A RESOLUTION

- Designating March 30, 2016, as "Female Veterans Recognition Day" 1 in Pennsylvania and encouraging all Pennsylvanians to join in 2 recognizing, appreciating and saluting the service and sacrifices of more than 71,000 female veterans who live in Pennsylvania. 5 6 WHEREAS, Women have a long, courageous and largely unrecognized history of military service to our country; and 7 8 WHEREAS, At the founding of our nation, women provided important support services as nurses, cooks, laundresses and 10 clerks for the troops, and heroically stepped up to the front 11 lines, or risked their lives in other ways; and WHEREAS, Margaret Corbin and Mary "Molly Pitcher" McCauley 12 manned their fallen husbands' cannons at the battles of Fort 13 Washington and Monmouth and Ann Simpson Davis carried supplies 14 15 and messages across enemy lines during the southeastern 16 Pennsylvania campaign of the War of Independence; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Throughout the history of our nation, women such as
- 18 Clara Barton, who cared for the wounded and dying from Antietam

- 1 to Andersonville during the Civil War, and Cathay Williams, who,
- 2 freed from slavery during the Civil War, dressed as a man to
- 3 serve two years as an infantry soldier, and thousands more
- 4 women, whose names are unknown to history, have in every
- 5 conflict served our national interests largely without official
- 6 recognition and commendation; and
- WHEREAS, With America's approach and entry into World War I,
- 8 for the first time women were recruited to serve in auxiliary
- 9 military units and 14,000 women responded to free troops for
- 10 combat by serving in noncombat duties such as clerks and radio
- 11 electricians while 21,000 more women served in the Army Nurse
- 12 Corps at camps and hospitals here and overseas; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Women's services nonetheless continued to be
- 14 regarded in a subordinate position: hundreds of women who served
- 15 in the Army Signal Corps were required to purchase their own
- 16 uniforms and were denied military discharges until 1979, long
- 17 after most of these veterans had passed away; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The auxiliary units were disbanded following World
- 19 War I until 1941 and in 1943 were granted official military
- 20 status in the Women's Army Corps (WACs), Women Accepted for
- 21 Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES), the Navy and the Marine
- 22 Corps Women's Reserve; and
- 23 WHEREAS, With the passage of the Women's Armed Services
- 24 Integration Act of 1948, women were finally allowed to serve as
- 25 permanent members of the military and granted entitlement to
- 26 veteran benefits; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Today more than 200,000 women, comprising about 10%
- 28 of all service personnel, including dozens of female generals
- 29 and admirals, are fully integrated throughout all branches of
- 30 the armed forces, including combat components; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Throughout the long restrictions on their
- 2 opportunity to serve, women did so despite injury, privation,
- 3 imprisonment and death, from the death of Jemima Warner of
- 4 Thompson's Pennsylvania Rifle Battalion at the siege of Quebec
- 5 in 1775, through that of Army Specialist Lori Piestewa, who died
- 6 after being captured by Iraqi forces during Operation Iraqi
- 7 Freedom; and
- 8 WHEREAS, One in ten living veterans is a female veteran; and
- 9 WHEREAS, More than 71,000 Pennsylvania residents are female
- 10 veterans; and
- 11 WHEREAS, After service, female veterans continue to face
- 12 largely unrecognized challenges: one in four female veterans
- 13 seeking VA medical care has experienced sexual assault and
- 14 female veterans have a 400% greater risk of homelessness than
- 15 their male peers do; and
- 16 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Commission for Women has asked the
- 17 Senate and House of Representatives to join in recognizing the
- 18 service and sacrifices of Pennsylvania women in the interests of
- 19 our nation; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The selflessness and bravery of women in keeping our
- 21 Commonwealth and our country safe and in protecting our freedoms
- 22 should not go unnoted or be diminished; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The courageous and dutiful efforts of women in the
- 24 service of our Commonwealth and of our country should be called
- 25 to the attention of all Pennsylvanians; therefore be it
- 26 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate March 30, 2016, as
- 27 "Female Veterans Recognition Day" in Pennsylvania; and be it
- 28 further
- 29 RESOLVED, That the Senate encourage all Pennsylvanians to
- 30 join in recognizing, appreciating and saluting the service and

- 1 sacrifices of more than 71,000 female veterans who live in
- 2 Pennsylvania.
