AN ACT

1 Amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), entitled "An
2 act relating to alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and
3 brewed beverages; amending, revising, consolidating and
4 changing the laws relating thereto; regulating and
5 restricting the manufacture, purchase, sale, possession,
6 consumption, importation, transportation, furnishing, holding
7 in bond, holding in storage, traffic in and use of alcoholic
8 liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages and the
9 persons engaged or employed therein; defining the powers and
10 duties of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; providing
11 for the establishment and operation of State liquor stores,
12 for the payment of certain license fees to the respective
13 municipalities and townships, for the abatement of certain
14 nuisances and, in certain cases, for search and seizure
15 without warrant; prescribing penalties and forfeitures;
16 providing for local option, and repealing existing laws," in
17 preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions;
18 and, in licenses and regulations, liquor, alcohol and malt
19 and brewed beverages, further providing for limiting number
20 of retail licenses to be issued in each county and for
21 licenses not assignable and transfers.

22 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

23 hereby enacts as follows:

24 Section 1. Section 102 of the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90,
25 No.21), known as the Liquor Code, is amended by adding
26 definitions to read:

27 Section 102. Definitions.--The following words or phrases,

1 unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, shall have the
2 meanings ascribed to them in this section:

3 * * *

4 "Saturated county" shall mean a county with more than one
5 restaurant liquor license per three thousand (3,000) inhabitants
6 in the top twenty-five highest ratios of restaurant liquor
7 licenses to county population in this Commonwealth.

9 "Tourist development project" shall mean a planned
10 development situated on at least ninety acres of land,
11 constructed since January 1, 2019, that is dedicated primarily
12 to interstate tourism with at least five hundred thousand square
13 feet of actual or proposed development, with a mix of
14 entertainment and retail uses.

15 * * *

16 Section 2. Section 461(a) and (b.4)(4) of the act are
17 amended and the section is amended by adding a subsection to
18 read:

19 Section 461. Limiting Number of Retail Licenses To Be Issued
20 In Each County.--(a) No additional restaurant, eating place
21 retail dispenser or club licenses shall be issued within a
22 county if the total number of restaurant and eating place retail
23 dispenser licenses is greater than one license for each three
24 thousand inhabitants in the county, except the board may issue
25 licenses to public venues, performing arts facilities,
26 continuing care retirement communities, airport restaurants,
27 municipal golf courses, hotels, privately-owned private golf
28 courses, privately-owned public golf courses, racetracks,
29 automobile racetracks, nonprimary pari-mutuel wagering
30 locations, privately-owned ski resorts and to any other entity

1 which this act specifically exempts from the limitations
2 provided in this section, and the board may issue a license to a
3 club situated in a borough having a population less than eight
4 thousand inhabitants which is located in a county of the second
5 class A whose application is filed on or before February 28,
6 2001. In addition, the board may issue an eating place retail
7 dispenser license for on-premises sales only to the owner or
8 operator of a facility having a minimum of a one-half mile
9 asphalt track and having a permanent seating capacity of at
10 least six thousand people used principally for holding
11 automobile races, regardless of the number of restaurant and
12 eating place retail dispenser licenses already issued in that
13 county. When determining the number of restaurant and eating
14 place retail dispenser licenses issued in a county for the
15 purposes of this section, licenses exempted from this
16 limitation, licenses subject to the mixed-use town development
17 project provisions of this act, licenses subject to the tourist
18 development project provisions of this act and club licenses
19 shall not be considered. Inhabitants of dry municipalities shall
20 be considered when determining the population in a county.
21 Licenses shall not be issued or transferred into municipalities
22 where such licenses are prohibited pursuant to local referendum
23 in accordance with section 472. Licenses approved for
24 intermunicipal transfer may not be transferred from the
25 receiving municipality for a period of five years after the date
26 that the licensed premises are operational in the receiving
27 municipality.

29 (b.4) * * *

30 (4) The board may approve licensure of exterior serving

1 areas for premises to be located within a mixed-use town center
2 development project or tourist development project where such
3 exterior serving areas are situated on municipal-owned or
4 private-owned property, regardless of whether such exterior
5 serving areas are located immediately adjacent, abutting or
6 contiguous to the building to be licensed, provided that the
7 employes of licensees in a qualified mixed-use town center
8 development project or tourist development project may traverse
9 unlicensed areas in order to deliver alcohol to patrons who are
10 seated in any such licensed serving area that is not immediate,
11 adjacent, abutting and contiguous to the licensee's primary
12 licensed premises; and provided further that any such licensed
13 serving area is delineated from all adjacent public areas by a
14 railing, barrier or other partition for the purpose of table
15 service only; and provided further that the entirety of such
16 noncontiguous licensed exterior serving area or areas is not
17 located more than thirty-five feet from the nearest point of the
18 licensed structure; and provided further that such noncontiguous
19 licensed exterior serving areas shall not include any additional
20 enclosed structure with four walls and a roof other than the
21 primary licensed building; and provided further that any and all
22 public thoroughfare or thoroughfares situated between the
23 licensed building and the noncontiguous exterior licensed
24 serving area is or are used primarily for pedestrian foot
25 traffic and not vehicular traffic; and provided further that the
26 local municipality has approved, by ordinance or resolution, the
27 use of such areas by the applicant; and provided further that,
28 in the case of municipal-owned property, a sidewalk cafe or
29 similar permit, as applicable, is first obtained by the
30 applicant; and provided further that the applicant complies with

1 any regulation issued by the board pursuant hereto or in
2 furtherance hereof. Any restaurant ("R"), eating place ("E") or
3 hotel ("H") license transferred to or issued for premises
4 located within a mixed-use town center development or tourist
5 development project shall have the privileges of this subsection
6 so long as such license remains within the mixed-use town center
7 development or tourist development project.

8 * * *

9 (b.5) (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this
10 act to the contrary, the board may approve the transfer of a
11 restaurant liquor license available for auction under section
12 470.3 for the purpose of economic development through increased
13 tourism, subject to the conditions of this subsection.

14 (2) A tourist development project restaurant liquor license
15 application may be submitted by any interested party at any
16 time. The application to the board shall be accompanied by a
17 resolution or ordinance indicating that the municipality has
18 approved the request to have the area designated as a tourist
19 development project by the board, a map of the area proposed
20 to be designated and any additional information the board may
21 require.

22 (3) The proposed location must be within a tourist
23 development project as the term is defined in section 102 and
24 within a municipality that allows for the issuance and
25 transfer of restaurant liquor licenses under section 472.

26 (4) A tourist development project restaurant liquor license
27 application must indicate the number of restaurant liquor
28 licenses that the applicant is seeking, but the applicant may
29 not seek more than seventy-five licenses for the tourist
30 development project. The applicant must submit a surcharge of

1 sixty-five thousand (\$65,000) dollars for each restaurant liquor
2 license upon board approval of the transfer of the applicable
3 restaurant liquor license.

4 (5) On receiving a tourist development project restaurant
5 license application as well as any additional documents and
6 fees, and following satisfaction that the applicant's request
7 meets all board requirements, the board shall approve the
8 application request and place the surcharge under clause (4)
9 into The State Stores Fund. The restaurant liquor license shall
10 then be held in safekeeping for the benefit of the applicant
11 until the applicant or the applicant's assignee files a formal
12 transfer application. The applicant may assignee the rights to
13 file a formal transfer application to a third party.

14 (6) The board may choose which specific restaurant liquor
15 licenses will be made available for transfer but shall choose
16 licenses from a saturated county, if they are available, up to
17 the maximum number of licenses that can be accepted from that
18 saturated county. For purposes of this subsection, the maximum
19 number of licenses that can be accepted from a county shall be
20 calculated by subtracting from the total number of restaurant
21 liquor licenses in the county, a number equal to 2.64 times the
22 county population divided by three thousand.

23 (7) A license held in safekeeping under clause (5) may
24 remain in safekeeping for up to four years without having to
25 pay the additional safekeeping fees in section 474.1. The
26 restaurant liquor license shall be subject to all other fees
27 such as renewal fees and the application surcharge under
28 section 470. After the four-year period, measured from the date
29 the board approves the application request for making the
30 license available for transfer, the license shall be revoked

1 unless the applicant has submitted a transfer application
2 prior to that date. If a license is revoked, the applicant
3 may not receive any refund.

4 (8) A restaurant liquor license transferred under this
5 subsection may not be transferred to a location outside of the
6 designated tourist development project.

7 (9) A license transferred under this subsection is
8 ineligible for a wine expanded permit under section 415.
9 Patrons may take wine, spirits and malt and brewed beverages off
10 the licensed premises if the wine, spirits and malt and brewed
11 beverages remain in the area previously designated as a tourist
12 development project.

13 (10) A license transferred into a new county under this
14 subsection may not be counted toward or subject to the county
15 quota under section 461.

16 (11) The renewal and validation dates of a license
17 transferred into a new county under this subsection shall be
18 amended to match the renewal and validation date of the
19 licenses in the county.

21 Section 3. Section 468(a)(1) of the act is amended to read:

22 Section 468. Licenses Not Assignable; Transfers.--(a) (1)
23 Licenses issued under this article may not be assigned. The
24 board, upon payment of the transfer filing fee, is hereby
25 authorized to transfer any license issued by it under the
26 provisions of this article from one person to another or from
27 one place to another, or both. Except for restaurant liquor and
28 eating place retail dispenser licenses transferred under section
29 461(b.4) and restaurant liquor licenses transferred under
30 section 461(b.5), if the license is a retail license, the new

1 location must be within the same county as the existing location
2 or, if the municipality is located in more than one county,
3 within the same municipality as the existing location.

5 Section 4. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
