## A RESOLUTION

- Designating May 15 through June 15, 2018, as "Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, An estimated 1 out of every 360 children 6 through
- 4 17 years of age in the United States and this Commonwealth are
- 5 diagnosed with Tourette syndrome, a neurobiological, genetic
- 6 condition that has no cure; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Tourette syndrome is a lifelong developmental
- 8 disability that begins before a child reaches 18 years of age
- 9 and affects children and adults of all races and ethnicities;
- 10 and
- 11 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome are affected by
- 12 tics, which are involuntary, rapid, sudden movements or
- 13 vocalizations that occur repeatedly; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome face periodic
- 15 changes in the nature and severity of their tics, as these

- 1 symptoms wax and wane and change without forewarning; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome frequently have
- 3 co-occurring conditions that further complicate their care and
- 4 diagnosis, including attention deficit disorder, attention
- 5 deficit hyperactivity disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder,
- 6 mood disorders, learning disabilities, handwriting difficulties,
- 7 executive function disorder and sensory processing disorder; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome are frequently
- 9 misunderstood by their families, educators, communities and even
- 10 medical professionals because their symptoms change frequently
- 11 and at times seem controllable; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Tourette syndrome has historically been
- 13 misinterpreted and considered to be a condition of emotional
- 14 disturbance instead of a condition of chemical biology; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome are often teased
- 16 and not accepted by their peers and by the general public; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Educators may discipline children with Tourette
- 18 syndrome for manifestations of their disability; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Educators may fail to understand that a child with
- 20 Tourette syndrome is unable to control tics and that the child's
- 21 maturity and emotional responses may be delayed; and
- 22 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome may face
- 23 discrimination from educators, friends, family, employers,
- 24 coworkers and the judicial system while dealing with their
- 25 unpredictable disorder and uncertain future; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette syndrome are often very
- 27 intelligent and capable of great contributions to society when
- 28 given the proper support; and
- 29 WHEREAS, Employers are required under the Americans with
- 30 Disabilities Act to disregard disability when hiring or

- 1 promoting individuals and to make reasonable accommodations to
- 2 support their employees with Tourette syndrome so that the
- 3 employees can be successful in the workplace and not be forced
- 4 to file for disability; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Employers can benefit from the success of employees
- 6 with Tourette syndrome, but many employers neglect to hire,
- 7 promote and make accommodations for individuals with Tourette
- 8 syndrome; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Tourette Syndrome Alliance, Inc.,
- 10 has been established to promote awareness and provide support
- 11 and disability advocacy for individuals with Tourette syndrome
- 12 in this Commonwealth; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Understanding this disorder helps guarantee hope for
- 14 acceptance and a better future for individuals with Tourette
- 15 syndrome; therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate May 15
- 17 through June 15, 2018, as "Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month" in
- 18 Pennsylvania and urge all residents to support the need for
- 19 Tourette syndrome awareness and education to assist individuals
- 20 and families who deal with this neurobiological disorder every
- 21 day.
