A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing the month of October 2021 as "Pregnancy and Infant 2 Loss Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Pregnancy and infant loss includes loss during and
- 4 after pregnancy, stillbirths, neonatal death, miscarriage and
- 5 Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS); and
- 6 WHEREAS, A miscarriage is the loss of a baby before the 20th
- 7 week of pregnancy, and a stillbirth is the loss of a baby at 20
- 8 weeks of pregnancy and later, and both of these experiences are
- 9 pregnancy losses; and
- 10 WHEREAS, According to the American College of Obstetrics and
- 11 Gynecology, as many as 26% of all pregnancies and up to 10% of
- 12 clinically recognized pregnancies end in miscarriage; and
- 13 WHEREAS, According to the Centers for Disease Control and
- 14 Prevention, stillbirth affects about 1% of all pregnancies in
- 15 the United States, and there are approximately 24,000
- 16 stillbirths reported each year; and
- 17 WHEREAS, According to the National Institute for Health, SIDS

- 1 is the sudden, unexplained death of an infant younger than one
- 2 year of age that does not have a known cause even after a
- 3 complete investigation and more than 1,000 infants die each year
- 4 from SIDS; and
- 5 WHEREAS, The availability of information and support is of
- 6 the utmost importance to the individuals and families who
- 7 experience pregnancy and infant loss to better help them cope;
- 8 and
- 9 WHEREAS, A public that is informed and educated about
- 10 pregnancy loss can better learn how to respond with compassion
- 11 to affected individuals and families; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Professionals who come in contact with individuals
- 13 who have suffered pregnancy loss, such as physicians, clergy,
- 14 emergency medical technicians, funeral directors, police
- 15 officers, public health nurses, educators and employers, can
- 16 better serve families if they have better knowledge of
- 17 miscarriage or pregnancy loss; and
- 18 WHEREAS, In 1988, October was officially proclaimed as
- 19 "National Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month" to
- 20 recognize the grief of families, remember all of the pregnancies
- 21 lost and increase awareness about pregnancy loss, and many
- 22 organizations have continued to recognize the month of October
- 23 in this way; therefore be it
- 24 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize the month of October 2021
- 25 as "Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
