INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, APRIL 29, 2019

A RESOLUTION

1 Designating April 28 through May 5, 2019, as "Days of
2 Remembrance of the Victims of the Holocaust" and recognizing
3 May 2, 2019, as "Holocaust Remembrance Day" in Pennsylvania.

4 WHEREAS, The Holocaust, one of the darkest chapters in human
5 history, was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and
6 annihilation of the European Jewry by Nazi Germany and its
7 collaborators between 1933 and 1945; and

8 WHEREAS, During the Holocaust, 6 million Jews were murdered,
9 many by bullets from the Einsatzgruppen (mobile killing units)
10 or in the gas chambers of the concentration camps; and

11 WHEREAS, The word "Holocaust" is Greek in origin and means
12 "sacrifice by fire"; and

1 WHEREAS, The Nazi's suspension of basic civil rights occurred
2 within days of Hitler's accession to power in January 1933; and

3 WHEREAS, From 1933 until the outbreak of war in 1939, the
4 first six years of Adolph Hitler's dictatorship in Germany, Jews
5 felt the effects of more than 400 decrees and regulations that
6 restricted all aspects of their public and private lives; and

7 WHEREAS, In 1933, the Jewish population in Europe was
8 estimated to be more than 9 million; and

9 WHEREAS, By 1945, the Nazis and their collaborators killed
10 nearly two out of every three European Jews as part of their
11 "Final Solution"; and

12 WHEREAS, Millions of other individuals, including Roma
13 (Gypsies), individuals with disabilities, gays and lesbians,
14 Jehovah's Witnesses, Soviet prisoners of war, political
15 dissidents and nearly 2 million Poles, were also targeted for
16 destruction or decimation for racial, ethnic or national
17 reasons; and

18 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth was founded on the principles of
19 religious freedom and tolerance; and

20 WHEREAS, The people of this Commonwealth should remember the
21 atrocities committed by the Nazis so that these horrors are
22 never repeated; and

23 WHEREAS, The people of this Commonwealth should continually
24 rededicate themselves to the principle of equal justice for all;
25 and

26 WHEREAS, The people of this Commonwealth should remain
27 vigilant against all tyranny and recognize that bigotry provides
28 a breeding ground for tyranny to flourish; and

29 WHEREAS, In the 1930s and the 1940s, Pennsylvanians rescued
30 children from Europe, led efforts to publicize the horrors of

1 the Holocaust during the war, liberated concentration camps and
2 prosecuted those who committed these evil acts in the Nuremberg
3 Trials; and

4 WHEREAS, Nearly 1,000 Pennsylvanians who are Holocaust
5 survivors have contributed their oral histories of the Holocaust
6 to the USC Shoah Foundation, created by Steven Spielberg, and
7 have told their stories in schools and in communities across
8 this Commonwealth; and

9 WHEREAS, Pennsylvanians have established Holocaust museums,
10 educational programs, monuments and commemorations throughout
11 this Commonwealth, engaging Jews, Christians, Muslims and all
12 people of good will; and

13 WHEREAS, With the help of the children and grandchildren of
14 Holocaust survivors and liberators, Pennsylvanians can continue
15 to rededicate themselves to the principle of equal justice for
16 all; and

17 WHEREAS, The General Assembly passed Act 70 of 2014 to
18 provide for curriculum guidelines that would complement the
19 stories of Pennsylvania's Holocaust survivors and the efforts of
20 their children and grandchildren to teach our students about the
21 Holocaust; and

22 WHEREAS, A recent survey reported that 710 of the State's 775
23 school entities now provide age-appropriate education on the
24 Holocaust, genocide and human rights violations as a standing
25 part of their curricula; and

26 WHEREAS, May 2, 2019, which corresponds to the 27th day of
27 Nisan on the Hebrew calendar, has been designated
28 internationally as a "Day of Remembrance of Victims of the Nazi
29 Holocaust" and is also known as Yom Hashoah; and

30 WHEREAS, This date further coincides with the anniversary of

1 the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising in German-occupied Poland which
2 occurred from April 19 through May 16, 1943; and

3 WHEREAS, It is appropriate for the people of this
4 Commonwealth to join in the international commemoration of this
5 solemn event; and

6 WHEREAS, The massacre of close to a dozen of Pennsylvanians
7 of Jewish faith killed in the largest anti-semitic hate crime in
8 the history of the United States reminds us that the hate
9 manifested in the Holocaust can still lead to almost unspeakable
10 violence in any generation; and

11 WHEREAS, By marking this occasion and honoring the memory of
12 the millions of victims of the Holocaust, the House of
13 Representatives hopes to overcome prejudice and inhumanity
14 through education, vigilance and resistance; therefore be it

15 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate April
16 28 through May 5, 2019, as "Days of Remembrance of the Victims
17 of the Holocaust" and recognize May 2, 2019, as "Holocaust
18 Remembrance Day" in Pennsylvania.
