6	WHEREAS, The Commonwealth takes the health, safety and
7	welfare of students in Pennsylvania with utmost seriousness; and
8	WHEREAS, The Commonwealth operates 500 public school
9	districts with 1.74 million students; and
10	WHEREAS, The Commonwealth operates 155 brick and mortar
11	charter schools and 20 cyber charter schools; and
12	WHEREAS, In both the fall semester of 2016 and all of 2017,
13	Pennsylvania had the second highest number of school threats
14	nationally, which is a 15% increase for that time frame; and
15	WHEREAS, Social media has a clear impact on recent school
16	threats, with 53% of school threats nationwide coming from
17	social media sites; and
18	WHEREAS, Individuals making school threats want to cause

- 1 chaos, uncertainty and disruption; and
- 2 WHEREAS, School threats, either through social media, word of
- 3 mouth or other means, need to be reported to school authorities
- 4 and law enforcement to be thoroughly investigated and to allow
- 5 for notification to parents and guardians of credible threats;
- 6 and
- 7 WHEREAS, If school personnel are well-trained on how to
- 8 intervene and quickly respond to threats, threats will become
- 9 less effective because such a response will eliminate the chaos,
- 10 uncertainty and disruption intended by the maker; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Education is the key to decreasing, and possibly
- 12 eliminating, the number of threats and violent incidents; and
- 13 WHEREAS, If students know that a school handles threats
- 14 seriously through the use of visible security, by keeping
- 15 parents and quardians informed of the procedures used when
- 16 threats are received and by having a role for everyone on school
- 17 property, the number of school threats will decline; therefore
- 18 be it
- 19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 20 State Government Commission to conduct a study on school safety
- 21 programs of the 500 public school districts, including charter
- 22 schools, in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 23 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission issue a
- 24 report with recommendations on a Statewide school security
- 25 program for all schools within this Commonwealth and recommend
- 26 funding sources for the school security program as to eliminate
- 27 the appearance of an unfunded mandate applied to the school
- 28 district; and be it further
- 29 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission issue
- 30 its report to the House of Representatives within one year of

1 the adoption of this resolution.
