Health Services. -- * * * 13 (e.1) A school nurse, school physician or employe of a 14 school district shall remove a tick from a student in accordance 15 with guidelines issued by the Secretary of Health. - 19 (1) A tick was removed from your child today. Ticks can
- 20 transmit disease and make people sick. A common illness caused

is removed from a student, the school district shall notify in

writing the parent or quardian of the student. The notice shall

- 1 by ticks in Pennsylvania is Lyme disease.
- 2 (2) Not all tick bites lead to Lyme disease.
- 3 (3) The parent or guardian should record the date on which
- 4 the tick was removed.
- 5 (4) It is recommended that the parent or quardian seek
- 6 medical treatment from the child's doctor promptly if they
- 7 <u>notice any early signs or symptoms of illness within three (3)</u>
- 8 to thirty (30) days of the date of removal. Some people with
- 9 Lyme disease will get a bulls-eye rash. Others may have an
- 10 atypical rash. Not everyone who has Lyme disease gets a rash.
- 11 Other symptoms which may occur during the early state of Lyme
- 12 <u>disease include: chills, fever, headache, tiredness, stiff neck,</u>
- 13 joint pain or swelling and swollen lymph nodes. Lyme disease is
- 14 treated with antibiotics. If untreated, infection may progress
- 15 to joint, heart, brain or nerve abnormalities.
- 16 <u>(e.2) The Secretary of Health shall publish guidelines</u>
- 17 consistent with subsection (e.1) on the Department of Health's
- 18 publicly accessible Internet website and, in consultation with
- 19 the Secretary of Education, provide the guidelines to school
- 20 districts.
- 21 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
