieutenant Commander Peterman
6 made nine war patrols, having a part in the Battle of Midway,
7 patrolling the Truk Lagoon off the Caroline Islands and
8 patrolling in the Sea of Japan.

9 (3) After serving aboard submarines for 11 years,
10 Lieutenant Commander Peterman served as a torpedo instructor.
11 In 1955, Lieutenant Commander Peterman became a commissioned
12 officer, serving at ammunition depots in New Jersey and
13 California. He also spent time on the USS Henrico (APA45) as
14 a gunnery officer and then on the USS Sperry (AS12) as a
15 weapons repair officer. He served the last five years of his
16 Navy career as an underwater weapons officer in Newport,
17 Rhode Island. Upon retiring in 1972 as a lieutenant
18 commander, he returned home to his native Sullivan County,
19 where he served a term as county sheriff and as a Laporte
20 Township Supervisor.

21 (4) Lieutenant Commander Peterman was active in his
22 community where, as a member of the Williamsport Base of the
23 United States Submarine Veterans, Inc., he participated in
24 visits to the Janet Weis Children's Hospital, visiting with
25 pediatric patients while making them "honorary submariners."
26 Lieutenant Commander Peterman would wear his uniform for
27 these visits, often giving the children a living history
28 lesson. Lieutenant Commander Peterman was also an active
29 member of the Sonestown American Legion Post #601.

30 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 220 from State

1 Route 2081 in Shrewsbury Township, Lycoming County, to State
2 Route 42 in Laporte Township, Sullivan County, is hereby
3 designated as the Lieutenant Commander John J. Peterman Memorial
4 Highway.

5 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
6 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
7 traffic in both directions on the highway.

8 Section 19. Thomas A. Paternostro Memorial Highway.

9 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds as follows:

10 (1) Thomas A. Paternostro was born in Williamsport on
11 August 9, 1939. He was married to Marthalie Ryan Paternostro
12 for over 48 years. He was a 1957 graduate of the former St.
13 Mary's High School in Williamsport. He was a 1964 graduate of
14 Lycoming College where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree
15 in political science. In 1975, he received his Masters of
16 Public Administration from St. Lawrence University in Canton,
17 New York.

18 (2) Mr. Paternostro was a lifelong educator. He was both
19 an elementary and secondary school teacher before serving as
20 an elementary principal in Prattsburgh, New York. He then
21 served as superintendent of schools in the Clifton-Fine
22 School District in Star Lake, New York, and the Oneonta City
23 School District in Oneonta, New York. In 1981, he became
24 superintendent of schools at the East Lycoming School
25 District in Hughesville, where he served admirably for 11
26 years.

27 (3) Following his retirement from public schools in
28 1992, Mr. Paternostro went to work for the Industrial
29 Modernization Center in Montoursville. There he was a driving
30 force behind the Pennsylvania School-to-Work initiative, a

1 project that ultimately became a national model for youth
2 apprenticeship. He testified about this initiative in front
3 of a United States Senate committee. His testimony and the
4 initiative were later featured on the ABC News American
5 Agenda and in *Smithsonian Magazine*.

6 (4) Continuing his dedicated service to public education
7 and children, Mr. Paternostro served as the director of the
8 Children's Advocacy Initiative for Lycoming County in the
9 early 2000s. In 2004, he received the Child Advocate Award
10 for Leadership on Children's Issues.

11 (5) Mr. Paternostro spent time supervising student
12 teachers at Bloomsburg University. He also spent three years
13 as a consultant for the American Board for the Certification
14 of Teacher Excellence in Washington, DC.

15 (6) From 2005 to 2011, following an appointment by the
16 Pennsylvania Secretary of Education, Mr. Paternostro served
17 as one of the Commonwealth's first Distinguished Educators,
18 individuals serving to help struggling districts throughout
19 the State improve student achievement.

20 (7) Mr. Paternostro was an active member of his
21 community. He was a charter board member of the Northcentral
22 Pennsylvania Conservancy, past president of the Lycoming
23 Audubon Society, chairman of the capital campaign of the
24 Hughesville Library Building Committee, past president of the
25 Hughesville Rotary, past chairman of the Literacy Board at
26 the James V. Brown Library, former member of the Lycoming
27 County Historical Society Museum board, former member of the
28 Williamsport/Lycoming Chamber of Commerce Education Committee
29 and a Leadership Lycoming volunteer.

30 (8) Mr. Paternostro also served on the State Legislative

1 Joint Commission Task Force on Children, Lycoming County's
2 Child Death Review Team, Lycoming County's School Safety
3 Committee on Homeland Security and, most recently, as a
4 member of the Lycoming County Heroin Drug Task Force. He was
5 also a proud former member of the Picture Rocks Volunteer
6 Fire Department fire police.

7 (9) Until his passing, Mr. Paternostro was a regular
8 contributor to *Webb Weekly*, where he wrote a feature column
9 on nature.

10 (10) Mr. Paternostro served his country in the U.S. Navy
11 from 1957 through 1965, including time spent in the Naval
12 Reserve. He attended Naval Communications School as well as
13 Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island. He
14 received a special commendation from the Chief of Naval
15 Operations for his far East service following his time spent
16 in Japan.

17 (b) Designation.--The section of State Route 220 in Lycoming
18 County from State Route 405 in Hughesville Borough to the
19 Picture Rocks Borough line is hereby designated the Thomas A.
20 Paternostro Memorial Highway.

21 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
22 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the highway to
23 traffic in both directions on the highway.

24 Section 20. Polk Township Veterans Memorial Bridge.

25 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds and declares that
26 Polk Township wishes to honor all past, present and future
27 military personnel that have served or will serve our country
28 from this area.

29 (b) Designation.--The bridge located on S.R. ~~4005~~ 1027 in <--
30 Polk Township, Jefferson County, over ~~Hetrick Run~~ NORTH FORK <--

1 CREEK is hereby designated as the Polk Township Veterans
2 Memorial Bridge.

3 (c) Signs.--The Department of Transportation shall erect and
4 maintain appropriate signs displaying the name of the bridge to
5 traffic in both directions on the bridge.

6 Section 21. Repeals are as follows:

7 (1) The General Assembly declares that the repeals under
8 paragraph (2) are necessary to effectuate the provisions of
9 sections 8 and 17 of this act.

20 A bridge on State Route 2014 over the Muncy Creek in Muncy Creek
21 Township, Lycoming County, as the Private Walter L. Smith
22 Spanish-American War Memorial Bridge.

23 A portion of State Route 2044 in Lycoming County as the Lance
24 Corporal William F. Merrill Vietnam Veterans Highway.

25 The bridge on State Route 225 that crosses the Armstrong Creek
26 in Halifax Township, Dauphin County, as the Staff Sergeant
27 Brian K. Mowery Memorial Bridge.

28 A bridge on that portion of State Route 1026, Section 004 over
29 the Cocalico Creek, Denver Borough, and West Cocalico
30 Township, Lancaster County, as the Samuel L. Snyder Memorial

1 Bridge.

2 An overpass on State Route 49 over State Route 15, Lawrence
3 Township, Tioga County, as the Lance Corporal Michael G.
4 Plank Memorial Bridge.

5 A portion of Blair Mill Road in Montgomery County as the PVT
6 William H. Walls, U.S.M.C. Memorial Highway.

7 The overpass on State Route 3145 over Interstate 376, BMS 02-
8 3145-0010-0537, in the Market District at Settlers Ridge,
9 Robinson Township, Allegheny County, as the Roy F. Johns,
10 Jr., Overpass.

11 A portion of State Route 51 North in the Borough of Coraopolis,
12 Allegheny County, as the Fred A. Trello Memorial Boulevard.

13 A certain interchange in New Stanton Borough, Westmoreland
14 County, as the Edwin "Lance" Wentzel Memorial Interchange.

15 The bridge carrying State Route 2005 (Business Route 222) over
16 the Schuylkill River, Riverfront Drive and Norfolk Southern
17 Railroad in the City of Reading, Berks County, commonly
18 referred to as the Bingaman Street Bridge, as the 65th U.S.
19 Infantry Regiment, Borinqueneers Memorial Bridge.

20 A bridge on that portion of State Route 36 over the Chest Creek,
21 Patton Borough, Cambria County, as the Martin Joseph Davis
22 Memorial Bridge.

23 A portion of State Route 1008 in Fayetteville, Franklin County,
24 as the James W. Cutchall Memorial Highway.

25 A bridge on that portion of U.S. Route 15 over State Route 114,
26 Upper Allen Township, Cumberland County, as the Corporal
27 Jonathan Dean Faircloth Memorial Bridge.

28 The bridge on that portion of Township Route 431/436, Cooney
29 Road, over U.S. Route 22 in Munster Township, Cambria County,
30 as the PFC Thomas A. Cooney Memorial Bridge.

1 The bridge on Tower Road spanning U.S. Route 219 in Croyle
2 Township, Cambria County, as the Trooper Herbert A. Wirfel
3 Memorial Bridge.

4 A bridge on that portion of Greenwood Avenue over the SEPTA
5 tracks in Cheltenham Township and Jenkintown Borough,
6 Montgomery County, as the Honorable Lawrence H. Curry Bridge.

7 A bridge on that portion of State Route 144 over the Bald Eagle
8 Creek, Milesburg Borough, Centre County, as the Veterans
9 Bridge.

10 An interchange on Pennsylvania Turnpike Route 66 in Westmoreland
11 County as the David B. Sheridan Memorial Interchange.

12 A bridge on that portion of State Route 217 over the Norfolk
13 Southern Railroad tracks and 2nd Street in Derry Borough,
14 Westmoreland County, as the Derry Veterans Memorial Bridge,"
15 are repealed.

16 (3) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under
17 paragraph (4) is necessary to effectuate the provisions of
18 sections 18 and 19 of this act.

19 (4) Sections 3 and 4 of the act of July 20, 2016
20 (P.L.813, No.90), entitled "An act designating a portion of
21 State Route 74 in Cumberland County as the Marine Lance
22 Corporal Gary Lee Ream Memorial Highway; designating a bridge
23 on that portion of State Route 4010 over the Sugar Creek,
24 Sugarcreek Borough, Venango County, as the Lieutenant Andrew
25 J. White Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of State
26 Route 220 in Lycoming and Sullivan Counties as the Lieutenant
27 Commander John J. Peterman Memorial Highway; designating a
28 portion of State Route 220 in Lycoming County as the Thomas
29 A. Paternostro Memorial Highway; designating a bridge on that
30 portion of State Route 74 over the Sherman's Creek, Spring

1 Township, Perry County, as the PFC William Oscar Stambaugh
