## A RESOLUTION

- Condemning the inhumane treatment and detention of migrant 1 children at our country's southern border and urging the 2 Federal Government to end the practice of child detention. WHEREAS, The American immigration system is in the midst of a 4 5 humanitarian crisis at our country's southern border; and 6 WHEREAS, The president has knowingly and wrongfully attempted to assassinate the character of migrant individuals to 7 8 dehumanize them and justify his administration's morally repugnant treatment of migrants who come to America seeking 10 asylum; and 11 WHEREAS, The Trump Administration has failed to fully cease the family separation policy it established in 2018, which 12 13 ripped thousands of migrant children from the care of their 14 parents and placed them in shelters scattered throughout several 15 states; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Thousands of migrant children are being held against
- 17 their will by our Federal Government for weeks on end without

- 1 proper care; and
- 2 WHEREAS, The extended length of time that these children are
- 3 being held is a direct violation of the 1997 Flores Settlement
- 4 Agreement, in which Federal courts set limits on the length of
- 5 time and conditions under which children can be incarcerated in
- 6 immigration detention; and
- 7 WHEREAS, The Flores Settlement Agreement requires the
- 8 government to promptly release children to sponsors or relatives
- 9 or transfer them to a nonrestrictive, licensed facility that is
- 10 appropriate for their age and any special needs; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Under the Flores Settlement Agreement, the release
- 12 of a child is typically required to happen within 20 days of the
- 13 child's arrival at a Federal Government facility; and
- 14 WHEREAS, The Trump Administration has sought to terminate the
- 15 Flores Settlement Agreement's legal safeguards to allow the
- 16 government to incarcerate more families for significantly longer
- 17 periods of time; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The United States Border Patrol and the United
- 19 States Department of Health and Human Services should be
- 20 releasing unaccompanied children to relatives and sponsors as
- 21 expeditiously as possible; and
- 22 WHEREAS, Some children have been held at the nation's largest
- 23 detention center in Homestead, Florida, for up to six months,
- 24 due to poor case management; and
- 25 WHEREAS, An information-sharing agreement between the United
- 26 States Department of Health and Human Services and the United
- 27 States Department of Homeland Security has added to the number
- 28 of unaccompanied children in custody, as the agreement places
- 29 the fear of detention and deportation on potential sponsors; and
- 30 WHEREAS, It was reported in June that the Homestead facility

- 1 housed more than 3,000 unaccompanied children between 13 and 17
- 2 years of age, a figure that was more than double the facility's
- 3 capacity; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The facility in Homestead is not licensed for child
- 5 care by Florida authorities due to its location on Federal
- 6 ground and is therefore not subject to Florida's child welfare
- 7 standards; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The children kept in the Homestead facility are
- 9 alienated, denied physical contact and are emotionally
- 10 distraught, some to the point of inflicting harm upon
- 11 themselves; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The conditions of an overcrowded facility in Clint,
- 13 Texas, have been described as degrading and inhumane, as
- 14 children held there lack access to basic sanitary products,
- 15 clean clothes, adequate food and water and medical care; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Despite lacking the basic necessities to care for
- 17 the large amount of children being held in Clint, Border Patrol
- 18 agents have refused to accept donations of toiletries, diapers
- 19 and other supplies from concerned citizens; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Clinical psychologists believe the trauma endured in
- 21 facilities such as those in Homestead and Clint will have long-
- 22 lasting mental and physical health repercussions on the affected
- 23 children; and
- 24 WHEREAS, Facilities holding adult migrants are no better than
- 25 those housing children; and
- 26 WHEREAS, An internal report issued in May by the Department
- 27 of Homeland Security's Inspector General found one facility in
- 28 El Paso, Texas, to have such poor and unsanitary conditions that
- 29 Border Patrol agents have feared riots and hunger strikes; and
- 30 WHEREAS, Cells designed to hold a maximum of 35 individuals

- 1 were severely overcrowded, housing 155 adult males, with only
- 2 one toilet and sink, high temperatures and no room to lie down
- 3 to sleep; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The lack of transparency and oversight of these and
- 5 other similar facilities has led to egregious human rights
- 6 abuses and has resulted in the death of several children in
- 7 custody; therefore be it
- 8 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives condemn the
- 9 inhumane treatment and detention of migrant children at our
- 10 country's southern border and urge the Federal Government to end
- 11 the practice of child detention.
