AN ACT

1 2 3	Establishing a bill of rights for individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism; and conferring powers and duties on the Department of Human Services.
4	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
5	hereby enacts as follows:
6	Section 1. Short title.
7	This act shall be known and may be cited as the Individuals
8	with Intellectual Disabilities or Autism Bill of Rights Act.
9	Section 2. Findings.
10	The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:
11	(1) Disability is a natural part of the human
12	experience, which does not diminish the right of individuals
13	with intellectual disabilities or autism to:
14	(i) enjoy the opportunity to live, to the maximum
15	extent possible, independently and in the community;
16	(ii) make choices and decisions;

1 (iii) contribute to society and participate in the 2 community; and

3 (iv) experience full integration and inclusion in the economic, political, social, cultural, educational 5 and all other aspects of society in this Commonwealth.

Individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism 6 (2) 7 continually encounter various forms of discrimination in all 8 areas.

9 There is a lack of public awareness of the (3)capabilities and competencies of individuals with 10 intellectual disabilities or autism. 11

A substantial number of individuals with 12 (4) intellectual disabilities or autism do not have access to 13 14 appropriate community-integrated supports and services from 15 generic and specialized service systems and remain unserved or underserved. 16

17 Communities can be enriched by the full and active (5) 18 participation and the contributions by individuals with 19 intellectual disabilities or autism and their families, and 20 there is a need to ensure that, within this Commonwealth, 21 there is the availability and equitable provision of 22 necessary community-integrated supports and services for 23 individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism, 24 regardless of religion, race, color, national origin, 25 economic or social status and degree or type of disability.

26 The long-time commitment of the General Assembly to (6) 27 secure for individuals with intellectual disabilities or 28 autism in partnership with their families or legal guardians 29 the opportunity to choose where they live in the community is 30 affirmed. The General Assembly encourages individuals with

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intellectual disabilities or autism to remain in their homes
 or community to the maximum extent possible.

3 (7) Services must ensure accountability, credibility,
4 responsiveness and quality assurance, whether the funding is
5 Federal, State, local or community.

As of April 30, 2015 MARCH 31, 2020, there are 6 (8) <---7 approximately 10,234 9,982 people with intellectual <---8 disabilities or autism with emergency and critical needs 9 waiting for home-based and community-based services. As of 10 June 3, 2015 MARCH 30, 2020, there are approximately 1,675-<---2,244 individuals on the autism home-based and community-11 <---12 based services waiting list, or interest list. The waiting 13 lists for these persons are expected to grow substantially 14 into the foreseeable future.

(9) The Department of Human Services needs to develop an
adequate plan to address the needs and services for the
individuals on the waiting list for intellectual disability
services, for the individuals on the waiting list or interest
list for autism services and for all individuals with
disabilities to prevent institutionalization.

(10) For true choice to exist, individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism and their families or legal guardians must be provided with information about options for supports and services.

(11) The goals of the General Assembly properly include
the goal of providing individuals with intellectual
disabilities or autism with the opportunities and support to:
(i) Make informed choices and decisions.
(ii) Pursue meaningful and productive lives.

30 (iii) Live in a home and community of their choice.

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(iv) Achieve full integration and inclusion in
 society in an individualized manner consistent with the
 unique strengths, resources, priorities, concerns,
 abilities and capabilities of each individual.

5 (12) The purpose of this act is to reflect the United 6 States Supreme Court decision of *Olmstead v. L.C.*, 119 S.Ct. 7 2176 (1999) (No.98-536 U.S. 1999) and the integration 8 mandates of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 9 (P.L.101-336, 104 Stat. 347) and the Rehabilitation Act of 10 1973 (P.L.93-112, 29 U.S.C. § 701 et seq.).

11 (13) It is the policy of the General Assembly that all 12 programs, projects and activities operating in this 13 Commonwealth be carried out in a manner consistent with the 14 following principles:

(i) Individuals with intellectual disabilities or
autism are capable of pursuing independence, productivity
and integration and inclusion into the community and
often require the provision of services, supports and
other assistance to achieve independence, productivity
and integration and inclusion.

(ii) Individuals with intellectual disabilities or
autism have competencies, capabilities and personal goals
which shall be recognized, supported and encouraged, and
any assistance to the individuals shall be provided in an
individualized manner consistent with the unique
strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities and
capabilities of the individuals.

(iii) Individuals with intellectual disabilities or
autism and, if chosen by the individual, their families
or legal guardians are instrumental decision makers

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regarding the services and supports the individuals
 receive and inform policies and programs which affect the
 lives of the individuals and their families.

4 (iv) The Commonwealth shall, within budgetary 5 accountability, provide services, supports and other 6 assistance which reflect the principles of everyday life 7 and self-determination that have been the cornerstone of 8 this Commonwealth's human services for people with 9 intellectual disabilities or autism.

10 Section 3. Definitions.

11 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall 12 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the 13 context clearly indicates otherwise:

14 "Autism" or "autism spectrum disorder." Any of the pervasive 15 developmental disorders defined by the most recent edition of 16 the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM), 17 or its successor, including autistic disorder, Asperger's 18 syndrome and pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise 19 specified.

20 "Department." The Department of Human Services of the 21 Commonwealth.

22 "Intellectual disability." Significantly subaverage general 23 intellectual functioning that is accompanied by significant 24 limitations in adaptive functioning in at least two of the 25 following skill areas:

26 (1) Communication.

27 (2) Self-care.

28 (3) Home living.

29 (4) Social and interpersonal skills.

30 (5) Use of community resources.

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1 (6) Self-direction.

2 (7) Functional academic skills.

3 (8) Work.

4 (9) Health.

5 (10) Safety.

6 The onset must occur before the individual reaches 22 years of
7 age, as defined by the act of October 20, 1966 (3rd Sp.Sess.,
8 P.L.96, No.6), known as the Mental Health and Intellectual
9 Disability Act of 1966.

"Supports and services." Integrated services in the home and 10 11 community, including the integrated settings where the services 12 are provided, as defined under 42 CFR SS 440.180 (relating to <---13 home and community-based waiver services) and 441.301(c)(4) and 14 (5) (relating to contents of request for a waiver), which are 15 developed in accordance with the person-centered planning 16 requirements of 42 CFR § 441.301(c)(1), (2) and (3). <---

17 Section 4. Choice.

(a) Community-based services.--The Commonwealth shall, based on available funding, provide individualized supports and services for an individual with intellectual disabilities or autism if all of the following apply:

22 (1) The individual has intellectual disabilities or23 autism.

(2) The individual chooses certain supports and services
or does not oppose the supports and services.

(3) The supports and services are included in an
approved individualized services plan developed in accordance
with the person-centered planning requirements of 42 CFR 5441.301(c)(1), (2) and (3) (relating to contents of request
for a waiver) by an authorized State or county supports

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1 coordinator with the input of the individual and, if chosen 2 by the individual, the individual's guardian and advocate. 3 (b) Family.--If the individual so chooses, family members and legal quardians of an individual with intellectual 4 disabilities or autism shall be involved in meetings regarding 5 6 the planning for and arrangement of supports and services or 7 other allowable services. Legal guardians shall, under 20 8 Pa.C.S. § 5521(a) (relating to provisions concerning powers, duties and liabilities): 9

10 (1) Assert the rights and interests of the individual.
11 (2) Respect the wishes and preferences of the individual
12 to the greatest extent possible.

(3) Encourage the individual to participate to the maximum extent of the individual's abilities in all decisions that affect the individual, to act on the individual's own behalf when the individual is able to do so and to develop or regain the individual's capacity to manage the individual's personal affairs to the maximum extent feasible.

(c) Contact.--Nothing in this act shall be construed to prohibit an individual with intellectual disabilities or autism from maintaining contact with family and friends. The individual shall also have the choice to not have contact with family and friends.

24 (d) Complaints.--An individual with intellectual

disabilities or autism, or a family member or legal guardian of the individual who believes that the needs as identified or as detailed in the individualized service plan are not being met may provide the State or county a letter expressing concerns.
The State or county shall, within 30 days, address the concerns and, if necessary, take corrective action. All Federal and State

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due process rights, including written notice and a fair hearing,
 also continue to apply for each individual.

3 Section 5. Waiting lists for intellectual disability or autism 4 services.

General rule.--The department shall, within four SIX 5 (a) <--months of the effective date of this act, reorganize its waiting 6 7 list or interest list for individuals with autism into a waiting 8 list that prioritizes individuals according to the categories of 9 emergency needs, critical needs and planning needs. This data 10 shall be collected using a tool that measures the level of care needed and that does not limit assessment data collection based 11 on the geographic area where autism services are provided in 12 13 this Commonwealth. Additionally, the prioritization of need may <-not include consideration of services that the individual with-14 15 autism currently receives.

16 Waiting list plan. -- Within one year of the effective (b) date of this section, the department shall, as part of a 17 18 stakeholder process with participation by individuals with 19 intellectual disabilities or autism and their family members, 20 develop a five-year plan to eliminate the current and any future additions to the critical and emergency waiting list for 21 individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism who are in 22 23 need of supports and services. Within one year of the effective <--24 date of this section, the department shall develop a two year 25 plan to eliminate the current as well as any future additions to 26 the supports and services waiting list for individuals with autism and to prevent future supports and services waiting lists-27 28 for all other persons with disabilities, including those with 29 physical and developmental disabilities, including brain injury. 30 The department shall submit the plans to the Governor, the

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General Assembly and the county intellectual disability program
 administrators.

3 (c) Contents of plan.--The plans required by subsection (b) 4 shall include:

5 (1) Statistical information on the current and projected 6 annual increase in the waiting lists on a county basis. The 7 department shall develop a Statewide standardized form to 8 collect the information from the counties and the 9 department's Bureau of Autism Services.

10 Budget projections taking into consideration the (2) department's current budget year, projected annual costs 11 associated with the elimination of the waiting lists, 12 13 financial information on the amount of additional Federal, 14 State or other funds in each county and with the department's Bureau of Autism Services which may be required annually for 15 the operational costs associated with the elimination of the 16 17 waiting list in each county and of the waiting list with the 18 department's Bureau of Autism Services and the projected 19 annual waiting lists in each annual plan update.

(d) Public hearings and comment.--In the development of the plans required by subsection (b), the department shall conduct public hearings and obtain public comment from individuals with disabilities, including those with intellectual disabilities or autism, their families and guardians and providers of services to the disability community, including the intellectual disabilities and autism community.

(e) Annual submission of updated plan.--The department shall update the budget, statistical and financial data to the plans required by subsection (b) annually and submit updated plans to the Governor, the General Assembly and the county intellectual

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1 disability program administrators on the anniversary date of the 2 department's original submission of the plans.

3 Section 6. Funding.

Services under this act shall be made available across this Commonwealth, taking into account the budget constraints and financial resources available to the Commonwealth and the needs of individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism. Nothing under this act shall constitute an entitlement derived from the Commonwealth or a claim on any funds of the Commonwealth.

11 (a) General rule.--The department shall submit a written 12 report by September 30, 2019 WITHIN NINE MONTHS AFTER THE 13 EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS SECTION, and every four months 14 thereafter, to the following:

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(1) The Governor.

16 (2) The chairperson and minority chairperson of the
17 Public Health and Welfare Committee of the Senate.

18 (3) The chairperson and minority chairperson of the19 Health Committee of the House of Representatives.

20 (4) The chairperson and minority chairperson of the
 21 Human Services Committee of the House of Representatives.

(5) The chairperson and minority chairperson of theAppropriations Committee of the Senate.

24 (6) The chairperson and minority chairperson of the25 Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives.

26 (7) The department's Medical Assistance Advisory27 Committee.

(b) Posting of report.--The report shall be posted on the department's publicly accessible Internet website in an accessible format.

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1 (c) Contents of report.--The report shall include the 2 following:

3 (1) The total number and age ranges, including under 18 4 years of age, 18 to 21 years of age and over 21 years of age, 5 of individuals currently on the department's waiting list for 6 supports and services for individuals with intellectual 7 disabilities or autism.

8 (2) The number and age ranges, including under 18 years 9 of age, 18 to 21 years of age and over 21 years of age, of 10 individuals currently on the department's waiting list for 11 supports and services for individuals with intellectual 12 disabilities or autism:

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(ii) with critical needs; and

(i) with emergency needs;

15 (iii) the combined number of those with emergency16 needs and critical needs.

17 (3) The number of individuals added to the department's 18 waiting list for supports and services for individuals with 19 intellectual disabilities or autism in the last four months 20 and the reasons that the individuals were added to the 21 waiting list.

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(4) The number of individuals removed from the
department's waiting list for supports and services for
individuals with intellectual disabilities or autism in the
last four months. and the reasons that the individuals were <--
removed from the waiting list.

27 (5) The number of months or years that individuals with
 28 emergency needs currently on the department's waiting list
 29 for supports and services for individuals with intellectual
 30 disabilities or autism have been on the waiting list.

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1	(6) The number of months or years that individuals with

24	(9) (7) The total number and age ranges, including under <
25	18 years of age, 18 to 21 years of age and over 21 years of
26	age, of individuals currently on the department's waiting
27	list or interest list for the adult community autism program
28	and the adult autism waiver:
29	(i) with emergency needs;
30	(ii) with critical needs; and

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(iii) the combined number of those with emergency
 needs and critical needs.

3 (10) The number of individuals added to the department's <--</p>
4 waiting list or interest list for the adult community autism5 program and the adult autism waiver in the last four months6 and the reasons that the individuals were added to the7 waiting list.

8 (11) (8) The number of individuals removed from the <--9 department's waiting list or interest list for the adult 10 community autism program and the adult autism waiver in the 11 last four months. and the reasons that the individuals were <--12 removed from the waiting list.

13 (12) The number of months or years that individuals with 14 emergency needs currently on the department's waiting list or 15 interest list for the adult community autism program and the 16 adult autism waiver have been on the waiting list.

17 (13) The number of months or years that individuals with 18 critical needs currently on the department's waiting list or 19 interest list for the adult community autism program and the 20 adult autism waiver have been on the waiting list.

21 (14) (9) The total number and age ranges, including <--</p>
22 under 18 years of age, 18 to 21 years of age and over 21
23 years of age, of individuals currently on the department's
24 waiting list or interest list for the adult community autism
25 program and the adult autism waiver who are in:

26 (i) a State center;

(ii) a private intermediate care facility for
individuals with intellectual disabilities or persons
with other related conditions;

30 (iii) a State hospital;

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(iv) a private psychiatric hospital;

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(v) a residential treatment facility; or

3 (vi) any other public or private facility or other
4 institutional setting.

5 (15) (10) The estimated per-person cost to serve an <--6 eligible individual on the waiting list under paragraph (1).

7 (16) (11) The estimated per-person cost to serve an
8 eligible individual on the waiting list or interest list
9 under paragraph (8) (6).

10 (17) (12) The total estimated cost to serve all eligible <---11 individuals on the waiting list under paragraph (1) and the 12 estimated cost to serve all eligible individuals in each 13 category listed under paragraph (2).

14 (18) (13) The total estimated cost to serve all eligible <--</p>
15 individuals on the waiting list or interest list under
16 paragraph (8) (6) and the estimated cost to serve all <--</p>
17 eligible individuals in each category listed under paragraph
18 (9) (7). <--</p>

19 Section 8. Effective date.

20 This act shall take effect immediately.

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
